Bienvenido to the start of the fourth year of the Dream Scene. This month's issue almost had to be delayed due to Tid's spinal operation and continuing recovery. Her thanks for all the cards and messages. Thank you also to the neighbours who volunteered to help with this issue if required.

Torrevieja now plans to build 20 thirty-story tower blocks along the beach front. The council gave approval for the blocks to be erected in six areas next to the beach; however, this decision still requires the approval of the Generalitat Valencian Government. A number of applications for high-rises have been rejected in the past. The areas concerned are reported to be Campico San Mamés between the Acequión beach and the International Marina, the Playa de los Náufragos, the Curva del Palangre, next to the Los Locos beach, or Las Lomas in La Mata. The decision was made by the PP, who hold a majority in the town council, with the opposition parties all voting against it. No doubt many existing sea views will be ruined by these developments.

This of course will do nothing for the aesthetics of the area - look at Benidorm - a hodgepodge of ugly high-rise buildings shoehorned into every available space. Regrettably, as the Spanish have too often illustrated, they have no interest in the environment unless it is concrete. Even if approval is granted, it could be some years before work commences.

Torrevieja has announced the date and timings of the processions for Semana Santa, Holy Week. All the processions depart from the Inmaculada Church in Constitution Square at the following times -


Palm Sunday, 28th March 10.00 am; 29th, 30th and 31st, all at 10.00 pm; April 1st (silent procession) 11.00pm; Good Friday April 2 7.30pm; Sat April 3 10.00pm - Tamborada - the noisy one, bring a drum!; and finally Easter Sunday, April 4 at 7.45 am - Domingo de Resurreción. Although these parades/processions do not have a carnival atmosphere, they are very impressive and can be quite moving, a touch of the real Spain.

Don't forget, Mother's Day is on March 14th and St. Patrick's Day is on March 17th. (There is a little known Spanish by-law which states that, if you see an Irishman on March 17th, you have to buy him a drink or pay a fine.....honest!!!)

The main topic in the Spanish press during last month was, as you would expect, the state of the economy. The government believe that the economy will shrink this year by a further 0.3%. This is at odds with the European Commission and the IMF who believe that the shrinkage will be double that at 0.6%. When it appeared that the British media were linking the Spanish and Greek economies, the Minister for Tax and the Economy, Elena Salgado, raced to London to demonstrate the underlying strength of the economy. The charm offensive worked but the Economist has now stated that 'It's the moment for the Prime Minister to show leadership', and considers that the main concern of the Spanish Government is avoiding any social unrest resulting from the state of the economy. The magazine says that José Luis Rodríguez Zapatero is practicing 'political zapping' with his policies, and until now has used tactical movements to placate the unions, the autonomous regions, and lastly the markets concerned about the debt.

The government is now looking at pensions in Spain and may extend the normal retirement age from 65 to 67. It may also heavily restrict early retirement. The unions, who are very unhappy with all of this, have planned a number of demonstrations, the ones to date being poorly supported. The government says it plans to replace only one in ten of the civil servants who will retire in the future. The cutback in central Government spending because of the crisis has been greeted with alarm in Alicante province. Minister for Development, José Blanco, has given an undertaking that the only project which will remain untouched are the plans to bring the AVE high speed train to Alicante. However there are now doubts on the progress of other works in our province including the extension to the airport, the Júcar-Vinalopó water transfer, the desalination plant in Torrevieja and road improvements between Ibi and Alcoy.

Foreigners now make up 42% of the surgery patients at the District Hospital in Torrevieja. The largest group is the British, who made up 16% of the 22,640 operations carried out in the hospital in 2009. Next group, but with no more than 5% of the total, come the Germans, then the Norwegians and Moroccans.

Next time you forget to pay our 'lekky' bill don't be too embarrassed. The Iberdrola power company on Wednesday cut the electricity supply to some of the annexe offices of Madrid City Hall in the Junta de la Latina, because of an unpaid bill of 12 million €in the Ayuntamiento. The municipal offices were without power for several hours according to reports. The Ayuntamiento says that it is not a liquidity problem - yes I'm sure they are sitting on 12 million euro in petty cash!

Vatican sources have confirmed that Pope Benedict XVI will visit Barcelona before the end of this year to dedicate the central nave of the Church of the Holy Family (Sagrada Familia Expiatorio). The church is probably better known to you as the 'Antonio Gaudi Church' having been designed and worked on by the famous architect. Work started on the church about 127 years ago and is still not completed. Millions of visitors visit the cathedral, 2.7 million visitors last year.

