Bienvenido a todos and welcome to the July edition.

Weather beautiful at the moment but expected to be much warmer next week. There were two minor earthquakes locally but no one was hurt and there was no damage.

The government will receive around two billion euros from the EU over the next few years to help try and reduce youth unemployment, which now stands at around 57%. One can only hope that the money will be allocated wisely without the politicians, unions and bureaucrats dipping into it.

The government also plans to save some 37.7 billion euros over the next three years under its restructuring of public administrations. 'This includes the mergers and elimination of 57 public bodies and organizations,' said Deputy Prime Minister Soraya Sáenz de Santamaría. Although this is a great idea, getting the regions to cooperate with Madrid and with one another is unlikely, as they all like to have their own little empires. The Catalans are being encouraged to close their 'embassies' abroad - which they have no intention of doing - and the Basque Country will not even study some of the proposals relating to the closure of duplicated functions in their region. Failure to follow the cost-cutting recommendations will mean that Spain will remain moribund due to expensive duplication in the regions.

Looking at some dates: July 16th is a Fiesta Day in Torrevieja and the 17th and 19th are Fiesta Days in Orihuela. Most shops remain open on these dates. The next National 'Red-Day' is not until August 15, *Asuncion de Maria*. And speaking of dates, do you know that Monica Lewinsky turns 40 on July 23 this year! Can you believe it? They grow up so fast don't they? It seems like only yesterday that she was crawling around the White House on her hands and knees, putting everything in her mouth.

Many expat's will be disappointed to hear that Amazon.co.uk will no longer deliver post-free to Spain. This is a shame as Amazon.es is still in its infancy with very few products and little for the expat.

Hundreds of thousands of people with mortgages are to be freed from the so called 'ground clause'. This is when interest rates fall below a level mentioned in the contract, where the mortgage interest rate is held above the real current interest rate by the bank. Now the Supreme Court has ruled that the BBVA, NCG and Cajamar must stop this practice, and it is estimated that clients could save about €1,000 a year. The Association of Bank Users ADICAE, celebrated the news that around 460,000 people in BBVA alone will no longer be affected by the 'ground clause', however they have highlighted that the banks will not return the excess money taken to date. This is because the court said that if the decision was applied retroactively, it would cause "serious disturbances" to "public economic order." What they really mean is that there will be more huge losses in the banks! The Supreme Court also condemned the banks for their lack of transparency. Other banks may now also remove the 'ground clause' and although the government would like the banks to do so, they will leave it to the individual banks to decide. If you have a mortgage, it is worth checking with your bank. More pressure on them will work wonders. Remember, the banks will volunteer *nada*.

After I wrote the above, I came across a new court case in Bilbao which was resolved on June 24. Here a court ordered Novagalicia Bank to repay a couple €12,000 in respect of a 'ceiling clause' in their mortgage since September 2006. They believe that forcing the bank to repay the money does not place it at 'serious economic risk.'

The Constitutional Court, Spain's top legal body, has now been re-shuffled, its judicial panel which will produce an ideological shift from left to the right. The support of the majority of the magistrates in this panel is essential to PM Rajoy in pushing through his policies relating to the labour market and pension reforms, healthcare policy, Catalonia's independence drive and a new abortion law. The reshuffled panel will also have the power to annul austerity measures imposed by the IMF, EU and ECB of up to 10 billion euros, in line with the decision of its Portuguese counterpart to ignore the diktats of the "troika."

The Supreme Court has rejected an application from the ex Director of the CAM bank María Dolores Amorós who was asking for 10 million €compensation after she left the bank. Neither did the court grant the €369,497 pension she awarded herself. Some people have no shame. The FROB bank rescue fund has accused Amorós of falsifying the accounts at the bank, and she has now been called to testify at the National Court with other members who were in other high positions in the bank.

The great fanfare from the Government recently saying that non-EU entrepreneurs who come to Spain with €00,000 to invest in property or business would be given residency, is not what it seems. Residency is only a two year 'investments visa' which can be repeated, but this visa is not a work permit and does not provide admittance to the health service. So basically, not worth cat-shit in the long run!

The Valencian Regional Health Ministry has installed 25 credit card terminals in selected health centres; 16 in Alicante, six in Castellón and three in Valencia. The new machines are part of a pilot scheme to charge foreign visitors who do not have a European Health Card or who are not covered by the Spanish national Health service. If the trial is successful it will be extended to other clinics.

