Bienvenido a todos, and welcome to what must surely be, the start of the summer edition.

After what was an excellent warm winter, the weather broke for a couple of days in May, during which, on one occasion hail-stones the size of thumb-nails or 'maltesers' rained down. It was quite a phenomenon which lasted about 30 minutes, giving a snow-coverered image to gardens and even the beaches. However, the hail-stones also caused some damage, even to some painted walls. 

What's Up?

Catalan premier Artur Mas has responded defiantly to the Constitutional Court's decision to rule that a declaration of sovereignty issued by the regional parliament is null and void. Spain's highest legal body admitted a central government objection to the text issued by the Catalan assembly in January declaring the region "a sovereign political and legal entity." This was the phrase that incited the Solicitor General's Office to file a legal complaint to the text on the grounds that it represented "an open challenge to the Constitution."

The dispute over the Catalan education system's linguistic model is headed for a dead end: an increasingly tangled web between the regional government's steadfast defence of a system in which subjects are taught in Catalan and a series of judicial resolutions requiring the teaching of more Castilian Spanish for those pupils who want it. The Catalan Regional High Court ruled that the demands of families who want more hours of teaching in Castilian must be addressed. To date, the Catalan education authorities have ignored the ruling.

Mario Draghi, President of the European Central Bank, wrote a letter to Prime misister Mariano Rajoy, saying he must adopt a wider set of measures which attack the underlying cause of the difficulties being seen with mortgages, so as to avoid, at all possible, the evictions. The real problem with the 'reforms' is that few of them go far enough. The 'wishy-washy' changes to the outdated mortgage legislation is a prime example of the government loosing their nerve and botching the opportunity for lasting, beneficial and meaningful change.

Statistics from the Bank of Spain show that last year nearly 40,000 families lost their home for not being able to pay the mortgage. Almost most half of them gave up voluntarily and 18,195 cases had to go through the courts.

The respected US economist, Arthur Laffer, the inventor of the Laffer Curve, has suggested that the government reduces taxes now, together with announcing that in three years times there will be large cuts in spending. Laffer stated that 'Spain is probably the country with most potential that I have seen in my life, and the one which has most failed to take advantage.' The Laffer Curve theory simplified states that tax revenues would be zero if tax rates were either 0% or 100%, and somewhere in between 0% and 100% is a tax rate which maximizes total revenue. Laffer's postulate was that the tax rate that maximizes revenue was at a much lower level than previously believed: so low that current tax rates were above the level where revenue is maximized. Income tax in Spain has become quite penal and is now among the five highest in Europe. All this does is that it further encourages and inflates an already massive 'black' economy.

An EU investigative team are back in Madrid to ensure that the stabilisation of the banking system is following the demands that came with the €100 billion rescue package. They will also discuss the Socialist decision in Andalucia to take the empty flats owned by the banks, pay the banks a small amount and then rent out the flats to those who have been evicted.

Government officials and labour union leaders dismissed the idea advanced by the European commissioner for employment, László Andor, that Spain introduce a single work contract as a means of eliminating the duality of the local labour market. The current system has 41 different types of labour contracts!

Spanish retail sales fell by 8.9% year-on-year on a calendar-adjusted basis in March. This marked the 33rd month in a row of falling retail sales.

Miguel Blesa, the former chairman of Caja Madrid has been thrown into jail for an evening while he raised bail money of €2.5 million. He raised the bail the following day. In 2008, Blesa bought a bank in Florida and paid double what it was worth. The judge is also investigating the irregular commissions received by Blesa and other members of the Caja Madrid board for the purchase of the Florida bank, with commissions totalling 100 million dollars.

Spain is the second noisiest country in the world, with Japan in first place. According to a report called 'Noise and Health', Spain has the highest rate of population exposed to excessively loud noise: it currently affects more than 9 million people, or 20% of the population. Traffic, transport and some forms of entertainment (concerts and clubs) are the main causes of the problem in Spain. As an expat' I might add tile-cutting and continuously barking dogs.

The European Commission has withdrawn its proposed ban on refillable oil containers in restaurants next year. The European Commissioner for Agriculture stated that despite having the backing of producer countries such as Spain, Italy, Greece and Portugal, the proposal did not have broad support, particularly among consumers.

