
I hope you enjoy this issue which also contains a couple of guest reviews, another excellent original cartoon from Angela and enough jokes to 'offend' at least five different nationalities!

WHAT'S UP?

It is fair to say that Spain is enjoying a renaissance in <u>sporting glory</u> this year. UEFA Cup victory in the football, Carlos Sastre won the Tour de France and now Rafa Nadal is beating all-comers and looks likely to be the world's number 1 shortly. Never a people to fly their national flag much, they now have a renewed pride in it. If only Alonso could measure-up! The new Grand Prix starts in Valencia on August 22nd.

Both <u>Spanair and Ryanair have introduced major cuts</u> to their routes and services in Spain. Only Madrid and Barcelona will remain out of the seven Spanair bases and staff cuts of 30% were also announced. Ryanair plan a 14% cutback on flights. Also, five as yet unspecified destinations will be suspended by Ryanair between November 4 and December 19. The high cost of aviation fuel and a drop in passengers are quoted as the main causes of the cut-backs. Ryanair could post a significant loss this year - around 60 million euro - if the current adverse trading conditions continue. Madrid has also fined some airlines for charging for baggage handling. Both <u>British Airways and Iberia</u> are merging. Their new HQ may not be in either the UK or Spain. Ireland and Luxemburg are among the favourites because of possible tax breaks.

A 35 year old man from Alcalá de Guadaira in Sevilla, who told the court that he had grown a 1000 square metre plantation of cannabis to give <u>shade.to his cockerels</u>, has been sentenced to seven and a half years in prison. The written sentence from the court dismissed the man's claim and says that shade for 80 roosters would have been obtained from 'any other shrub'.

The Madrid Archbishopric has been fined 1.5 million €for causing <u>interference</u> to a pornographic television channel. The Madrid court found Canal TMT, owned by the archbishopric guilty of 'constantly interrupting the channel by broadcasting on the same frequency' and fined the bishops channel the 1.5 million. The bishops licence to use the frequency ran out in May 2006.

<u>ADSL broadband</u> internet operators in Spain are to be forced to guarantee delivery speeds which are at least 80% of the velocity sold, and now suppliers will have to inform customers of the real speeds delivered. Current 20meg connections with Orange, Jazztel and Ya.com are delivering less than 50% of what was promised and paid for!

More than 200 have been <u>imprisoned</u> since December because of the new driving laws. The incarcerations have been mainly for driving without a license, drunken driving and speeding.

The newspaper, El País, notes <u>one negative effect</u> of the points driving licence system. The reduced number of car crashes has meant that there are now fewer organs available for transplant!

In a <u>horrific case</u>, a court in Tarragona heard how a 19 year old man killed his 11 month old stepson because the child distracted him and forced him to lose a game of 'Mortal Kombat'. He has been sent to prison for 18 years and ordered to pay compensation to the mother of $95,000 \in$ Many compensation awards in Spain are nonsensical as those fined are often without assets. Also, as there is often a long delay before the case is heard, most of the accused transfer their assets, if they have any, to relatives before the court case commences.

More than 600,000 women were the victims of macho <u>domestic violence</u> in Spain last year, according to a new report from Amnesty International. The report also claims that the Government's three year old legislation is not working and needs changing quickly. Amnesty also stated that quality health care, as part of an integrated response, with legal advice was still not in place for the victims. The lack of appropriate training of police and social workers was also lamented.

Whats Up? continued

ETA, the <u>Basque terrorist organisation</u>, set off five explosive devices in northern Spain on July 20th. The entrance to a Barclay's Bank was damaged in Viscaya and there were four explosions on various beaches in the Cantabrian coast in the north. Last Tuesday a small bomb was detonated in Torremolinos. No one was injured. The Spanish and French police have had some notable successes recently in capturing ETA suspects. They believe that they may have foiled a bombing campaign in Andalusia planned for this August.

Three arabs who were among the 21 found guilty in relation to the Madrid Train Bombing case have been released by the Supreme Court. A Spaniard who was sentenced to five years for supplying explosives was also released. The court found that they were convicted on insufficient evidence.

A judge, who had connections with a former real-estate assessor in Marbella during a period of notorious corruption, has appeared in court accused of <u>bribery</u>, perversion of the course of justice and other charges. If found guilty he faces three years in prison, a fine of 213,000 \in and a banning from holding public office for 19 years. The former assessor, Roca, who is at the centre of the long running Malaya case has said that he paid the judge 73,800 \in for 'favourable treatment.'

