Bienvenido a todos.

After a remarkably dry December, 42% less rainfall than normal, January also turned out to be an excellent month with temperatures often in the low 20's. However, from January 19, we have been experiencing some very strong northerly winds. These have caused extensive damage throughout Spain; two men being killed in Cartagena when a wall was blown down onto them and a woman in Badajoz died after her house-gate fell on her. Palm trees, shed-roofs, signs, and indeed anything not strong or firmly secured collapsed in the wind. Even the large Alcampo sign at Zenia Boulevard is now being supported by a large 'cherry-picker.' If you had a canvas gazebo in your garden, it is now probably somewhere in North Africa.....or the Med'!

Looking back at last year, the economy was also just as stormy and problematic. Unfortunately, 2013 has not started any better. There are now six million unemployed in Spain, more than 26% of the population. Inflation is around 3% and may increase due to a swathe of price increases announced in early January. The electricity continues its upward climb with an increase of 3%; road-tolls are up 3.3%; Renfe train-tickets are also up 3%; your Telefonica standing-charge is now increased by 2.9%, but this is the first increase in five years, and cigarettes are up by around 20 cents per packet. But the one increase which leaves me flummoxed, is the increase in the IVA rate on new builds from 4 to 10%! The tax relief on housing was also removed in January. No respite here for the builders and buyers.

But these difficult times have also brought an increase in the human 'cockroaches.' There is a marked increase in the incidence of overcharging by 'gas engineers.' They are now targeting non-Spanish names in the phone books and pestering them. Not only Brit's but Dutch and Scandinavians as well. They tell the victim that their 'gas certificate' has expired and needs to be renewed. If you fall for it, you will end up paying several hundred euros, whereas the cost of the replacement plastic tubing is just a handful of euros and is a simple job to do. It is probably best to be rude and slam the phone down. These are, after all, con-artists. Similarly with car maintenance and repair; even the big name garages will often 'pad' the bills of expat's. This is not paranoia as I am aware that several of my friends have been 'taken for a ride.' Demand the price up-front before any work is undertaken. Unfortunately when it comes to money matters in Spain, or indeed anywhere else, the meek don't inherit the earth!

You also need to be tough with your bank. If your account is continually in credit with a reasonable turnover, you should not be paying any charges. The banks do have special offers and 'freebies' but will rarely offer them unless you ask for them. There is an old Spanish saying that sums it up: "*El que no llora, no mama*", which could be translated as, "The baby will not be fed until he cries", or "If you don't ask, you don't get." If they are unhelpful, move your account.

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

The IMF on Wednesday said it had revised its economic growth forecast for Spain slightly downward for this year, predicting that the recession in 2013 would be wider than in 2012, with Spain missing out on what is expected to be a gradual global upturn.

PM Rajoy has said that his forthcoming program would be 'the most ambitious and intense agenda' ever seen in Spain, and he considered that things will improve in the second half of 2013.

Four regional governments (Catalonia, Andalucia, Murcia and Valencia) went over their annual deficit objective in Q3, Murcia being the worst offender. Some regions could post a surprise finish. Castille-La Mancha, for example, has made major spending cuts by deferring expenditures until the end of the year. Both the obvious overspending by these four regions and the more subtle attempts to hide overspending by the other regions show that the regions are still not undergoing the required reforms and are hoping to get out of trouble by playing the victim or cheating the system. But these ploys are self-deceiving, because they overlook the fact that Minister of Finance Montoro has promised the EU that Spain would meet its deficit objectives. And if it does not, then the EU will intervene. (El Economista)

The businessman Miguel Angel Flores, promoter of the Halloween party in Madrid Arena, is now free after posting bail of $\notin 200,000$ within hours of it being set. He is being investigated following the death of five youths at his grossly overcrowded disco.

Carlos Fabra, the President Aerocas - the concession holder for Castellon Airport - announced the "imminent" sale of the Airport to Libyan owned investment company, for the sum of 200 million. The airport, which has not yet had a commercial flight and which "officially opened" in March 2011, had swallowed up $\oiint{3}8$ million by the end of December 2011, according the Government Audit Office. But then just two weeks later it emerged that the Libyan story was rubbish. The President of the Generalitat Valenciana, Alberto Fabra, announced that if the sale of Castellon Airport did not go ahead by the end of February, the facility would be managed and operated under the direct management of Aerocas. Fabra of course is president and no doubt will require more funding! But still, no planes! Meanwhile the facility has been rented out to a car racing team who were charged $\oiint{1},000$ per day.

