
Say 'Hello' to Sofia.

'The wife not a tennis fan then?'

The BBVA bank is offering five-year sabbaticals to employees who have been with them for more than eight years and who are more than 33 years old. They are being offered 30% of their wage during the five years, and are being guaranteed a job to return to. The offer is made only to employees of the bank in Spain.

Hundreds of bank users in Spain have been surprised to see with the yearly revision of their mortgage rate that their payments have gone up, even though the Euribor rate has gone down. The ADICAE, the Association of Bank and Savings Bank users, say they have received an avalanche of complaints, and describe many cases as outright fraud. It comes as the Minister for Tax and the Economy, Elena Salgado, has warned that there are too many savings banks in the system. She said such a number was fine in a time of growth, but now is excessive. Spain's central bank, the Bank of Spain, has been encouraging many of the saving's banks to amalgamate. However all the saving's banks are still subject to a certain amount of local political control and there is a lot of 'heel-dragging.'

The newspaper El Mundo reported the case of the Sevilla man who has spent 11 months in prison for domestic violence he never committed. His wife lied with 8 false complaints against him when in fact she had injured herself with a blade.

With 73% of telephone numbers beginning with 6 already used, the Ministry for Industry in Spain is reported to be looking at assigning new mobile phone numbers which will begin with a 7. The new numbers are needed as Spain currently has 110 mobile phones per 100 residents, an ever increasing number of them with broadband internet access.

House sales in Spain fell by 33% year on year in the first quarter. The biggest reductions in sales have been seen in the regions of Cataluña, Balearics and Asturias. The average mortgage credit at the end of March stood at $124,316 \in 15.42\%$ lower than the year previously, and the average monthly mortgage payment in Spain over the first quarter of the year was down 11% at 740.90 \in

Visitors and residents in Marbella can now, in the case of theft or abandoned vehicles, etc, fill in a police report online. Information is available in several languages although the forms are in Spanish only. One still has to go to the police station within 72 hours to sign the report, but this saves enormous amounts of time and queuing etc. It would be excellent if they adopted this practise in our area as well.

The newspaper Público says that the Government is to authorise one pay per view channel on the TDT digital terrestrial television system to each operator on the system. The decision has upset the main pay per view company, Digital +. Prisa, the parent company of El País, Cuatro and Digital Plus, has said it will challenge the decision in court.

Two Poles have opened a bar in the coastal town of Cullera in Valencia, where they invite their clients to insult the waiters and barmen. Early signs are that the bar is a success, with the clients generally insulting the staff in Spanish, Polish, French and Romanian. Some locals have voiced opposition to the idea stating that 'what begins with an insult often ends up with violence'. If the insults are 'creative and fun' customers can win a free drink.

Alicante police anti-drug agents have confiscated a ton of cocaine found hidden inside a consignment of pineapples and yucca plants. The drug traffickers involved were based in Orihuela and intended to distribute the drug across the Valencia region and Europe.

The main opposition party, the PP, did well in Spain in the European elections. There was a fair bit of mud-slinging between the PSOE and the PP before the elections. The PP accused the PSOE of nepotism in Andalucia and corruption in Estepona; and what started off as an investigation into who bought the suits for Francisco Camps, the president of Valencia, (he says that he has mislaid the receipts) has now developed into a supreme court investigation of the PP treasurer, who is a member of the senate. In Spain, investigation of politicians depends on where they are in the pecking order. So a local mayor will face a different investigating body to that of a senator.

In relation to the UK, we hear that BNP leader Nick Griffin was outraged by a recent egg-throwing attack.

The National Court has found the Izquierda Unida Mayor of Puerto Real guilty of serious slander against the King of Spain for comments he made last year in a speech to celebrate the anniversary of the second republic. He described the monarch as 'corrupt', 'weak', and the 'son of a drunk'. The court said in its ruling that José Antonio Barroso's words went beyond political criticism, deeming them a 'personal insult' and has fined the Mayor almost $6,500 \in$ The prosecutor in the case had asked for almost $11,000 \in$ The money must come from Barroso's own pocket and cannot be paid from Town Hall funds.