Brussels is investigating why Spain is charging IVA/VAT on school dinners. The EU wants Spain to verify that it does not charge IVA on infant care in out-of-school hours. European legislation allows for IVA not to be paid in such circumstances, but it seems that Hacienda has been charging 21% IVA on all children over 6 and 10% IVA for children under that age.

A joint operation by French security forces and the Civil Guard in early May resulted in the arrests of six of Spain's most-wanted ETA members in various cities across France. According to sources close to the investigation, the detainees formed part of ETA's logistics apparatus, known as Elosa, among whose functions is the storing of weapons.

The Spanish press reports that several British financial havens have decided to cooperate in the fight against tax evasion. They have signed an agreement to facilitate greater information on the owners of accounts and their use. Bermuda, the Virgin Islands, the Cayman Islands, the Turks & Caicos islands, and the Isle of Man have all agreed with the agreement which Chancellor George Osborne has announced. The offshore territories will share their information with the UK, Germany, France, Italy and Spain. Jersey and Guernsey have decided to reject the plan.

The price of a barrel of crude has fallen nearly 6% since the start of the year. The National Energy Commission, (CNE) which supervises the distribution of the fuel, has not seen this discount passed on to consumers. In addition the Commission has detected that petrol companies have increase their profit margin by 31% since January.

The British Government is planning to stop giving people who live abroad a British state pension allowance based solely on the employment record of their spouse. There are some 220,000 overseas residents who have been collecting this allowance at a cost to the Government 410 million pounds a year. Many of these have never even set foot in the UK. The Pensions' Minister Steve Webb explained, "Say you are an American man and you marry a British woman, you can claim, if she has a full record of contributions, a pension of 3,500 pounds a year for your entire retirement and having never paid a penny in National Insurance."

Property owners in Spain will this year face a Property Tax (IBI) amounting to 789 euros on average, although the actual amount depends on the property location. This was revealed by an analysis by the real estate portal www.pisos.com on the IBI of the various regional capitals, which also shows that the receipt of a single-family home is 34% more expensive than a group home. The payment of this charge will be difficult for many Spanish, especially for those living in Santander and Barcelona. While the national average is 339 euros for apartments in buildings and 1,239 euros for houses, the Cantabrians will pay 658 and 3,479 euros respectively, and the charges for the Catalans will vary from €483 to €3,219 plus! Fortunately, the IBI rates in Orihuela Costa remain very low, at least for the present.

Workers at a cemetery in Seville have kicked up a stink after



thieves stole several motors from fridges used to preserve bodies until their cremation. Thieves have also taken the steel slabs from inside the cremation ovens and numerous metal railings from inside the precinct. Workers at the San Fernando cemetery in Seville have grown

tired of the string of robberies that have taken place in recent months, according to the local press. Seville's UGT union secretary general reported in early May: "In the last 15 days, we have seen the sorts of robberies that used to be unthinkable. All the metal in the cemetery is being ransacked and they have taken everything from scaffolding and wheelbarrows, to the letters on the tombstones." The lack of security inside the cemetery was the main reason for the robberies, he explained. "Seville Town Hall is going to pay the price for not wanting to spend more money on security. They're going to have to replace everything that's been stolen." Cemetery workers fear the tomb raiders will one day confront them. On several occasions they've come face to face with strangers walking around the grounds in the early hours of the morning.

Police have recovered 300 kilos of peeled copper wire together with another 5,000 metres of unpeeled copper wire in the Valencian town of Nules. The wiring was stolen from the A-7 motorway nearby. Police believe that 17,000 metres of wiring in all has been stolen from the roads around Nules. Nules other claim to fame is that its name is used for the most popular type of seedless Clementine grown in Spain.