It's much the same story at Corvera Airport. The concession holder here, Aeromur, intends to refinance the €200 million loan it was awarded by a consortium of banks in order that they could complete the project. When the loan was awarded in 2010 it was agreed that the repayment would be made in full - plus interest - within 3 years of the airport becoming operational. Given that the originally agreed date for opening has been delayed by more than 2 years it is perhaps understandable that the Banks are keen to recoup their investment. The new terms of the loan are expected to demand full repayment - plus interest - by 2015, regardless of whether the facility is operational or not. The question now is whether the airport is capable of generating enough revenue to successfully repay the loan and make a profit.

The Association of Inspectors at the Bank of Spain, which covers 80 percent of the professionals at the lender, has produced a damning report about the institution's practices, including the accusation that when evidence of wrongdoing is discovered in Spanish banks, "the usual reaction is to look the other way." The new governor of the Bank of Spain, Luis Linde, announced in July 2012 that a commission would be created to investigate the failings of the institution. Under its watch, a number of regional savings banks have been blighted by cases of corruption, while the taxpayer has had to stand by and watch as the government spends billions of euros of public money shoring up the banks, whose balance sheets were devastated after the collapse of the country's construction sector. The Spanish Central Government has taken the decision to make a number of cuts to medium-distance train routes and replace them with buses in an attempt to make financial savings. Medium-distance trains - those with journeys of not more than 100km - account for around 52% of the Spanish railway network and scheduled journeys, but are used by less than 16% of the country's population. The proposal is expected to save the country around €51 million, according to Government sources. The Autonomous Communities can still take the decision to keep such routes and journeys open, however they must meet the cost.

Over 49,400 Spaniards found jobs in Germany last year, an increase of 15.8 percent over 2011. Spain is loosing over 2,000 jobs a day because of the economic crisis and spending cuts.

Over 300 public health-centre directors across the Madrid region formally handed in their resignations after agreeing last month to step down *en masse* in protest at the regional government's plans to privatise some medical services in Madrid. The resignations will take effect when the privatisation process starts, according to the documents the doctors have signed. The 322 directors, including head nurses and administrative chiefs, will keep their jobs in the public health sector but will give up their supervisory positions at facilities across the region. At the same time, some 3,000 health professionals at 166 centres have also stated that they will give up their positions on special committees that oversee vaccines, prescriptions drugs and patient care.

Cement demand in Spain recorded its biggest yearly drop in 2012 since the outbreak of the country's Civil War in 1936 and is expected to tumble another 20% this year in the wake of the property crash, official data showed. Cement consumption fell by 1/3 to 13.5 million tonnes in 2012 compared to 20.4 million tonnes in 2011. (Reuters)

The tax amnesty offered by the Hacienda was not as successful as the government had hoped. Although 618 companies and 29,065 individuals benefited from the amnesty, only \triangleleft 2 billion was raised in place of the planned \triangleleft 5 billion. The amnesty, which ended in December 2012, offered a fine of just 10% of the capital reported with no questions asked. Around \triangleleft 0 billion has been repatriated, but the actual fines were nowhere near that they should have been - \triangleleft billion!

The Unió Democrática de Cataluña (UDC) — one of the political partners in the ruling Catalonia CiU bloc — was found guilty of diverting €388,483 from a fund set up to train the unemployed in the region into their own accounts.

The Organization for Economic Cooperation and Developmen (OECD) Working Group on Bribery, established in 1999 to monitor alleged bribery and illicit payments to government officials, has criticised Spain as being one of the worst offenders reporting that Spain had failed to launch a single prosecution for bribery during the last 13 years, and had initiated only seven investigations. "Spain must vigorously pursue foreign bribery allegations and strengthen its legal framework for fighting bribery by addressing gaps in its Penal Code," the working group said.