The Catalan Government are continuing to be a pain-in-the-ass about their language. Many Catalans do not consider themselves to be Spanish. This has led to a strong but peaceful independence movement over the years. There is a lot of what they would refer to as 'positive discrimination' against the main Spanish language, which is Castilliano. Heavy fines are issued if signs are not written in Catalan. At least 50% of the movies being shown in Cataluna must now by law be dubbed or signed in Catalan. The public is being urged to inform on businesses which are not adhering to the new laws relating to the language.

Last year 414,811 homes were sold across the country. The number of property sales in Spain fell by 24.9% in 2009 according to the National Statistics Institute. The Bank of Spain has given instructions to banks and savings banks across the country to reduce the value of their real estate assets by 20%. However it appears that some savings banks do not have the sufficient reserves to meet the request.

The Spanish residential rental market used to be one of the slowest in Europe. However since the start of the real estate crash in 2007, rentals are zooming up. In Madrid and Barcelona, apartment rentals have increased in volume by 213% and 243% respectively, particularly at the lower end of the market. Since 2007, the number of properties available to rent at less than 1,000 euro per month has increased by 663% in Barcelona and 413% in Madrid. The number of rental properties is expected to grow nationally during 2010 and rental prices are also expected to ease further. (Source:El País)

653,173 new mortgages were granted over 2009, 21.9% fewer than in 2008. Banks and savings banks lent nearly 40 billion less over the year.

Spain has paid a five million dollars ransom to Al Qaeda terrorists in the Magreb (North Africa) for the release of the three Catalan aid workers. The payment was made, allegedly, by a British ex-intelligence officer.

Despite the 'thrower' being given a $\pounds 2,100$ fine for cruelty last year, this year's Fiesta of Día de San Blas again took place in the Jaén village of Cazalilla. During the fiesta a a hen turkey is thrown off the top of the local church tower, a height of 35 metres. The person who catches the turkey as it falls is said to have a year's good luck. This year's winner, a 21-year-old, showed that the turkey was not injured and said that the turkey would now live to a ripe old age on the family land.

Although the Spanish economy may be decending into a 'black-hole,' this did not stop the Spanish MPs taking a 48-day Christmas break, returning to work on February 9. They should not find the return too taxing as between Feb 9 and June they are expected to sit for only 45 days in Congress (Parliament). Crisis! What crisis?

The Catholic church expects to collect 252.6 million \in from the revenue authorities in Spain this year. This is due to the option taxpayers have of having part of their tax paid to the church and not to the *Hacienda*.

The Spanish Supreme Court has ordered the annulment of several clauses in the contracts for credit cards, loans and mortgages, taken by clients of the Santander, BBVA, Bankinter and Caja Madrid banks, as they may be 'abusive', disproportionate' or 'confusing'. In particular the Court will not accept any clause which exempts the banks of all responsibility in the case of the theft of the card. They have also described restrictive clauses which stop the owners of mortgaged property generating an income from it as 'abusive'. Also a bank cannot cancel a mortgage and call in the loan on a whim.

The Guardia Civil from San Juan de Azalfarnache in Sevilla have denounced a man for riding a children's toy tricycle 'in a dangerous fashion'. The rider was coming down a slope in the El Manchón Industrial Estate in Sevilla 'at full speed and without lights' in the early hours of Monday morning. The agents stopped the rider who was on 'a non-catalogued vehicle', and said that he was 'putting his own and the lives of others at risk'. This policeman (as well as the cyclist) is obviously a special kind of idiot. Can you imagine the ribbing he must be getting from his colleagues?

The bumper olive harvest and wide distribution resulted in a collapse of olive oil prices. Producers are now getting only 1.90 euro per kilo. It would be nice to see the fall reflected in supermarket prices!

The newspaper ABC reports that the PP has accused Laura Seara, who is director of the Spanish Women's Institute, of fiddling her expenses. She has been claiming mileage and 31.000 € for petrol, but the paper reports that she does not have a driving licence! (Probably a broomstick!)

The president of SGAE, (which is similar to the Performing Rights Society in the UK) Eduardo Bautista, is retiring in May. He will get a pension of 24,500 \in a month! The SGAE are very aggressive in the collection of fees/dues. They charged one hotel more than 2,000 euro for playing music during a wedding reception. No doubt in time they will visit the bars and restaurants on the Costas and they will have a hay-day.