Residents in the Orihuela village of La Murada have been suffering from a <u>wave of robberies</u> in recent weeks. Residents are now patrolling the streets at night and one owner has put up large signs outside his house stating in Spanish 'We have cash only for one day's needs and no jewels. If you want to break in please ring the bell and we will open the door and give you 15 minutes before calling the local police.'

There has been an <u>increase in burglaries</u> in the Dream Hills 2 and Los Balcones areas. Please take care, especially if you are over here on holidays by removing any 'car rental' stickers off the car - dead giveaway! More than 30,000 <u>aspiring driving instructors</u> took a nationwide exam a fortnight ago and 99% of them failed the exam. The applicants, who paid up to 1,200€each to prepare for and take the exam, have launched a series of protests around the Madrid area. Their main complaint is that some of the questions in the 30-question test were ludicrous. Among the questions were such gems as 'How fast does a small horse- carriage travel?' and 'When do the effects of LSD wear off?' Among the generally odd and ambiguous questions was also the following: 'Does driving with lights on consume fuel? A) No; B) 0.5% or C) 2%.' Maybe the person who set the questions was on LSD and just wanted to know when it would wear off!

Spanish <u>professional football clubs</u> owe over 607 million euro in back taxes according to the *Agencia Tributaria*. This does not include significant amounts of social security payments also owed. Six clubs are filing for bankruptcy protection at present.

<u>Chuck Berry</u>, the rock legend, recently failed to appear for two concerts in Spain. The performer, who has returned to the States, is being asked to return 18,000€he received in deposit advances. 'Go, Johnny Go!'

Orihuela has been judged the <u>least transparent municipality</u> in a survey of 100 Spanish municipalities. Transparancy International looked at a total of 80 indicators measuring the amount of information available to local residents and the relationship between the residents and the administration. Torrevieja were rated as the second worst.

Major developments are expected in a matter of weeks in relation to a large <u>supplier of TV to the English-speaking</u> population in the Costa Blanca area. Major taxation issues and a change of ownership are rumoured.

Restaurant Review by 'Julia Scott' - 'Las Cuevas' at San Miguel de Salinas. Tele:966 723 432

How are you feeling today? No - really - how are you feeling? Hot? Bothered? Jaded? Suffering from a bit of 'ennui'? (Oh, just look it up! No! Try the French dictionary!) Well, I have the remedy!

Did you know that if you jump in the car now, you could be sitting in a beautiful, authentic Spanish restaurant - in a cave - in just seven minutes! Just drive to San Miguel de Salinas and follow the signs for 'Las Cuevas' - the caves.

When you arrive, park your car in the shade of the pink trees in the quiet yard. Walk into the cool patio, set about with glass-topped tables made from ancient farm implements. Enter the cave through a muslin curtain drifting in the breeze and you will be greeted by the owner. He is proud to show you round six interconnected cave rooms furnished with charmingly mismatched tables and chairs, antique candelabra, mirrors and pictures. Sepia family portraits adorn the walls. The tables alone get your appetite whetted - they are laid with snowy white linen table clothes and napkins, tall gleaming wine glasses shine like soap-bubbles and the cutlery sparkles. You can view glass cases filled with fossils, flints and cypress cones unearthed during the recent refurbishment - the cave has been inhabited for '*tres siglos y mas*' - three centuries & more!

On a recent visit there were three of us dining, it was lunch-time on a Saturday. We had a *chorizo* style paté with cranberry dip and a basket of toast and crackers (other starters are available). Everything was pronounced delicious!

NEW PET BYLAWS IN ORIHUELA

Within the last twelve months, the city of Alicante introduced new bylaws in an attempt to regulate pet ownership in the city. This was followed by Torrevieja who introduced similar legislation and now Orihuela has followed suit introducing new bylaws relating to pet ownership. For the purpose of this article I will refer solely dog ownership.

Dogs can give lots of pleasure to their owners, but there can be occasions when 'man's best friend' can be the harbinger of misery to many others. The unacceptable level of dog excrement on pavements throughout Spain is a real nuisance and health hazard but in this case it is often the owners who are to blame. However continuously barking dogs has to have one of the most dramatic effects on the quality of life here in Spain. It is not uncommon for dog owners to leave their dogs outside of their house or apartment during the day while they are at work, and true to its nature the dog or dogs will bark and howl at any noise or bark just as a sign of boredom to say - 'Hey! Hey! I'm here! Hey! Hey! The owners then come home from work, feed and make a fuss of the dogs who are then put outside for the remainder of the evening when the barking starts again.