Farmers with orange and lemon orchards, particularly in the Vega Baja region, are complaining about the poor prices their crops are attracting at the moment. They say that it costs between 17 and 20 cents to grow and pick a kilo of oranges or lemons. However, wholesalers are now only paying around 10 cents per kilo for them. The Vega Baja Region accounts for 69% of the sweet orange production in the Alicante Province, which is itself the main producer of sweet oranges in Spain.

The Faculty of Medicine of the University of Valencia has installed frequency inhibitors to prevent students from copying in exams using electronic devices. It is rumoured that some mobile devices were used for exam cheating in previous years. Let's hope that your new doctor wasn't one of them.

The Civil Guard have arrested an employee of a restaurant in Benidorm that duplicated credit cards of customers and subsequently made purchases through the Internet worth €,750. Seven victims of the scam have been located to date.

A court martial will try six military officials for allegedly diverting nearly €300,000 in Ministry of Defence funding. The money was meant to buy cafeteria food for the San Hermenegildo military student residence in Seville for the period 2005-2009. Two colonels, two majors, one captain and a sub-lieutenant, as well as two businessmen, face up to six years in prison. The judge's report notes that while students complained repeatedly about going hungry, the officers received gourmet food worth thousands of euros from the suppliers, who provided fake invoices in order to obtain ministry funds.

Burt it seems the Armada are at it as well. Two Spanish Navy corporals have each been sentenced to five years in prison for trafficking 224 kilos of hashish from Ceuta to the coast of Cádiz in 2008. The two sailors used the navy's P-114 patrol boat to transport the packages, valued at €318,000, from the Spanish North African exclave to the Carraca naval base in San Fernando. Occasional convictions for drug trafficking by armed forces personnel do occur, but almost never come to light because of the confidential nature of the military code in contrast to the criminal and civil codes.

Local police in Castellón arrested a 45-year-old German lorry driver. The driver, who was noticeably drunk, stopped to ask a pedestrian for directions, who reported him. The driver, who was driving a massive heavy-goods vehicle, was six times the legal alcohol limit and it was only 2:30 in the afternoon!

A 30-year-old woman has been arrested in Alicante for threatening a local rugby team. It seems her romantic approaches were spurned by one of the players and she did not take it very well. It is alleged that she went on-line to various forums, threatening the team with murder; insulted and slandered them and may also be responsible for painting insults and threats in the toilets and sports' facilities where they train. She used the on-line name 'Satan' and although she used different internet-cafes to post the threats, the police managed to track her down. Beware! A woman scorned......etc!

El Mundo held an online poll with the question, 'Do you think justice is more lenient with corrupt politicians than with other criminals? 99%, several thousand, said 'Yes!'

The National Police have arrested a 45-yar-old woman after she drove over her 52-year-old husband deliberately and repeatedly in a supermarket car-park in Malaga. Ecuador has presented a legal suit against Spain at the European Court of Human Rights over the Iberian nation's eviction legislation. Ramiro Rivadeneira, the Ecuadorian public defender, told a press conference in Madrid that Spain was "violating the right to justice" of Ecuadorian nationals resident in the country and called on Strasbourg to modify the Civil Procedure Law. The injustices within the Spanish mortgage law has been highlighted in these columns many times. Ecuadorian authorities calculate that as many as 15,000 of its citizens in Spain are affected by either eviction processes or mortgage-payment problems. What a pity that David Cameron, Enda Kenny and Jens Stoltenberg are not similarly motivated to protect the interests of their own citizens abroad.

A number of the congregation in a Catalan church were recently rendered comatose; however, on this occasion it was not down to the anaesthetizing effect of the sermon. Around 35 people were poisoned by carbon monoxide during a concert held in the parish church of San Vincente de Gualba (Barcelona). It occurred during the Winter Festival of the municipality. Of the 100 people who attended the concert, 10 were taken to hospital and just one was kept overnight. Reports that Country 'n Western music was the cause of the poisoning are unfounded.

More serious however is the perceived cutting of services and funds to the coastal residents. The closure of the National Police presence at the Playa Flamenca town hall has meant that anyone applying for a *residencia* or for a renewal, will now have to make three trips to Orihuela. The reason the police left was because the mayor, Monserrate Guillén, withdrew the clerk who was assisting the police. I have no doubt that this will be corrected quickly. But if not, we will all know where we stand with Orihuela.