The PP spokesman in Congress on Road safety, Nacho Uriarte, has been involved in a traffic accident when he collided with a stationary car at a traffic light while he was drunk. He was twice over the legal limit and has now resigned.

A judge in Cádiz has ordered a man to leave his home for three years because he was too noisy; for the past few years the owner of a flat on the third floor used to play his music or radio at full volume both day and night. He had already received several warnings from the police who, on one occasion, taped-up his stereo system. The judge considered the complaint placed by the community of owners as 'totally justified' as it disturbed their right to sleep and rest.

A 27 year old priest who has only been in the priesthood for less than a year has been suspended by the Catholic Church in Noez y Totanés near Toledo. It appears that the he has spent $17,000 \in$ on erotic phone calls and internet pages with sexual content and in local brothels. It seems he took the money from the 'brotherhood' funds (these are the lay organisations who organise religious fiestas etc) which the diocese will now have to reimburse. A woman who lived alone in the Canaries has died and left 9 million euro to three animal charities. 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Electrickery!

Well, it seems that *Catweazel* was correct after all. If you went to Pilar de Horadada to sign a new electricity contract in order to save some money, it was not only a waste of petrol but you may have also inadvertently 'signed-up' for a higher than normal increase as well!

Whether you have a 3.3 kw or a 5.5kw supply the old rate charged per kw was 11.473 cents.

If you had NOT signed a new contract, the new rate charged for January was 11.7759 cents per kw, the scheduled 2.64% increase. However, after checking a number of neighbours' bills who have signed new contracts at Pilar, I have found that in all these, their kw charge has been increased to 12.1113 cents per kw, more than twice the advertised increase! So if you signed a new contract you are probably paying a higher rate than those of us who have not.

Thousands of people have signed new contracts believing that they would be spared increases this year. The power of groundless gossip. (Also, if you are on the 'green' tariff - Factura de Energia Verde - marked on the top right hand corner of your bill, you will be paying an even higher rate.) Microsoft comes to Torrevieja

Despite lobbying from at least eleven other locations in Valencia, Microsoft has now decided to locate its Health Innovation Centre in Torrevieja. Camps, the president of the Valencia region, originally preferred the centre to be located in Valencia. but at a meeting with him in Seattle in mid-Feb, Microsoft confirmed that they have opted for Torrevieja as the location; Microsoft executives had already visited the Torrevieja Hospital on Feb 5th, which uses its specialist software "Not yet," said the little boy. The new works on the N332 on Orihuela Costa have now been completed, but Torrevieja have scarcely touched theirs, which means a bottleneck in busy times. What is scandalous though is the state of the road by Inspiration and Lago Jardin 2. It has so many potholes, it looks like one of those bomb-cratered landscape photos from WW1! Again this road is Torry's responsibility not Orihuela Costas. Torry appear to be more concerned about their new sports' complex and music conservatory, which are scheduled to open next month. Torrevieja intend to spend 10 million euros on resurfacing its roads. Not all roads will be repaired and although the roads in Lago Jardin 1 & 2 and Los Balcones are not included in the first phase of resurfacing, they will be done at a later stage, or so they say.

The exterior metal frame for the new Mercadona supermarket in Los Balcones has now been erected. Works to the exterior of the small commercial centre by DH2 are now almost completed and judging by the layout there may be space for some very small retail units at the front. 300 pine tree (seedlings) have now been planted by the council in what used to be the rubbish dumping area between Entre Golf and the motorway.

There have been a number of robberies and attempted robberies in the lower half of Dream Hills last month. Do not drop your vigilance and watch out for strangers. A villain, nicknamed 'Mono Azul' or Blue Monkey by the police, has been responsible for five armed robberies in a month in the Rojales - Quesada - Benijofar area. The History of Spain , Part 13 - Other New World Discoveries .

It is somewhat ironic that Columbus never set foot on the American mainland, north or south. He did however catch sight of Venezuela and came within 30 miles of Panama, just a whisker from discovering the other great ocean, the Pacific. Another Italian, Giovanni Caboto (known in English as John Cabot), received support from the Italian community in London and from King Henry V11 of England, enabling an expedition which left Bristol reaching the coast of North America, probably Newfoundland, on June 24, 1497. On his return to England, the king gave Cabot a reward of £10!

For almost a generation, Spanish exploration restricted itself to the Caribbean. It was not until April 1513, that Juan Ponce de León, a Spanish explorer, stepped ashore on the North American mainland. He named it *La Florida* in recognition of the plush landscape and because it was the Easter season, which the Spaniards called *Pascua Florida*.