It is fair to say that many Spaniards have spent much of their lives living in apartment blocks and have according developed an immunity and acceptance of certain noise levels in their lives. When you speak to a Spaniard they will tell you that crying babies, family arguments, doors banging, late night parties and barking dogs are all *normal*. But constantly barking dogs destroy any peace one can come to expect in normal living and to continue to lose sleep at night because of barking dogs will have major detrimental effects on the physical and mental well-being of the neighbours. Dog poisonings are common in Spain, particularly in urbanisation areas. There were two dogs poisoned in Los Balcones two weeks ago. Whereas I certainly do not condone such actions, it is remarkable what some people will do to escape this scourge.

Barking dogs have been a recurring problem in both Dream Hills urbanisations. I managed to get a copy of the local bylaws in relation to Noise Regulations a few years ago hoping to get some legal reference to acceptable and unacceptable levels of animal noise. No such luck! There was plenty of information about acceptable decibel levels for cars, motorbikes, factories, offices, machinery etc but all it said about pet noise was that 'owners were expected to keep their animal's noises to an acceptable level/under control.'

The new legislation could offer some new help and relief IF THE LAWS ARE ENFORCED! It is one thing having a law on the statute book and another enforcing it. Will the police enforce the new laws - who knows?

Under the new laws all dogs must now have a microchip implanted by a vet and must be registered on a list at the local department for health. Dogs are not allowed to to be kept on patios, balconies or solariums if they disturb neighbours. Dogs must be kept on a lead when walking and dog faeces must be collected with a plastic bag and put in a bin. Dogs must also be kept in the back seat of cars and a net or barrier must be installed to ensure that the dog does not get to the front seat. Only licensed guide dogs are allowed on beaches, bars restaurants and shops. Dog owners will be held responsible for any damage or inconvenience caused caused by their pets. Fines will be applied to those who fail to comply with the new laws.

There is also a raft of new rules in relation to dangerous breeds where the owner must now apply for a special licence and the dog must be signed on to a special register in the town hall. These dogs must now wear a muzzle, have a special lead and they are not allowed to be walked close to concentrated gatherings of people such as schools, leisure areas, parks etc. A special warning notice must also be hung on the walls of a property which houses such dogs. It will no doubt take some time for the new laws to filter down to local law enforcement officers.

I am hoping to get a Spanish copy of the full bylaws on this issue when they are published and will report more at a future date. The town hall plans to circulate leaflets relating to the new laws in German and English and time will be given to allow people to adapt to the new requirements. I do hope this will not develop into another 'black-hole' of bureaucratic procrastination.





What is Pilates? By Viviana.

Pilates is a system of exercise and physical movement designed to stretch, strengthen, and balance the body. Invented by Joseph H. Pilates about 90 years ago, this method, increases lung capacity and circulation through deep, healthy breathing. Strength and flexibility, particularly of the abdomen and back muscles, coordination-both muscular and mental, are key components in an effective Pilates programme. Posture, balance, and core strength are all greatly increased. Joseph Pilates called this method "Contrology", and the goal was to control every muscle with the mind through movement. This method never isolates a muscle, it works all muscles as a whole creating equilibrium in the body. Bone density and joint health improve, and many experience positive body awareness for the first time. Pilates teaches balance and control of the body, and that capacity spills over into other areas of one's life. We can say that all ages can practise this method, so long as it is not forbidden by a doctor. Pregnancy or a recent operation could be such a case.

It is really important to understand that Pilates can be practised in two different ways: one is on the floor, specifically called "Pilates mat" and the other one is through special machines called, reformer, trapeze, Lader barrel and others.

A little bit of history...

Joseph H. Pilates was born in Germany, in 1880. A sickly child who suffered from asthma, rickets and rheumatic fever, he dedicated his entire life to becoming physically stronger. Joe began studying body-building, yoga and gymnastics, and by the age of 14 was fit enough to pose for anatomical charts. He came to believe that the "modern" life-style, bad posture, and inefficient breathing lay at the roots of poor health. In 1912 Pilates moved to England, earning a living as a boxer, circus-performer and self-defence trainer. During World War I the British authorities interned him with other German citizens in a camp in the Isle of Man, where he trained other inmates in fitness and exercises. Here the beginnings of the Pilates Method began to take shape. On the ship to America he met his future wife Clara. In New York they founded the first "Pilates" Studio which they originally called "Contrology". Joseph dies at the age of 87 in 1967, leaving the future of the method in his wife's hands and Romana Kryzanowska, a protégée of "Joe"...