Further disregard for expats came when Pepa Ferrando, now president of Orihuela PP revealed her 70-strong candidate list for their local government if they win the next election. There is not one non-Spanish European on the list. So much for integration!

You may recall earlier entries concerning the sale of council land in Orihuela Costa. The council planned to 'asset strip' the vacant council-owned land on the Costa to raise over €100 million. However the sale was a failure with only land to the value of €1.2million being realised. Prior to the land sales, the Coast was promised that it would get 40% of the funds realised, 30% for the city and 30% for the surrounding areas. However, the councillor responsible for the sale, Antonia Moreno of the Socialists, has insisted that the funds received be invested in the redevelopment of a single street in Orihuela only, the Avenida de Teodomiro! What is it about politicians and promises? I recall the words of President Charles de Gaulle who said, 'Since a politician never believes what he says, he is quite surprised to be taken at his word.'

The problem with selling plots on the coast means that there will be no land available if and when the council attempts to improve the facilities for the coastal residents. Councillor Moreno now wants to sell plots from the protected Sierra Escalona area near Orihuela, which 'the Greens' and the other parties will hopefully vote against. But the developers have no real appetite for large projects at present. Torrevieja recently failed to sell even one of 22 plots it hoped to attract more hotels to the area. Developers were even allowed to have up to 30 stories on favourable terms in privileged areas.

The mobile telephone scandal in Torrevieja continues to grow. Graham Knight from the Foreigner's Office there is alleged to have spent 1,120 on his mobile during a single weekend in the UK. It then transpired that Torrevieja have been paying 400,000 annually on their mobile and fixed line service. However, no contract was ever signed and there were no competitive quotes solicited for the service. What a way to run a business!

The Revival disco just outside Los Montesinos may be familiar with those of you under 30. It seems it has been operating without a licence for 17 years and the authorities are getting a bit 'pissed-off' with it. There has been an attempt to close it down which is a shame as it is the best disco on the coast, particularly if you are into 'techno.' Sunday, December 30, saw an unusual event in Orihuela - a charity football match between the local bullfighters and the local police. Not sure what the final result was but I hear that some policemen may have been gored and some bullfighters were injured after 'falling down the stairs.'

Combating the Crisis.

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Faced with savage cut-backs, large IVA increases, evictions and dwindling demand generally, growing numbers of people throughout Spain are taking matters into their own hands, staging small acts of resistance and coming up with creative ways to encourage customers.

Locksmiths in Pamplona have refused to work with the authorities to carry out evictions. Although locksmiths are usually not required until after an eviction has taken place, Iker de Carlos, spokesman for the city's 15 locksmith, companies, says that in many cases locksmiths are required occupants are still inside, judicial chain by which to pay the making them the final link in the the banks recover properties from people unable to pay

"When you see it on the relevision it is different to when you turn up at an eviction and you know you are helping to throw somebody out of their home; that will stay with you forever," he says.

"We know this isn't exactly going to start the revolution, but it might just provide the spark that Navarre needs to come up with solutions to this unfair situation," says De Carlos, pointing out that the law still allows for banks to recover properties by force if necessary.

Following the lead of their colleagues in Pamplona, the Union of Security Locksmiths, which is made up of more than 300 companies nationwide, has said its more than 2,000 members will not take part in what it calls "extremely serious" evictions: cases involving families, elderly people, or children who are going to be put out on the street. The first such protest took place in Barcelona, when a locksmith found himself dealing with a situation involving a single father with four children, one of whom has mental health problems. "It was a situation in which he believed that he should not take part, and so he left," says the organization's president, David Ormaechea.

Thirteen euros for a carrot? That is the solution that Quim Marcé, the director of the municipal theatre in the small Catalan town of Bescanó, has come up with to get round the new 21% sales tax on movie tickets. Then the government hiked the value-added tax (VAT) rate on theatre tickets last summer and Marcé thought his theatre was doomed. With one in four local residents unemployed, Marcé knew that even a modest hike in ticket prices might leave the 300-seat municipal theatre empty.

