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WHAT'S UP?

Summer has now well and truly arrived with the Midsummer Festival of San Juan last week. There were plenty of celebrations in Torrevieja, fire-jumping, fireworks, bonfires etc but the BIG local party was in Alicante. Being, probably, the biggest party of the year, it was a weeks long noisy and spectacular event. Although the national government banned the sale of fireworks to children, the Valencian authorities ignored the ruling i.e., don't mess with our fiestas! Although all-night parties seemed compulsory, the Valencianos took pity on the non-party types by limiting bar hours to 4:30 am in the week and to 5:30 am on Sunday!

Saturday 28th of July heralds "Party on the Beach." This is an *anglosajón* (anyone who speaks English) rather than a Spanish event. It begins at 12 noon and finishes at 12 midnight! Live entertainment starts at 4 pm and finishes at 8 pm and includes the Blues Brothers and much more. It promises to be a bit of a hoot! The location is the large beach just before Torry town and the salt railway/promenade.

Speaking of beaches, there are now hefty fines for taking your dog on the beach. Fines have also been introduced for the "lucky-lucky" (watches, sun-glasses etc) sellers, but it does not seem to reduce their annoying presence. Swimming while a red flag is flying can now attract a fine of up to €3,000, depending on the location. One person drowned in the sea off Torrevieja last week and another drowned at Santa Pola. This brings the toll this year to five, but sadly there will be more tragedies. The currents off this Costa are **treacherous**. If you are caught by one the advice from the life-guards is to swim with it parallel to the coast until it is possible to come ashore.

In Alicante, the *Tall Ships Race* runs from the 4th to the 7th of July, a truly spectacular sight!

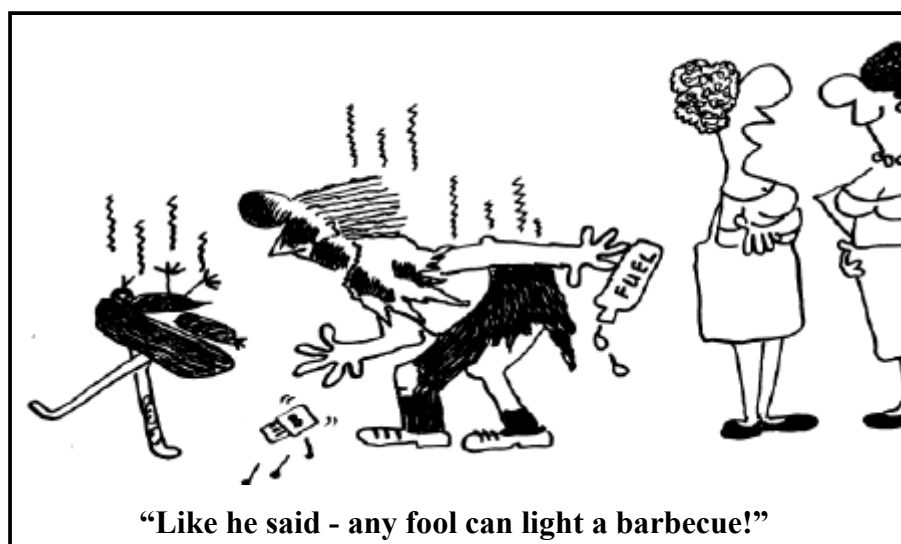
Bio-fuel, made from cereals, are to be added by the fuel companies to all petrol and diesel in Spain from 2008, on the instructions of the Spanish government.

Also, the Central Traffic Authority is currently working on a modification to the Road Safety Law making headlights obligatory on all roads and at all times. They estimate that the new law (probably in place next year) would reduce traffic fatalities and save close to 200 lives a year. The effect on fuel consumption would probably be an increase of between 1 and 3%.