A police officer who was guarding a 3,592 kilo stash of marijuana in a container at the port of Valencia has been jailed for seven years, together with three other associates. The officer assisted a gang to gain access to and break into the secured container. The drugs were removed and probably fetched around

The National Police in Palma have arrested five members of a dangerous armed gang in Palma, Mallorca. Among those arrested were a suspected ex-British Special Forces weapons expert and two former sailors from the Spanish navy. On May 8, 2009, they stole a lorry from a military base and drove it into the wall of Carrefour in Palma to get to the safe, but on that occasion they left with nothing. Then on October 2nd, of the same year these thieves got into the same establishment through a window and escaped with €107,500. The last assault was in June 2010 when they entered the offices of Carrefour threatened the cashier with a firearm, gagging her and escaping with €176,000. A security guard at the shopping centre has also been detained on suspicion of colluding with the thieves. The gang is also accused of illegal detention (kidnapping) and a violent home robbery. You would have thought that Carrefour might have 'twigged' earlier that they were a bit of a 'soft touch.'

Continuing a story we reported on in 2010; the 82-year-old actor Sean Connery, has now been given six months to answer questions about the sale of his Marbella home, Casa Malibu, in 1999 or face being arrested. The Connery couple had owned the property for 20 years and sold it for a reported €5.5 million. The judge thinks that there were irregularities in the sale, and he is investigating 17 people in what has become known as the 'Goldfinger' affair. Among the 17 are the ex Marbella Mayor, Julián Muñoz and the real estate planning chief in the Marbella Town Hall, Juan Antonio Roca, both of whom are wrapped up in other corruption cases and facing lengthy jail sentences. After the sale a block of 72 flats were built on the site, despite planning permission for only 5 houses. The development gained a €3 million profit, which is understood to have been sent offshore. After three years the judge has lost his patience with Connery. If he does not appear he and his wife may be the subject of an international arrest warrant. Connery says he is too sick to travel dry, we lose an hour of daylight. and that the money laundering accusations are ridiculous.

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A Down syndrome association, Down España, has filed a complaint against a hotel in Almería for refusing to admit a group of youngsters on the grounds that "We don't accept groups of people with mental disabilities. These kinds of people could bother the other clients.' The case is being investigated by the Almería public attorney's office. Under the Penal Code, denying people a service they are entitled to because of their disability constitutes an offence that can lead to one to four years of professional disqualification. Down España recalls two other cases in which young people with Down syndrome were barred entry: one was a nightclub in Sabadell last March and the other was a pub in Alicante in 2010. The owner lost his license a year later. In 2009, a parish priest refused to give a child from Teià (Barcelona) her first communion because she was "already God's angel."

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

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New Residency-Permit Threshold Announced.

After much dithering, the Spanish Government has off investigators. let it be known it plans to raise the residencypermit investment hurdle to €00,000, which will buy **non-EU nationals** the right to reside in Spain for the duration of their investment.

The Spanish Government is reported to have prepared a new draft law granting qualified residency permits (with strings attached) to non-EU nationals who spend half a million Euros or more on a home in Spain, according the Spanish press (elEconomista.es). The draft could become law as early as this summer.

This means the Government is finally doing something about the residency-permits-in-returnfor-property-investments idea it floated last going to begin taking action against all business November, which met with stiff criticism. Back then the investment hurdle for a residency permit was just €160,000, which some said was too low and made Spain look cheap.

Under the latest draft, non-EU nationals predominantly Russians and Chinese – would get a residency permit (with strings attached) for them, their spouses and children, upon spending €00,000 or more on a property in Spain. That would bring Spain in line with countries that have introduced similar incentives, like Portugal and Ireland. Investments tied to residency permits will least 2 jobs, or by investing in financial assets like Spanish government debt(€2 million!), say press reports.

ANDALUSIA: HASISH CENTRE OF EUROPE?



May seems to have been a particularly busy month for the police in Southern Spain. First of all in Algeciras, 32 tons of hashish was discovered hidden in a consignment of melons due to go from Morocco to France. Around 400 trucks pass through the Port of Algeciras daily with around half being inspected. On the same day, a plantation of around 13,000 marijuana plants was discovered in an estate in Málaga. But just one day later, police in Córdoba were called to an attempted break-in at a warehouse in an industrial estate. There they discovered the largest hashish shipment ever seized in Spain - 52.6 metric tons. Photo/AFP. Six days later, another 291 kilos of hashish were discovered inside a second warehouse. The following day, 10 more tons turned up inside two trucks in a third warehouse, all in the same industrial park of La Amargacena.