One of my favourite stories last month: A local goat-herder camped outside the Town Hall in Salobreña in protest at a 10,000 \in fine for building an illegal shelter for his animals. The original fine, imposed four years ago, was 1,700 \in but, with the surcharges added on over the years, now comes to more than 10,000 \in Santiago Alonso had been setting up camp in the Town Hall square every day with his herd of 200 goats, and, as fellow goat-herders brought their herds along to the square to support their colleague's claim, numbers swelled to more than 1,000 animals. Santiago's house was then embargoed because of the unpaid fine and then he faced another problem – the cleaning costs for the mess left by the goats, plus fines from the local police and Guardia Civil. The father of two was reported to have turned down a payment plan offered by the Town Hall. An extraordinary council meeting on Wednesday, June 3, agreed that the Town Hall itself will pay the fine they imposed. The fine cannot be cancelled, but the money to pay it, at the proposal of the Mayor, will come out of the budget set aside for the political groups in the local corporation. The Town Hall building was closed for two days for fumigation after the departure of its fragrant guests. Goat power!

While the political row continues in Spain over the Prime Minister using a small military jet to get to campaign meetings for the European elections, Queen Sofía has been setting her own example. She took a Ryanair flight (costing 15 euro) to Standsted one Sunday evening to visit her sick brother in London. Bet she never came back with them! Naturally Ryanair were ungracious and milked the publicity element. They later apologised to the royal family.

In a rather poignant story, a mongrel bitch has been waiting outside the cemetery in Nerja since her Irish owner died and was buried inside two months ago. She spends the nights sleeping inside a niche. Some have tried to take her away, but she refuses to leave the body of her master, and the locals, who leave food out for it regularly, say that the animal is very docile and bothers nobody.

The Junta de Andalucía is hoping to encourage teenagers to stay on for further education after the age of 16 with a new grant which will be paid out for the first time this September. The teenagers will be paid 600 euro each month for ten months. The students must be out of work and not claiming unemployment benefit, and come from a low-income family. The junta has set aside 30 million euro for this. There are other eligibility requirements and the students academic performance has to be acceptable or the grant will be withdrawn.

The dreadful story of the Bolivian immigrant who lost an arm in an accident with a kneading machine while working illegally in a Valencia bakery got wide coverage in the press. He was working 12 hour days for $700 \in$ a month. The employer is alleged to have thrown his arm into the rubbish after the accident, dumped him 200 metres from the hospital, asking him not to say anything. The bakery was eventually closed and the migrant's two bosses were arrested. They are two brothers who own the factory and are accused of infringing the rights of workers. The government have now granted residence papers to the injured man and his family on humanitarian grounds.

The arrival of Domino's pizza in Spain has prompted the market leader, Telepizza, to offer extra products. The Spanish firm feeds some 500,000 across the country between 9pm and 11pm on an average Saturday night in Spain, and gives jobs to 16,000. It has now introduced new lines including hamburgers, chicken, kebabs, pastas and salads with the intention of 'completing all the family tastes in a single order'.

Bank branches in Spain are closing at a rate of two a day, and more than 300 have shut their doors over the past six months.

The Government is reported to be considering giving a 400 \in monthly payment to the unemployed who are not entitled to benefit. To be eligible for the scheme the person would have to take part in a training program. There are an estimated 1 million unemployed with no right to benefit in Spain currently. The measure would cost 120 million \in a month.

Guest Restaurant Review. Casa Alfonso Restaurant by Vivianne.

Located in Dehesa de Campoamor, Alfonso's is the only restaurant in this area which boasts a Michelin Star. As we were celebrating a special occasion, we decided to 'splash-out' for the evening.

When you approach Alfonso's, you see that it is a purpose-built almost circular one-story building. After leaving the entrance hallway, you enter a beautiful circular garden with lots of flowers and a fountain. Then through another hallway and into one of two dining rooms, which are beautifully decorated and furnished with large windows overlooking the garden.