"We said, 'This is the end of our theatre, and many others.' But then the next morning, I thought, we've got to do something so that we don't pay this 21 percent, and we pay something fairer," says Marcé. He says he looked out his window at farmland that surrounds this village, two hours north of Barcelona, and suddenly had an idea: instead of selling tickets to his shows, he'd sell carrots.



"We sell one carrot, which costs 13 euros -- very expensive for a carrot. But then we give away admission to our shows for free," he explains. "So we end up paying 4% tax on the carrot, rather than 21%, which is the government's new tax rate for theatre tickets." Classified as a staple, carrots are taxed at a much lower rate and were spared from the new tax increases that went into effect on September 1. (Abridged from El Pais)

Most of the funeral associations in Valencia have agreed a scheme with the city to provide up to 50 anti-crisis funerals. The normal price for a funeral, which includes the basic coffin, the treatment of the deceased, the hearse, management, staffing etc, usually costs between €2,200 and €2,500 according to the president of the Undertakers Association. 'We will now offer this service for €500, to families who are without resources and are unemployed.'

The IVA rate on funeral services has now increased from 8 to 21%.

Pensions, Electricity & Driving Licences

Pension Reform in Spain.

Spain's pension reform, which raises the age of retirement from 65 to 67 between now and 2027 now takes effect. The increase will be made incrementally, at the rate of one month per year for the first six years, and then at two months per year for the remaining 9 years. The maximum number of years of contributions in order to qualify has also increased from 35 to 37 years. The reform also maintains 15 years as being the minimum period of contributions in order to qualify for a 50% reduced pension, whist 22 years of contributions will be required in order to qualify for 100%.

More changes to electricity billing.

The Cabinet have approved a royal decree which dictates that households and small businesses with an Electricity supply of less than 15kw will be billed bi-monthly and for an actual, as opposed to an estimated consumption, to be used. This is due to an increase in the number of complaints being made about incorrect billing to the National Energy Commission. However, consumers can choose to remain on the current system, which sees monthly bills alternate between actual and estimated amounts. When it has not been possible for an engineer to visit a property to take an actual reading, the energy provider in question will allow the householder to submit their own reading by telephone, which will then be treated as an actual reading. The monthly billing system with bi-monthly estimated readings was introduced four years ago, but the majority of households found that their expenditure increased considerably overnight. Furthermore, the cost of Electricity in Spain is set to increase by 3% from the 1st of January 2013. (Cinco Dias)

Changes and confusion re driving licences.

The question of whether expats should change their owncountry driving licence to a Spanish one is constantly debated. There have been occasions when the Spanish police have even fined non-Spanish residents for not changing their licence to a Spanish one. This does not mean that the Spanish police are correct.

The Costa Consulting Bureau have been particularly helpful in investigating this issue. I detail hereunder the result of part of their enquiries at the Trafico office in Malaga. More details can be had by going to the links at the bottom of this column.

'In 2009 there was approved the new Rules of Driving License in Spain. These rules established that on the 19th of January, 2013, it would come into force a law that said that all European residents who have been living in Spain for more than 2 years, and had not got the European driving license, had to be inscribed in the office of Trafico in Malaga. The inscription means that they have to renovate their UK licenses. For doing that, they need to go to Trafico and hand in the following documents: application form of renovation, pay taxes of renovation (less that 30, medical certificate, and a photo. In case the residents don't update their UK licenses in Trafico, they will be fined with 200.

Not all residents have to renovate their UK licenses. All residents who have the European driving license, that is the plastic card with the date of expiration in the front side, don't have to renew their UK licenses. Their driving license is correct. But those residents who have the old format UK driving license, that is a paper, they need to go to Trafico to renovate their licenses.' (Costa Consulting Bureau)

Changing your home country licence for a Spanish one may raise some issues, particularly if you decide later to return to your home country. Check-out here for more information -

Major Scandal Emerges!