Police believe that Córdoba has become the new Spanish base for storing and shipping Moroccan hashish to northern Europe, particularly Germany and the Netherlands. The never-ending stream of trucks coming in from Morocco used to stop in Seville, but the gang decided to move the business to the less suspicious city of Córdoba to throw

THERE'S GOLD IN THEM THERE SUCKERS!

Why is it that whenever 'gold' enters the business environment, slight of hand and general 'dodgyness' rares its ugly head. The profusion of gold or 'oro' dealers prompted the local authorities in Madrid to carry out a random inspection of the dealers' weighing scales. Out of 37 scales tested by regional Directorate General of Industry, 60% of the scales were found to be inaccurate or the business-owners refused to have them tested! Indeed some of the owners of the businesses visited showed a "violent attitude" toward inspectors, who had to leave without properly carrying out their jobs.



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

El Duende del Manzano, located behind The Dublin pub by the Ferreteria is a spacious colourful bar with a charming enclosed courtyard. It is a traditional Spanish bar offering great tapas and Menu de Dia. Everyone that we have taken to it, have expressed what a brilliant find it is.

If you just go for a drink, you are offered a free mini tapa to go with it in the traditional Spanish style. When we visited we were given an albondigas. The meatball was excellent but the sauce was absolutely sublime. The depth of flavour was outstanding and nothing like I have had in Spain before. This continued with a tapa Magra de Cerdo, which was delicious, We supplemented this with calamari. No pre-made supermarket rubbish here, freshly cooked with the lightest of home made batter. Finally we had a fish tapa with Merluza (hake), prawns and mussels cooked in a subtle spicy sauce. All this served with free bread. We also had a bottle of house white wine and two bottles of water. At 9.50 Euro a head a complete bargain.

In addition, they have a variety of entertainment over the weekend from Thursday to Sunday. This includes a Spanish trio that play traditional folk songs and Flamingo. It is not only toe tapping but one is actively encouraged to get up and join in.

There are very few quality Spanish establishments close to the Filton Centre and for those of us that have a cosmopolitan view and want to experience some of the culture of this country, then I suggest a visit to El Duende del Manzano is a must but please note that it is closed on Mondays.

'Gibraltar will not play qualifying matches with Spain – we also have this situation with Armenia and Azerbaijan', he said.

The two owners of a bar in Valverde del Camino, Huelva, have been given a three-year and two month sentence. The two have been found guilty of causing acoustic contamination, and in addition both will have to pay a €3,800 fine, and compensation of €7,000 for the neighbours' 'somatic and psychic' disorders. The court considered it proved that the neighbours suffered acoustic contamination from 2008 to May 2010 from the bar next door. The sentence stated that the bar owners used an improper sound limiter.

The sale of homes fell by 21.5% in the first quarter of this year compared to last. The rapid drop comes with the end of mortgage relief. There were 54,512 house purchases made in the first quarter. The figure was also affected by the higher IVA being charged on the sale of new properties.

Spain's state debt has doubled since the start of the crisis, and now stands at 641 billion, 461 million euros. The regional governments have unpaid bills totalling €10 billion.

Most football enthusiasts, particularly the older ones, will have heard of Di Stéfano.

Alfredo Stéfano Di Stéfano Laulhé was born in Argentina in 1926. Di Stéfano. Also known as "Saeta rubia" - the blond arrow - he became one of the greatest footballers of all time. He played internationally for Argentina and Columbia before coming to Spain. Although he came to Spain to conclude a contract with Barcelona, various agents of Real Madrid 'side-lined' him to play for their team instead. This only exacerbated the traditional enmity between the two clubs. After acquiring Spanish citizenship, he then played for Spain on 31 occasions. In a career lasting 698 games, he scored 510 goals.

Now 86 and a widower for eight years and after four heart by-pass surgeries, Di Stéfano wants to marry his 36-year-old representative, Costa Rican Gina Gonzalez (photo: El Mundo). Di Stéfano, now an honorary president of Real Madrid Football Club, first met Gina - who holds a doctorate in Law and International Relations - when she was writing his biography some years ago.