In the restaurant, they offer the choice of an express menu for 40 \in per person and a tasting menu for 70 \in Alternatively you can choose from the a' la carte menu. This features a range of starters such as a salad for 12 \in , a rice dish for 16 \in or if you are feeling really extravagant, caviar at 175 \in

Mains on the a' la carte range feature steak or lamb at 26€ with desserts ranging from 9 to 12 €

We choose the express menu at 40 \in a head. This comprised around seven small courses or dishes.

First we were served an assortment of home-made breads with a small dish of extra virgin olive-oil. Delicious. In the past you were also given a glass of cava, but not unfortunately this time, possibly cut-backs. The night we were there, there was only one other couple dining. Next came a ball of cod mixed with squid, which was followed by a mixture of onion and black-pudding type sausage. This was followed by a *fois gras*, which was served on a sweetened bread with a small glass of sweet wine – gorgeous! Then we were served with a small pizza slice with anchovies and fish, which was followed by the main course, cheek of beef. The beef was served on its own without an accompaniment. Finally for dessert there was a lovely soufflé. Coffee was served later at $3 \in a$ cup.

Alfonso Egea, one of Spain's rapidly rising chefs, leads the team. The menus are changed regularly and the following are just a few of his other creations, clams with cream of potato and Iberian ham, wild sea bass in mustard and cockle sauce, pink pigeon with rice, wild mushrooms and pear, pineapple tart, coconut ice cream.

The service was excellent, with the waiters polite, attentive and as quiet as mice. All the wine and water was kept at a central table with the waiters topping up your glasses promptly when required. As well as our wine we had two glasses of water each – which the waiters just kept filling up – and we were surprised to see on the bill that we were charged 10€ for the four glasses of water! We thought the water was free as there were no prices for it in the menu. Wine is of course extra and they have a very extensive wine-list which would please the most demanding, with prices starting at $20 \in$ We settled for a pleasant red at $22 \in$

Good food, good wine, excellent service, surroundings and ambiance. A lovely experience for the special occasion, but not if you are on a tight budget!

Spanish Vignettes - Baby Jumping!

The Catholic festival of Corpus Christi is celebrated all over Spain with processions, mystery plays and a wide variety of popular celebrations.

A small village in Burgos province, in the north of Spain, is home to what is probably one of Spain's most bizarre festivals. It takes place every year in June as part of the Corpus Christi celebrations in the small village of Castrillo de Murcia, 41 km's from Burgos, in the north of Spain. Here, a character representing the Devil, known as '*El Colacho*', protects babies from his evil influence by leaping over rows of infants born during the previous twelve months, who lie on rows of mattresses in the street. (See images below.)

It's an event which dates back to the 1620's, and is organised by 'the *Cofradía del Santísimo Sacramento*' – 'the brotherhood of the Holy Sacrament'. The brotherhood, a very sombre bunch wearing black cloaks, have been organising the festival since the 1600's. They run a 'very tight ship' with the organisation and running of the festival, shepherding, badgering, harassing and corralling the locals and tourists. They also select the babies, for what is considered an honour. Every year, the fittest members are chosen for the honour of playing the part of *El Colacho* in the village's Corpus Christi festival.

Another takes on the role of *El Atabalero* who, dressed in a black suit and hat, beats on a massive drum as the processions wend their way through the streets of Castrillo de Murcia. *El Colacho*, his face covered with a grotesque mask, is dressed in a bright yellow and red outfit, and accompanies the beat of the drum by banging on an enormous castanet with a stick tipped with a tail of horse hair.

The most important day of the festivities is the Sunday, when locals decorate their homes with flowers and some set up small altars outside their houses, where those taking part in the procession will stop to partake of water and wine. It's in the afternoon procession that the symbolic defeat of evil takes place, when *El Colacho* rips off his mask and flees by leaping over the babies who then receive the blessing of the Holy Sacrament from the local priest. After the '*salto*' (jump or leap), the babies, now cleansed of evil, are showered with rose petals by children from the village who have received their First Communion.