The former treasurer of the ruling Partido Popular, Luis Bárcenas, had a bank account in Switzerland with an average balance of around el5 million. These are the latest findings according to an ongoing investigation into the kickbacks-for-contracts Gürtel scandal, in which a number of high-ranking PP officials have been implicated. At one stage the account was believed to have peaked at el22 million. The account recorded a balance el4.885.976 in 2005; which rose to el9.757,330 in late 2006; el2.144,832 in late 2007; fell to el3.673,661 in late 2008 and el1.853,921 in October 2009. Bárcenas said that he used to go to Switzerland only for skiing and mountaineering.

Bárcenas also took advantage of the controversial tax amnesty last year by reporting a deposit of €10 million, previously undeclared. The amnesty allowed people to come clean on assets they had hidden from the taxman without questions asked by paying a fine of only 10% of the funds declared. Indeed many on the Left were sceptical about the amnesty. Their scepticism is probably justified as the government recovered just over a billion euros, less than half of what was expected.

After the Gürtel scandal first broke in 2009, Bárcenas was named as an 'official suspect,' but he later transferred C.5 million to a bank in New York. He also resigned from his position as treasurer of the PP in 2009 and his seat in the Senate in 2010.

Bárcenas, together with another treasurer of the PP, Ángel Sanchís, are reported to own a massive Argentinean farm which is three times the size of Barcelona and employs more than 1,700 employees. Parts of the farm, which comprises 30 million acres, is heavily protected by armed guards. A couple of journalists who hired a plane to photograph part of the estate were grounded at gunpoint and expelled from the province.

El Mundo has recently reported that Bárcenas used to pass out cash-filled envelopes as bonuses containing between 5,000 and 15,000 euros to PP 'big-wigs' on a monthly basis. The opposition are now having a field day and the PP are running for cover, issuing denials by the handful and promising an enquiry.

Judging the Judges!

An unusual eviction came to light recently. In this case Elpidio José Silva Pacheco, the examining judge at Madrid's Investigation Court No. 9, was sentenced by a colleague in 2009 to a fine of €7,115 for the back rent he owed on his rental home, plus late charges and lawyer fees. The case ended with the judge being officially evicted from the apartment, although he still hasn't paid what he owes.

In the meantime, he is one of the judges in charge of the investigation into Gerardo Díaz Ferrán, the former boss of the employers' association CEOE, who is no stranger to these pages and is suspected of concealment of assets and money laundering. So, here we have a 'problematic' judge investigating one of the biggest 'chancers' in Spain?

The managing agents of the apartment are obviously furious stating, 'He did not pay us a single month's rent. It's a scandal.' Why Silva Pacheco refused to pay remains a mystery. The salary of a person in his position in Madrid is around €70,700, and that is without taking any bonuses into account.

On the professional front, Silva Pacheco's career is not without blemish. He was slapped with a €6,000 fine by the General Council of the Judiciary for behaviour that violates articles of the Organic Law of the Judicial Power, which sanctions hindrances to the investigative work of the Council, the Supreme Court, the High Court or other higher courts in Spain. Council sources said this is not the only fine Silva Pacheco has received in the past. Although it is now 2012, the rental money has still not been paid as the judge who has been fined is appealing his own lawyer's fees! A bit of a 'black sheep' I think.

Slight decrease in foreign residents.

The number of foreign residents in Spain on January 1, 2012 was 5,736,258, 15,229 less than in 2011. This represents a decline for the first time in fifteen years in the number of immigrants residing in the country. But this decline is just 0.3% over the previous year.

According to the National Statistics Institute, Spain has a population of 47,265,321 inhabitants, nearly 75,000 more than in January 2011 when it was 47,190,493. While the total population in Spain has grown steadily in the last fifteen years, now the number of foreigners has not followed the upward trend which was recorded in 1998. In that year there were 637,085 registered foreigners out of a total population of 39,852,651.

By country of nationality, Romanian citizens are the most numerous (897,203), followed by Moroccans (788,563), British (397,892), Ecuadorians (308,174) and Colombians (246,345).

LATE NEWS: More Electrikery!