The couple had planned to wed within 15 days, but the course of true love, or indeed any other type, never runs smooth. Di Stéfano's surviving five daughters have now 'cordoned-off' their father from the public and Gina, saying that he and his assets need to be protected. They have also taken the matter to court to ascertain whether he now has the 'capacity' to proceed with the arrangement, but insist that they are not after his money.

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Changes to Rental Laws.

Under the new rental law passed by Congress on May 16 with the votes of the ruling Popular Party, which has an absolute majority in the lower house, and backed by the regional parties UPN and Foro Asturias, tenants who fail to pay their rent can now be evicted in 10 days if they fail to provide a judge with reasons for the eviction not to be executed.

The controversial new law also removes rent subsidies for low-income groups. The standard length of a rental contract has also been reduced from five years to three. Tenants can now abandon a rented property without financial penalty by providing the landlord one month's notice, while the owner of a house that requires the property for himself or family members can repossess it by giving the tenant two months' notice to leave.

The new legislation also establishes a register that blacklists tenants who have previously failed to pay their rent. This list can be consulted by potential landlords.

The Public Works Ministry, which is responsible for housing affairs and sponsored the law, said changes to the legislation were needed to make the rental market "more flexible."

Experts believe there could be up to six million empty homes in Spain, or over 20 percent of the total. One of the arguments used to explain this phenomenon was the rental law. This legislation favored tenants, who were hard to evict legally—even when they failed to pay the rent. Source: El Pais.

There have been several reviews of the rental laws during the past couple of years. It is difficult to see if this new legislation will have any real teeth, particularly with the horrendous backlogs in the courts.

Mundo – centre/centre-right. But whatever the political leanings of the bar, you will almost always see a well-thumbed, creased copy of MARCA.

MARCA is a Spanish national daily sports newspaper. It was founded in San Sebastian, a nationalist area in Northern Spain, in December 1938, about five months before the end of the

Spanish Civil War, see photo. Initially it started off as a weekly publication, but became a daily in November 1942. Although the daily covers a range of sports, football gets the



most coverage with Real Madrid getting the lion's share. Indeed in 2008 Sir Alex Ferguson, former manager of Manchester United, accused MARCA of being "a vehicle to unsettle players" on behalf of Real Madrid – in reference to the alleged 'tapping-up' of Christiano Ronaldo. The newspaper is not afraid of controversy. On one of its front covers it accused the then president of Real Madrid, Ramón Calderón , of "stealing the Assembly" during their annual general meeting. He in turn said that MARCA was 'run by a psychopath!' In another it reported that Man U manager, Alex Ferguson, was 'senile.' See Gallery on page 22 for more.

MARCA now has a daily readership of around three million, the highest of any Spanish daily. In Feb' 2001, MARCA launched a 24-hour sports radio station and a TV channel, MARCA TV in 2010. This is available on TDT. MARCA also announces a number of footballer awards at the end of each season including one for best referee!

MARCA also has a website in English at http://www.marca.com/en/ which is just as colourful as the newspaper itself.

Where's my water pressure? by Lee.

One of the commonest questions asked by owners of quad The PP conservative government's new Coast Law, which houses is why is my water pressure very low when some of my neighbours have loads of it, the answer is usually bad plumbing! The next question is, can it be fixed?; the answer to that is yes. It just depends how much time and effort you're prepared to expend. Before anything though, check that the filters on the taps are not blocked, every tap has a filter, the presence of which the house owner is frequently and blissfully, unaware! Replacements can be bought at the Ferretaria or soaking the filter overnight in vinegar gets rid of some of the lime scale.

Your first port of call after that should be your water meter where you should check the two valves are open at about 95%, but never leave a valve jammed fully open, you're asking for trouble! Assuming no problems there, ensure the main valve, usually found above and to the side of your back door is open and working properly, again remember these valves fail on a regular basis and while they can be repaired with a new valve core, it is essential that the valve seat is re-cut at the same time. Other sets of valves can be found under the kitchen sink, below the water boiler, and on the walls of the bathroom and shower room, all should be 95% open and no signs of water leaking from under the valve top.