The Interior Ministry is to give interest free credits of €1,000 to youngsters aged 18-25 who want to learn how to drive. Just what we need - more boy racers of the Spanish variety! *Continued on Page 3*

Worth checking out - The Pirate Rock Bar Tel:697 935 168

Situated in the Playa Flamenca Commercial Centre, street level at the back facing the N332, is the Pirate Bar and it is always a pleasure to visit it. Operated by Charlie and Steve (who both incidentally would pass for pirates!), Charlie is, what must be, the most attentive and lively front man on the Costa. The bar is packed with pirate trivia and paraphernalia with lots of skeletons, grave-stones, swords etc (although I think banana leaves instead of toilet paper is a bit much!). Well behaved children are welcome - get them to ask Charlie or Steve to turn the dancing skull on - once! The long bar has a full glass window wall with wonderful views of the sea and shoreline. Another attraction is live music every evening. As Charlie says "It's not that there is no karaoke here, there is no 'effing' karaoke here!" The live music can range from sing-along rock classics (audience participation is encouraged) to *death metal* - a visual if not aural treat! No food is served. There is usually plenty of parking in front of Supercor, just a short walk from the bar.



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WHAT'S UP? - Continued.

A Spanish lady discovered that her wedding was a fraud, while honeymooning in Tenerife. The wedding, which took place in a local hall in Betanzos, A Coruña, was attended by some 50 people. However, the groom was already married, and the Priest performing the ceremony was a 51 year old tractor driver from a nearby town. While on honeymoon the unfortunate lady discovered that the groom was taking large amounts of money from her account. Both the groom and "Father Pedro" are now out on bail.

New Statutes for the self-employed - *autónomos* - have now been introduced in Spain. These are very beneficial and far-reaching and include grants. *Autónomos* who work for a single employer can now have holiday entitlement etc. A big bonus for the self-employed is a new guarantee that says the family home can not be embargoed because of any professional debts! I have no doubt that there is some "small print" somewhere diluting this. Consult a good lawyer if appropriate.

The Euribor interest rate, used to set most Spanish mortgage rates, will end this month at just over 4.5% - the highest level since May 2001. Consequently the average mortgage could increase by approx. €95 a month. According to the National Statistics Institute, the current average mortgage in Spain is €153,445, with monthly repayments standing at €820. This is interesting when viewed against the annual average salary of €22,000.

A further proposed increase (previous increase of 1% in January) in the cost of electricity of 1.8% was vetoed by the PM Snr. Zapatero. He had previously given an undertaking that the increases would not exceed inflation, currently around 2.3%.

The electricity meters in some 20 million homes in Spain are to be changed at a cost of several billion euro. According to the Government, the power companies will bear the costs. The new meters will be able to note the time that power was used, peaks etc and will also be able to provide remote readings. The change-over process will begin next year and is due for completion by 2013.

The European Commission has referred Spain to the European Court of Justice over the Valencia Land Law - known as the LUV or "Land Grab Act." The commission states that the revised law, which came into force in early 2006, still does not comply with EU legislation.

The World Wildlife Fund has now condemned the water transfer projects in Spain, citing "unsustainable urbanisations and agriculture." They criticised a water policy which favours golf courses, property development and irrigation over maintaining river water levels and minimising environmental impact. However, they have not commented on the environmental problems associated with the alternative - desalination plants!

A pilot scheme, operating elsewhere in courts in Spain, has now reached Alicante. If criminals want their suspended sentences to be confirmed by the courts, they have to apologise face-to-face to their victims. Chances are somebody who stole a handbag could get handbagged!!

A 35 year old motorist, Nini Jose Rodriguez, has been sentenced to 39 years in prison for hitting 34 people with his car in 2002. The offences happened in Oviedo city's old quarter after a heated row over a football match. To date, he has spent at least seven and a half years in a top security prison - probably to protect him.!

A Galician driver has lost 113 licence points - almost 10 licences - in just eight months since the system came into force. The driver, who has accumulated 45 fines will have to pay 8,000 euro and faces a prison sentence of two years with loss of licence for six years. Due to possible appeals, loss of points is not automatic, which has allowed him to continue driving and reach these levels.

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Guest Restaurant Review - La Finca Eduardo's

I was looking for a special venue. It was a big birthday for *his nibs* so I wanted somewhere special. La Finca had full page ads in some of the local newspapers so I phoned them and they said they were the "best restaurant on the Costa." (Well they would, wouldn't they!) Anyway, I booked and pre-ordered a named bottle of French *champers* to be served on arrival, and a surprise birthday cake to be served after the main course.

When we arrived Saturday evening, the welcome was very attentive and the chilled *champers* was waiting

on the table. Most of the occupied tables outside on the patio, were well spaced and there was a great atmosphere with people casually talking to people on other tables- possibly their friends.