FACUA - Consumers in Action warns that the suspected discounts offered by electrical companies actually increase the bill up to 11%. In its report Las mentiras de las eléctricas, FACUA uncovers the false advertising by the sector and the fraudulent practices committed by its salespeople, who visit the addresses of users to offer discounts that do not match reality or are conditional on the contracting of additional services which inflate the bills, and give false promises that the rates will not rise in one or more years. FACUA has carried out an analysis of offers from Iberdrola, Endesa, Gas Natural Fenosa, HC Energía and E.On ahead of the Last Resort Tariff (TUR) set by the Government from January. The association concludes that to abandon the TUR is an unwise decision in the majority of cases and a real blunder if the most expensive rates are purchased, which are those offered by the three major companies. Moreover, these contracts reduce the rights of the users and eliminate obligations imposed on electric companies in different sections of industry standards that only affect the Last Resort Tariff. The scandalous wastage in Valencia continues!



The ex-premier of Valencia, Francisco Camps (photo), who was forced to step down after his implication in the Gürtel kickbacks-for-contracts corruption scandal, must be a big fan of football. So much so that his last act in office was to use the Valencia Finance Institute (IVF) to guarantee the loans that Valencia FC, Hércules FC and Elche FC had asked

the banks for in recent years: 118 million euros in total!

With the announcement by the debt-racked teams that they are unable to pay back these loans, the lenders will trigger the deal in place with the regional government, making it the biggest shareholder in all three sports clubs. This contravenes the Public Limited Sports Company Law, which prohibits any one entity from holding over five percent of more than one team participating in the same competition.

After the execution of the guarantee against the IVF, current regional premier and Camps' Popular Party successor, Alberto Fabra, has inherited a poisoned chalice. The Generalitat has had to absorb 70% of Valencia's shares, and unwillingly now also owns 65% of Hércules and 45% of Elche. At the same time the region's unpaid invoices from pharmacies, care workers and privately run hospitals are stacking up, while massive cutbacks are being implemented in education, healthcare (see below) and scientific research.

Three years ago, Hércules borrowed €18 million from Caja Mediterráneo to pay player bonuses following its promotion to Primera, and to cover an unpaid tax bill. The club was owned at the time by Enrique Ortíz, who is also embroiled in a corruption scandal and is accused of illegally financing the Popular Party.

Camps' hand is also evident in the collapse of Valencia FC. In 2004, he invited the president of the region's business associations, Juan Soler, to assume the presidency of the club to avoid the return of Paco Roig, who was considered a danger to the team. Soler embarked on a pharaonic plan to build a new stadium. As the construction industry crashed, the new stadium remained half-built, the land on which the stadium stands could not be sold and Valencia's debt in the scheme rocketed to €50 million. Bancaja, its principal creditor, placed current president Fernando Llorente in charge and the haemorrhage was stemmed through refinancing and the sale of players.

The generosity of the regional government under Camps did not end there. Levante also accepted a loan of €5.6 million from Caixa Penedés. It hopes to start paying some of it back this year. Villarreal, meanwhile, last year refused five million euros of public money, but has a sponsorship deal with Castellón airport that was worth 20 million euros over five years. The aerodrome is another legacy of Camps' administration. To date, not one plane has landed or taken off from it, despite it being completed over a year ago. (Abridged from El Pais)

Of course the above profligacy means that the region now has less funding to spend on essential services. Just last week it was announced that €45.3 million, which was earmarked for investment in new hospitals and new health centres this year, will now go to pay the operating costs - electricity, water, telephone - of the other health facilities. Several Valencian areas, such as Benalúa, have been promised health centres ten years ago and are still waiting.

30 workers who have been caring for 300 mentally ill patients in the Centre for Rehabilitation and Integration in L'Alacantí, have been without pay for four months. The total amount owed to the centre by the regional government is €450,000 and the centre may have to close shortly unless the agreed funding is forthcoming.. The dreadful thing is, this is not an isolated instant. Millions previously allocated to claimants under the Dependency Law have also now been withdrawn, leaving the disadvantaged, dependent, ill, and their carers with nothing.

In many responsible societies, those responsible for such wastage would be punished and ostracised. In others, they would be placed up against a wall and shot!

Regular readers of The Dream Scene will recall my report about two years ago, on the opening of the massive Paradise brothel, probably the largest in Europe, in Catalonia. Now don't get too excited, it was a news item not a review! Well it's back in the news again. It seems that the town where this massive 'house of ill-repute' is located, La Jonquera in

Girona, Catalonia, is now experiencing a 'brothel or knockingshop war' between rival establishments.