Tax Tips

<u>Non-Residents</u>: You will no doubt be aware at this stage that the *Patrimonio* (Wealth Tax) has been abolished from the 1st of January 2008. However this particular tax is paid a year in arrears so you will still have to pay the tax for last year. The administration of this tax payment for non-residents has been a nice little earner for local solicitors. Their charges for this service are disproportionate to the amount of work involved. The government may still insist that non-residents pay something in tax towards deemed letting income. Rather than do this through solicitors I would recommend that you utilise the services of business such as a *gestor* or MAR Services, who advertise in this newsletter, and who provide a professional service at a reasonable cost. Always ask for a quotation first.

<u>Residents</u>: The new government's gift (bribe?) of 400 euro to income tax payers can now be availed of. If you are working and collect a regular wage or salary your allowances and tax paid should be adjusted accordingly. You will not receive a check for the 400 euro - it is not a rebate.

However if you are in receipt of a pension, say from the UK, you will be paying your income tax one year in arrears. Accordingly you will not receive the benefit of the 400 euro extra allowance until next year.

For those who are retired in Spain and paying income tax, but under the normal retirement age, it is worth remembering that all social security payments are deductible allowances from gross income. This may be worth checking out in instances where free health cover may be withdrawn or not renewed next year, and where private health insurance is too costly or does not cover existing ailments. Accordingly, depending on one's circumstances, it may be advantageous to just pay the social security. As an aside, not many people are aware that there is a little box in the Spanish Income Tax form, which when ticked, directs some of your tax paid to charities such as the Catholic Church, the Red Cross etc.

BANKS & BUILDERS

Grupo Santander, the massive Spanish banking group, has purchased the Alliance and Leicester bank for 1.575 billion \notin (a third of what it was worth in 2007), according to a statement to the Spanish stock market regulator CNMV. Alliance shareholders will get a Santander share for every three A&L shares held. It means a strengthening of the Spanish bank's position in the U.K., where it already purchased Abbey in 2004. The new plan would see the Alliance and Leicester merging with Abbey. The Magazine 'Euromoney' has named the Banco Santander, which is now one of the eight largest banks in the world, as the best bank in the world. The magazine praises its capacity for growth in today's context of a difficult market.

Generally the Spanish banks have been congratulating themselves for having escaped the 'Sub-Prime' debacle. This was not due to any clever investment decisions but rather the fact that the Bank of Spain prohibited the Spanish banks from dealing in off-balance sheet investments. Although the Spanish banks can feel good about this, the slump in both the construction and property markets, to which they are massively overexposed, has given them their own individual and long-term headache.

When a property is repossesed by a Spanish bank the house will usually go to a public auction. However if none of the bids reach 100% of the value of the mortgage, the Bank can keep the property and can then value the house at either the value of its mortgage or an arbitrary value placed on it by a surveyor, whichever is higher. The overvalued property is then kept on the Banks books as an 'asset' at an overvalued amount, or as is often the case, the property is off loaded to a newly created 'property company' 100% owned & financed by the bank.

In a market with falling housing prices this really means that the Spanish Bank's true financial state is a lot worse than the balance sheet would indicate.

The Spanish builder and real estate group, Martinsa Fadesa, one of the largest in the country, has suspended payments and presented plans for voluntary creditors – the Spanish equivalent of filing for bankruptcy protection, with debts in excess of 5.2 billion \in Although the group states that its assets are in the region 10.8 billion \in its true debt is thought to be more in the region of 7 billion \notin plus. The company cannot meet its interest payments and there are more than 12,000 families with uncompleted homes. Some 45 Spanish banks are also thought to be effected and it will take some time to unravel the banking sectors true exposure. The PSOE Socialist party has asked for clarification on the relationship of Carlos Vela, who was employed by the troubled builder Martinsa as the companies number 2, after it is alleged, he was key to the approval of a 1 billion \notin loan to the company while he was still employed by the Caja Madrid bank! Interestingly he had returned to Caja Madrid a few days before the bankruptcy protection was applied for in Martinsa.

It is also now known that Martinsa denied to the regulatory body, CNMV, The National Council for Market Values, as late as June this year, that the company was in a risky position or had any liquidity problems.