For starters we both ordered the Seafood Hot-pots, (€10) which was delicious if slightly heavy. I thought the portion was large enough for two. For the main course, I ordered the Steak Rossini (€30) and he ordered the Sole with Prawns (€25). My steak and fresh veg were excellent. The birthday boy was a bit disappointed as the sole was not very fleshy and the presentation was poor. After the main course we were asked a number of times if we would like a dessert, which we declined. I was hoping that the surprise cake would arrive but after 30 minutes there was still no sign of it! I pretended to go to the loo but secretly chased up the waitresses. After another 15 minutes it arrived and it was delicious. The champagne (French) and cake cost €72 which I thought was a fair price but two small bottles of water cost €7!

The menu is regularly changed. A sample of the starters are Crispy Duck & Chorizo Salad €10, La Finca Farmhouse Pate €9 and Caesar Salad €9. Pasta Courses - Spaghetti Bolognese €15 and Lasagne €16. The meat section ranged from Calves Liver €20 and Prime Fillet Steak with a choice of sauce €25, to Chargrilled Fillet of Pork €22. There are always a number of fresh fish dishes ranging from Lemon Sole €20 to Pan Roasted Cod €20. All main courses are supplied with good fresh vegetables where appropriate.

There is no doubt that this is a popular venue, at least at weekends. They obviously have a big marketing budget - full page ads in newspapers etc and this is reflected in the pricing. The menus displayed outside are in English only. What I did find a bit off-putting were the two signs at the entrance which stated "FOOD MINIMUM CHARGE PER PERSON €20." OK, it lets you know where they stand but is hardly welcoming! I doubt if we would return. V.

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NEW *RESIDENCIA* CERTIFICATE - a Report from Alan and Pat at No.513

Those of us who have been through the ordeal of applying for the old style residencia card, hoped that the new certificate might mean less delays, hassle and queuing - but has it? Alan and Pat in Dream Hills have been through the new system and their report on the new procedure follows.

“We have found out that you can now apply for your residence at the Orihuela Town Hall, near the Mercadona supermarket in Playa Flamenca. We got our solicitor to get us the forms (paid of course), one was in triplicate and the other for the bank. If you go to the bank first and pay €6.70 (for each application) the day before you go to the town hall, it saves having to return with a receipt. Be warned, when you take your completed forms to the town hall, you must get there about 7.00 am! They only give out 75 tickets, so if you are late it means you have to go the next day. They open at 9.30 am but only Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. The staff speak English and you are told to return in two weeks to pick up the certificate.

The following forms are required for registration -

Solicitud de Certificado de Registro como Residente + three copies - one for town hall, one for bank and one for yourself. Some of these forms may be in triplicate, otherwise you have to photocopy them.

Modflo 790 Centro Gestor (Bank payment form)

Passport + one copy

NIF/NIE Number Form + one copy

Padron + one copy

(If you have already applied for the Residence Card, bring the original letter/application form)

We returned two weeks later at 6.40 am to collect the certificates. After the office opened at 8.30 am we received another number and waited to be called. We finally got our certificates at 10.55 that morning!”

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Security Issues

Now that Summer has arrived, there is an increased incidence of robberies and muggings. The villains are aware that with people walking to and from bars and restaurants, that the handbags in particular, are bound to contain cash, credit cards, passports, keys etc. It is an excellent idea to photocopy your passports, driving license, credit cards, etc and keep them in a safe and secure place - not a handbag! There are a number of handbag snatches on the main road through Dream Hills every Summer.

The Dream Hills Neighbourhood Watch Group is the largest on the Orihuela Costa and have issued the following communication.

NHW warning to residents and Holiday makers in Dream Hills

Most residents are aware of petty crime in the area, but holiday-makers should be made aware of security measures which need to be taken when leaving the property or retiring for the night;

DO ensure that doors and windows are securely closed and locked, and that shutters are security pulled down. When using the bedroom or roof terraces, ensure that doors and windows downstairs are secure.

DON'T leave handbags, keys, purses, wallets, mobile phones or any other valuables downstairs or visible through windows in any room. Would-be thieves are always looking for opportunities to take your valuables and are easily able to "fish" bags and keys through windows and grills with makeshift fishing rods. If they manage to take your car keys, your car will go too!