In September 1513, Vasco Nuńez de Balboa, a Spanish conquistador and explorer crossed the Isthmus of Panama, braving snakes, insects, swamps, diseases and hostile natives. On September 25, after climbing a ridge on the western side of the Isthmus he sighted a great 'south sea.' Balboa was a colourful character who escaped from his creditors in Santo Domingo in 1509 by stowing away in a barrel with his dog, on a boat bound for Panama. His dealings with the natives in the Isthmus ranged from humanitarian to savage. One one occasion he saw a large group of natives males dressed in women's clothing and practising homosexual acts; he had 40 of them - some of them the native king's brothers - torn to pieces by his dogs. Although Balboa was made Governor of Panama, his scheming and jealous father-in-law has him arrested on 'trumped-up' charges and beheaded for treason in March 1519.

Although Balboa suffered a premature death, his actions and deeds are honoured by history. Several parks and avenues throughout Panama bear the name "Vasco Núñez de Balboa," and a number of monuments honour his discovery of the 'South Sea.' The Panamanian currency is called the Balboa, and his likeness appears on the obverse of some coins. His name is also attached to Panama City's main port, Balboa. Parks in San Francisco and San Diego are named after him, as is a street and underground station in Madrid. A lunar crater also bears his name.

In 1519, the Portuguese explorer, Ferdinand Magellan, left Spain on a historic voyage financed by Castilla, which would be the first circumnavigation of the globe. After rounding Cape Horn in 1520, he renamed the 'South Sea', the Pacific Ocean, because of its calm waters.

Meanwhile, in the Eastern Mediterranean, the status quo was preserved by the Turks, when the navy of the Ottoman Empire soundly defeated the Venetian fleet at the Battles of Zonchio (1499) and Modon (1500), often referred to as the first and second battles of Lepanto. This enabled the Turks to continue to control the spice trade to Europe and make any attempt by Western Europe to trade with the east both dangerous and expensive. This of course stimulated much interest in a new 'Atlantic' route. A shrewd Queen Isabella announced that 'all those lands discovered and yet to be discovered, conquered or yet to be conquered, shall remain in possession of my kingdom of Castilla and Leon.'

Meanwhile King Ferdinand used his sons and daughters to cement alliances with the remainder of Europe. Their daughter Princess Isabel was married to Alonso, the heir to the Portuguese throne, and at a famous double wedding, Juan, the Spanish male heir, married the Habsburg, Princess Margaret, while his sister Juana was wed to Archduke Philip (Margaret's brother), the Habsburg heir. Another daughter, Catherine of Aragon married King Henry V111 of England and gave birth to Mary Tudor, the future queen. However, you will probably recall that Ferdinand and Isabella were first cousins and their offspring ensured that the various royal families of Europe would, in due course, be effected by differing degrees of madness for many generations.

Unfortunately none of the Catholic Monarchs' children would rule Spain. The male heir, Prince Juan, loved his new red-haired wife so passionately (and often) that the royal doctors encouraged the newlyweds to sleep apart temporarily. Queen Isabella refused to intervene saying that 'She could not pull apart what God had joined.' Within a few weeks Prince Juan collapsed and died from sexual excess.

Next in line to the throne was Juana who was married to Philip the Fair of Burgundy. Philip, the Habsburg heir, was a notorious womaniser while his new wife is said 'to have boasted few attractions.' She was madly in love with Philip but descended into despair and madness when confronted by his many affairs. The royal heiress soon acquired the the name Joanna the Mad (Juana la loca) and there was no way that Isabella was going to allow a lunatic to take the Castilian throne on her death..

You will recall that although all unconverted Jews were banished from Spain in 1492, the Moors were given various guarantees and freedom to practise their religion following the surrender of Granada in the same year. A remarkable cleric and soldier called Cardinal Gonzalo Jimenez de Cisneros secured the influential position of confessor to Queen Isabella. He was a fiery and brave character who launched many clerical reforms including enforcement of the celibacy laws; a very unpopular reform which caused more than a thousand monks to flee to Morocco with their mistresses! He was a ruthless persecutor of the Moors and personally led armies against the Muslims in Oran and Tripoli, North Africa. Now only 10 years after the fall of Granada and under his influence, Queen Isabella withdrew all the guarantees and assurances given to the Moors, and in 1502 demanded that all Muslims in Castilla either convert to Catholicism or go into exile. Her husband, Ferdinand, a much more pragmatic royal, refused to extend the ruling to Aragon.