Assuming that all is OK this far, it's time to check the output from the wall check valves; the hose can be removed from the valve - it's handy to have a spare one to save water going everywhere when you turn it on! If water pressure is good here you should look for a blocked or damaged hose or a faulty tap, if not, replace the check valve in the wall; many are seized solid and they're worth changing periodically anyway.

Many problems on the hot side are caused by the restrictive, Environmentalists are incensed by the amnesty as it basically standard sized hoses which can be upgraded to larger diameter without too much trouble and can make a huge difference, if your boiler needs changing insist that the hoses are upgraded at the same time! The combination of a too small hose from new if anyone is going to take notice of that! and a buildup of scale over time can wreak havoc but do remember to check the input side too.

And if all this fails? Sadly there are houses where debris entered the water system when the house was built or wrongly fitted pipe and hoses cause ongoing problems, it's all fixable but can be a major job.

Coastal Law Amnesty.

is significantly more lenient than its predecessor, will benefit over half a million people who own homes, hotels, beach bars and other businesses right on the beachfront. "Let's take advantage of the impact that's already been done," the secretary of state for the environment, Federico Ramos, said during an announcement in May.

The Popular Party (PP) had always been critical of a law aimed at clearing the Spanish coastline of the cement that covers it following years of indiscriminate building. Although it was passed in 1988, it took inspectors years to map out exactly which properties lie within 100 meters or so from the waterline — an area considered of public use. Homes falling inside that area could not be sold by their owners, who only got a concession to live in them. In 2009, an amendment stated that properties built before 1988 would be left out of the expropriation. Still, thousands of foreigners who bought properties in Spain, including many Britons and Germans, were affected by the law and European lawmakers sought to pressure Spain into letting up on it.

Now, the PP has found a way to let around 1,000 hotels, 3,000 beach bars and 1,700 other businesses off the hook, even though they sit right on the beachfront. The government claims this move will save 150,000 direct jobs, mainly in the tourism sector, one of the few remaining competitive areas in the Spanish economy. Also saved are 12,800 homes built on public land, some of which were due for demolition in 2018. Owners may renew their 75-year concessions and even sell up. (El Pais)

3-D Bull Run!

A 3-D documentary on the San Fermin Festival and the exciting and dangerous Pamplona bull run premiered in the Málaga Film Festival in early May. The documentary, which took



four years to make, cost around €1 million. The movie covers each stretch of the spectacular 826-metre bull-running route and although it includes some of the dramatic violent moments including gorings and a fatality, it does not revel in the violent aspects of the run. (Hard to avoid I would think!) The documentary, titled *Encierro en 3D*, will be released in Spanish theatres in around 15 cities on June 28. An English version is also being released.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY CERTIFICATION

Most of you may probably be aware at this stage of this new requirement for this part of Spain. If you plan to sell or rent your property from June 1st, 2013, you will have to provide this certificate, *Certificado de Eficiencia Energética*. This is a certificate which relates to the energy efficiency of the property. As part of the grading process properties will be graded from 'A' - being the most efficient, to 'G' - being the least. This type of certification is already in place in most of Europe. Most of us are already aware that many of the properties on the Costas have the thermal efficiency of a caravan or a cardboard box. Certainly different practical requirements here to say, the north of Spain. Most of the housing in these warmer areas will probably rate either an 'F' or 'G.' Properties include dwellings and businesses.

So who does **not** need to obtain a certificate:

Properties which are not for sale or rent.

Properties with a floor area of less than 50 sq. Metres.

Properties where there is already a rental contract in place.

Properties where a rental contract is signed for less than four months. (If a contract is exempt, a signed declaration must be included with the rental contract.)

Properties, or parts thereof, which are used for less than four months a year.

Although comprehensive details concerning this certification and who can sign it, have not been released yet, the penalties for not complying with it have already been announced! This is typical of the punishing bureaucracy which holds Spain back. The fines range from €300 for minor offences to substantial fines for very serious infringements.