LADIES, PLEASE DON'T CARRY HANDBAGS when you are out. Thieves are always on the lookout for bags left on the backs of chairs or under tables in bars and restaurants, and bag-snatching (particularly by the public telephones) is a common occurrence. Also, thieves drive slowly down roads and snatch bags as they pass. DON'T give them the chance to take yours, and perhaps injure you in the process.

DON'T park your car in isolated locations, especially if alone or after dark. Park in well lit streets and be particularly vigilant when leaving bars and restaurants.

We do not want to alarm anyone but we would rather make sure that people are aware of the problems and try to ensure that people have a safe, enjoyable holiday without experiencing the trauma of robbery or injury.

Many muggings occur in driveways as people are getting in or out of their car. A stranger approaches with say a map or a letter - requesting assistance or instructions - and will then quickly grab the handbag and join their accomplice in a vehicle nearby.

The NHW need more street coordinators and other volunteers so do please step forward and do your bit! A special thanks to Denise and Gerald for their sterling work in the local group during the past few years. They are returning to the UK and will be sadly missed.

If you are ever robbed in Spain, you will need to complete and lodge a "denuncia" to report the matter to the police and to obtain a reference number for your insurance claim. The Playa Flamenca Guardia Civil/Police office is now open for denuncias.

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SPANISH WHITE WINES

Now that Summer has arrived, many will drifting from their normal tittle of *vino tinto* for something more refreshing and cooling such as chilled beer, sangria, wine or cider. Spanish white wines have never had a good press. The dominance of French, German and Italian white wines has, in many peoples minds, relegated Spanish whites to a non runner status. This has not been helped by a major lack of marketing, nationally and globally, of what are some wonderfully rewarding white wines. OK! I know what you are going to say - *Emparado*!!

The ubiquitous *Emparado* is seen on the shelves of every British and Irish bar. You pop into the supermarkets and there will be pallets of it, stacked high and cheap - about €1.40 per bottle. And, they sell like hot-cakes! But make no mistake, *Emparado* is the “spam” of Spanish white wine, produced solely for the *anglosajón*. All it lacks is an “R Whites” label. You will never ever see a Spaniard drinking it - unless of course he or she has a severe personality disorder! Take a sample of it in a container to your Vet and he will advise you later that “your horse has got diabetes”! For just a few euros, one can have a truly memorable quality white wine and one which you will not have to hide from the neighbours!

The four most exciting white wine regions in Spain are Rueda, Rias Baixas, Penedés and Priorat. In this issue we will take a look at the Rueda DO (Denominacion de Origen).

Northwest of Madrid and southwest of the famous Ribera del Duero red wine region, lies the hugely successful wine region of Rueda. This area has produced wines since the 11th century, which were largely Sherry type oxidised wines. The area was practically destroyed by the Moors, but slowly over the centuries the wine producing areas were gradually restored and it's wines became a favourite of the various Royals. The real change came in 1971, when the famed Rioja winery, Marques de Riscal, arrived in Rueda with new technology and new ideas. Using the indigenous Verdejo grape they produced new fresh and fruity white wines as opposed to the unfashionable sherry type wines. They also introduced the Sauvignon Blanc grape which blends wonderfully with the Verdejo. Top Rueda wineries include Marquis de Riscal, Castilla La Viego, Yllera and Aura.

One can normally find the Rueda wines in Supercor and in the Mas-y-Mas at Punta Prima. I particularly like the Mas-y-Mas at Punta Prima. It carries a wide selection of international and Spanish wines and the prices are very reasonable with the Rueda wines starting at around €3.20 a bottle. The following are three of my favourites - Tierra Buena 2005 from the Grupo Yllera, which is a blend of Sauvignon-Blanc, Verdejo and Viura grapes - Herederos del Marques de Riscal 2005 using the Verdejo grape in what is a five star wine, and finally my favourite - BLUME 2006, again using the Verdejo grape in what is a “quaffable” fresh and fruity wine, which retails at around €3.45 a bottle. Most Rueda whites are a robust 13% alcohol by volume.

If you find wine labels confusing follow this simple guideline. The front label will normally show the Denominación de Origen (accredited area) - Rueda - and will also include the name of the winery - say BLUME or Yllera etc. The type of grape used i.e. Verdejo or Viura will often appear on the back label but sometimes on the front as well. Happy tipping!