The origins of this strange festival are somewhat obscure, but it's believed to date back to pagan times before it was Christianised with the twinning in 1621 of the *Cofradía del Santísimo Sacramento* and the *Cofradía de Minerva*. It's been held every year since then and now has the status of National Tourist Interest, this despite Pope Benedict asking the priests in Spain to distance themselves from the event.

(I see no reason why Dream Hills could not have its own festival of say... Mother-in-Law, annoying neighbours or politician jumping. The *Colachos* though should weigh more than 18 stone!)

The Spanish government, as governments do, waited until the European Elections were over to bring in some **extra taxation**. The normally cheap ciggies are now up by at least 35 cents a pack, while rolling tobacco has come in for a real hammering with 50 gram packs increasing from 3.20 to 4.60, a 43.75% increase! The tax on petrol has also gone up by 3 to 4 cents a litre. It is also likely that the government will withdraw the additional rebate/allowance of 400 euro introduced last year.

The liberalisation of **power suppliers** in Spain on July 1 has arrived without hardly any offers to make our monthly power bill any cheaper. The reason why most of the power companies have not issued any new offers to attract new clients is because they were waiting for the Government to fix a new maximum price. There was a 3.5% increase at the start of the year and the government have just announced a 2% increase from July 1. The price will be reviewed every quarter in line with the cost of raw materials and demand.

Carrefour, who have a three for two offer on many goods at the moment, plan to do away with plastic carrier bags at their hypermarkets. It will be done over a period of time. In Spain the average use of plastic bags per resident is 238 a year. These bags take 400 years to decompose and only 10% of them are ever recycled.

Motoring - Changes in the Law

The DGT traffic authority in Spain is to hand out 40 million extra licence points to some 21 million good drivers from next month. Those with a clean record since the points system was introduced will get two extra points, taking them to 14, and if they continue for another three years they will get an extra point to reach 15. The most common fine remains for speeding, followed by not wearing a seat belt, and not having the correct measures in place for the protection of children. Driving over the limit and using a mobile phone comes next.

Congress is now debating, and is expected to approve, new changes as part of the new Highway Code – *Ley de Seguridad Vial*. This is a whole raft of new measures and of course fines. Parking in a disabled area will cost you a 200 €fine, as will driving while programming the GPS system. Points will no longer be taken from drivers who break the speed limit but who go no faster than 130 kms/hour on motorway access roads to cities, and it also will no longer be obligatory for drivers to carry all their car's documents in the vehicle. The term 'negligent driving' remains but no longer results in the loss of points.

Radar detection systems will be legal in Spain under the new rules, but installing electronic apparatus which makes the DGT speed traps ineffective is now prohibited. Current insurance cover is to be required as an additional point of the ITV/MOT test. Money generated by traffic fines will now be ring-fenced to finance more road safety, and discounts of up to 50% will be available for the 'pronto pago', with on the spot payment with a credit card introduced for the first time. Another section of the new law includes setting fixed quantities for traffic fines: 100 euro for minor infractions, 200 euro for serious and 500 wuro for very serious offences.

One of the ideas behind the new law is to unify the criteria set out by the different administrations which penalise the same offence differently.

More on this when it comes to light.

Malaga Madness?

Between June and September the Costas attract crowds of tourists and they in turn attract the pickpockets. "Some manage to get away with a fortune", said one chief inspector of the National Police. The Malaga Provincial Court has defended the move by pointing out that the convict is down on the civil registry as a female. However, the public prosecutor's office has criticised the "illogical" decision, pointing out that the rapist is a pre-op transsexual (he still has male genitalia) and his victims are always female. The prisoner had wanted to undergo a sex change operation but several preliminary medical and psychological tests deemed him to have a personality disorder.

The Malaga Provincial Court considers that to keep the prisoner among male inmates would be to "discriminate" against him.