It is the responsibility of the property owner (or the developer in case of a new property) to obtain the correct certification. The certificate can be renewed every ten years. Costs for certification are from €250 upwards. As they haven't got their act together, the authorities will probably allow a couple of months or so before each Autonomous Community will have its own register up and running.

There is no doubt that this new requirement will bring a lot of 'cowboys' out of the slime and one will have to watch out for those who promise and charge for what they can't deliver.

HOLIDAY RENTALS.

Holiday lettings in Catalonia will soon be controlled by restrictive local laws, as the Government in Madrid moves to devolve the regulation of holiday rentals to Spain's 17 autonomous regions.

The national Government in Madrid is changing the national tenancy act (*Ley de Arrendamientos Urbanos*) to devolve the regulation of holiday rentals to the regional governments, where powerful local hotel lobbies are eager to put pressure on competition from private landlords. Holiday-home owners in Catalonia, as elsewhere, will have to bone up on local laws to avoid fines for engaging in illegal holiday rentals.

In Catalonia, tourist rentals are covered by decree 159/2012 of December 2012. This distinguishes between tourist apartments (*apartamentos turísitcos*) and homes used by tourists (*viviendas de uso turístico*).

It is only a matter of time before our own region will jump on this band-wagon to increase their revenues. Common sense never seems to impinge on their tax-grabbing strategies. Cash-hungry Catalonia are ahead of the other regions in this matter and as you can see below, the requirements can be quite onerous. As a guideline, the cost of the tourist letting licence from the local town hall in Catalonia is around €250, and that is payable per annum!

Requirements:

Registered with the town hall as a tourist use property

Occupancy licence (*cédula de habitabilidad*), and never exceed the number of tenants allowed by that licence.

Comply with health and safety laws

Adequately furnished

Provide a contact number in case of problems

Issue clients with invoices including VAT at 10%. The invoice should detail the owner, the identity of clients, the number of guests, arrival and departure dates, the cost per night and taxes charged.

Charge clients the new tourist tax (in Catalonia since 01/11/12)

Make available an official complaints form to clients Inform the police of all stays within 24 hours of arrival by fax or email (or in person at the police station)

Restrictions:

You are not allowed to rent out just rooms. Stays of more than 31 days are not considered tourist rentals.

No one can be registered as living in the property (empadronado), which means just second homes.

I repeat that at this stage, the above requirements are only in Catalonia. I do hope that our region will be more sensible and more realistic when it drafts its own legislation.

The First Republic of 1873 dissolved into chaos. The new Republican government found it impossible to curb a mounting wave of political and social disorder. Federal Republicans staged revolts in many towns declaring themselves to be self-governing 'cantons.' Most of these uprisings were quickly snuffed-out, although a handful of centres, notably Malaga and Cartagena, held out for several months. The whole of the Spanish Navy in Cartagena had defected to the Republican canton.

Soldiers in many army units refused to obey their officers and with the cry of 'Down with epaulettes' many officers were attacked and had a nail driven into their shoulders where the epaulettes were worn. The more crowns on your epaulettes - the more nails! With the army is disarray, the Carlists stepped up their military campaign and soon controlled most of Spain north of the Ebro and seemed set to topple the defenceless Republic itself.

Many mayors were shot dead and the violence extended to the religious sector where mobs attacked priests in the street and convents were desecrated and burned.

But the descent into anarchy and the destruction of discipline in the armed forces spurred a General Pavia and his loyal troops to save society and the *patria*. They descended upon the *Cortes* and after firing a few shots in the air, the 11-month-old Republic was finished.


A new *pronunciamiento* in December 1874 in Sagunto (the old Iberian village in Valencia made famous during the Punic Wars), called for the return of the monarchy. The army had knocked the Bourbons off the throne seven years earlier, and now it was bringing them back in the shape of a new king, Alfonso XII.

Alfonso was the son of the former queen, Isabel. He received a military education at Sandhurst military college in England since he was 16-years-old. The new soldier-king showed signs of becoming a good ruler. The Carlists were soon crush but would re-emerge some decades later.

Since Riego's first *pronunciamiento* in 1820, the army had promoted Liberalism. Now however, the Army was becoming more conservative, the officers accepting the *moderado* coalition of monarchy, church and landowners as the natural order.