During just two weeks in December, El Club Paradise (see photo) experienced two violent attacks on its premises.



In the first, masked men on motorcycles threw two handgrenades at the roadside establishment. There were no clients inside at the time but the explosions startled about 100 girls who were sleeping inside at the time ('Did the earth move for you, Honey?') and destroyed two bathrooms. In the second attack, several men wearing ski-masks left an Opel Astra outside the 'nightclub' and fled. The Astra was packed with TNT and US-made dynamite, which was connected to a six-metre fuse which may not have been lit. The regional police, the Mossos d'Esquadra, made the device safe, stating that the aim of these outrages 'was to scare-off customers.' Never mind about the customers! 50 of the 100 girls who worked in the 80-room brothel have already been scared off to less dangerous venues.

The owner, José Moreno, has no doubt where the attacks originate. 'While they have robbed me of business, there are lines forming outside other brothels. They are trying to destroy us. They have cleaned us out during the holiday season.' There are several other brothels in the town and business is now booming at the largest ones - Lady Dallas, Madam's and The New Baby Doll. Moreno, who owns two other brothels in Girona - Eclipse and Edén - was sentenced to three years in prison last March for being the head of a sex-trafficking ring. But the Girona regional High Court ruled that he personally didn't force the women to enter Europe. 'I don't know if I have been convicted; I am still free and I am still operating my businesses,' said Moreno when asked about these court cases.

La Jonquera is on the Spanish border with France, the brothels attracting hundreds of those frog-munching surrender-monkeys from across the border every weekend. The police believe that the attacks are part of a vendetta between prostitution kingpins. The sex trade takes advantage of the fact that prostitution is not regulated by any laws in Spain; it is neither legal nor illegal, and therefore tolerated. Local residents and law enforcement officials are worried about these violent incidents and fear the arrival of armed and organized rings aiming to take control of the booming business. 300 business owners in the town met to find a solution to the town's deteriorating image. 'Before La Jonquera was known for its truckers and hookers. Now it is known for its truckers, hookers and bombs,' said one restaurant employee. (Continued in next column)

Which all brings me nicely to some late news on STD's. Around 2,000 new cases of gonorrhoea are reported in Spain annually. Although there is no agreed single recognised method of treatment in this country, between 15 and 20% of the strains treated are showing some resistance to the medicines. The EU is now looking at alternative drugs to combat the disease. Closing a few knocking-shops might help.


The Leprechaun.

On 12 April 1779, France and Spain signed the Treaty of Aranjuez wherein they agreed to aid one another in recovering lost territory from Britain. Then in June 1779, Spain declared war on Great Britain, France having done so the year before. France and Spain sought to secure Gibraltar, which was a key link in Britain's control of the Mediterranean The King's Bastion Sea, and expected its capture to be relatively quick-a precursor to a Franco-Spanish invasion of Great Britain.

The blockade and siege of Gibraltar was announced with great flourish and courtesy by Lt Gen Joaquin de Mendza to Governor Eliot on June 21, 1779. The siege took some time to gather pace as Spanish troops took several weeks to reach the Spanish land side of Gibraltar. Governor Eliot commented that it initially amounted to little more than an interruption of mail by land.

> The new provisions were a welcome relief to the hungry defenders, who were down to a ration of a little salt meat and four ounces of rice a day, and were also beginning to suffer from scurvy. However there was no wine or rum in the new supplies prompting Governor Eliot to state that their absence would be 'severely felt' by the soldiers, and bad for their health.

> After Rodney's fleet left, the Spanish began to strengthen their offensive land lines with forts, redoubts, entrenchments, and batteries. But still no shots were exchanged between the garrison and the Spanish.

> Shortly after midnight on June 7 1780, several sails were seen approaching the Rock from the west. When challenged, these ships burst into flame. This was an attempt to sail six fireships, three of them linked by chains, into to the moored British ships and destroy them. Two British naval ships bombarded the fireships, cut the chains and slowed their progress down. British seamen in longboats then towed the fireships out of harms way.