Largely under the guidance of a lawyer, Antonio Cánovas

del Castillo from Malaga, the Constitution of 1876 was launched and it would last until 1923. Cánovas, who was described as looking like an unmade bed, sought to bring stability to the political scene by injecting common sense instead of ideology. 'The constitution should be formed on principles as liberal as the conditions of the country will allow,' he



warned. Fringe groups such as the Carlists, republicans, regionalists and the anarchists were excluded from any participation.

Cánovas introduced the *turno pacifico*. This was a periodic rotation of power between the two only accepted political groupings, the conservatives (moderados) and the Liberals. Although universal male suffrage was granted in 1891, elections were rigged and manipulated to ensure that only one of the two accepted political grouping gained power. The change over was always orderly but corrupt. The fraud filtered down to the smallest village, where political bosses called caciques controlled voting and handed out patronage. With only 25% of the population being literate, it was easy to dupe an apathetic electorate. On one occasion, the entire 700 occupants of a cemetery voted.

In 1879, the Socialist Party was founded in Spain by Pablo Iglesias but it did not gain any strength until the next century.

Then in 1885, severe earthquakes in Andalucia destroyed thousands of building and left hundreds dead. A severe cholera

outbreak followed and Alfonso, whose health was never strong, insisted on visiting the stricken areas. He died a few weeks later of a lung infection. He was 27. His second wife, Maria Cristina of Austria (right) became Regent of Spain and remained so for 17 years. She was described as "tall, fair, sensible, and well educated." Maria Cristina was pregnant at the time of Alfonso's death, but gave birth to a son who would later become king from 1902 to 1931.



By the late 1880s, Cánovas' policies were under threat from two sources. First, his overseas policy was increasingly untenable. A policy of repression against Cuban nationalists was ultimately ineffective and Spain's authority was challenged most seriously by the 1895 rebellion led by José Martí. Spain's policy against Cuban independence brought her increasingly into conflict with the United States, an antagonism that culminated in the Spanish-American War of 1898. Second, the political repression of Spain's working class was growing increasingly troublesome, and pressure for expanded suffrage mounted amid widespread discontent with the *cacique* system of electoral manipulation.

Cánovas' policies included mass arrests and a policy of torture. During a religious procession in 1896, at Barcelona, a bomb was thrown. Immediately three hundred men and women were arrested. Some were Anarchists, but the majority were trade unionists and Socialists. They were thrown into the notorious prison at the fortress of Montjuïc in Barcelona and tortured. After a number had been killed, or had gone insane, their cases were taken up by the liberal press of Europe, resulting in the release of a few survivors. Reputedly it was Cánovas del Castillo who ordered the torture, including the burning of the victims' flesh, the crushing of their bones, and the cutting-out of their tongues. Similar acts of brutality and barbarism had occurred during his regime in Cuba, and Canovas remained deaf to the appeals and protests of civilized conscience.

Cánovas, who served six terms as Spanish prime minister, eventually paid a personal price for his policies of repression. In 1897, he was shot dead by Michele Angiolillo, an Italian anarchist, while taking the waters at a spa in the Basque region.

Despite the festering political and social tensions of the working class and regions of Spain, most of the 1890's were good for Spain. Queen Victoria visited on one occasion but she found the tea 'undrinkable' much as the Brit's still do here today!

However, it was events in the Caribbean and the Philippines which would accelerate Spain's decline to its nadir. I covered this historic period in detail in issue 63 of the Dream Scene. You can read it here in detail on page 19 of the archives - http://www.heddon.co.uk/dhills/scene/ds63.pdf

The Cuban Disaster was followed by the short but equally disastrous Spanish-American War in 1898.

In the Treaty of Paris (signed Dec. 10, 1898), Spain renounced all claim to Cuba, ceded Guam and Puerto Rico to the United States, and transferred sovereignty over the Philippines to the United States for \$20 million and lesser Pacific islands were transferred to Germany. Spain was now deprived of its empire. The struggle for Cuba had cost Spain its navy, 50,000 military deaths (nearly all from disease), and its national self-respect.

In Spain the Restoration regime had sunk to its nadir.