Around 30,000 students could be thrown out of universities in Spain shortly. This is because of the fall in the number and amounts of grants awarded and the higher tuition fees which have resulted in many students and families being unable to pay the fees. Pressure from parents and teachers has forced the Education Minister, José Ignacio Wert, to revise the levels after which grants can be awarded.

The Portuguese Parliament has passed a law — similar to one introduced in Spain — to grant nationality to descendants of Sephardic Jews who were forced to leave the country at the end of the 15th century. Six months after announcing a significant easing of the naturalization process for Sephardic Jews, the Spanish government has yet to put the rules into practice, leaving many applicants for citizenship frustrated. Since November, the Justice Ministry has granted citizenship to 20 Sephardic Jews under the existing naturalization rules, with 2,900 Sephardic citizenship requests under review, most filed before the announcement.

The president of the Union of Islamic Communities of Spain, Riay Tatary, denounced the "exile" that "some municipalities" want to "punish" their places of worship by establishing in their zoning plans the relocation of neighbourhood mosques to "uninhabited areas like industrial sites" or "the suburbs."

The Spanish Government has ruled out the need for an Independent Regulatory Watchdog to oversee the Television Broadcasting Industry - a move which will make it one of the few European countries not to have one. Lack of funding has been blamed. This leaves the regulatory control of the TV sector in the hands of the National Markets and Competition Commission, which also oversees the Railways and Electrical sectors. Broadcasters are obliged to give 5% of their revenues towards subsidising the Spanish film industry.

Lorenzo Alonso, President of the Spanish Confederation of Bread Producers (CEOPAN) said it would be 'an authentic absurdity' if IVA on bread went up. He said that Spain is already at bottom of the list in Europe for bread consumption at 34 kilos a year per person. He lamented the times in the 60's and 70's when the average individual annual consumption in Spain was 134 kilos.

The European Parliament is to present the European Citizens Prize 2013 to the PAH, the Spanish pressure group for those subjected to mortgage abuse and evictions. Now this has gone down like a 'lead balloon' with the Spanish Government. Minister for Foreign Affairs, José Manuel García-Margallo, called the award 'an error' and the PP Euro Deputy, Carlos Iturgaiz, described the award as a 'scandal.' The PAH have become a real 'thorn in the side' to the PP ministers, demonstrating outside ministers' houses and occupying bank branches to highlight evictions. In many cases they have succeeded in stopping them. They have also single-handedly brought to the public's attention the inadequacies and injustices of the current mortgage legislation, much of which dates back to the early 1900's. There have been over 350,000 evictions in the last four years, some of these of course, would be for non-payment of rent. An unemployment rate of 27% and rising, means that growing numbers of people will be unable to meet their mortgage payments.

The 'dodgy Duke' is still in the news with more alleged fraud being revealed. The Hacienda (income tax authorities) has accused the Aizoon group, owned by the Duke and Duchess of Palma, of defrauding €26,000 with ghost companies. The paper says the Dukes reduced their tax base by taking out false documeents for 15 people as staff, but none of them actually worked for the company.

Expect alcohol and tobacco price increases shortly.

The new contract for the Grua Tow-Truck in Alicante has been granted for 10 years with a price of 41.6 million €IVA included, of which 5.5 million correspond to possible bonuses. Alicante traffic will reward the tow-truck company with an extra reward if they tow away more than 15,000 vehicles in a year. That works out at about 4 and a half a day. If you are unfortunate enough to see your car towed away in Alicante it will cost you €103 to get it back.

Three stray cats attacked a woman who was walking her Boxer dog on one of the main streets in the city of Elda, Alicante. This is a most unusual occurrence as cats will normally flee, particularly from a Boxer. The woman had to be treated at the Salud for very deep scratches and the dog was treated at the vet's. Animal experts are perplexed by the incident as cats usually only attack if cornered or feeding.

The austerity cuts have been eroding into all sectors of the Spanish establishment. One of the most surreal and amusing however is that of the shortage of toilet paper in the police stations in Palma in the Balearics. Here, despite cut-backs to salaries, there are no funds available, even to repair damaged police cars. The toilet paper ran-out a month ago and morale is, if you pardon the expression, at rock-bottom. (Maybe they should now use parkingtickets.) So if you are stopped for speeding in Palma, you might try this line, 'Officer, if you forget about the speeding ticket, there could be a couple of rolls of four-ply in it for you!' They have a similar situation in the police stations in Cádiz in Southern Spain. Here due to a change in suppliers they will be out of toilet paper for some time. Although they have ordered 1,000 rolls they will have to wait a month for delivery! The local Chief of Police promises to get to the bottom of this sticky situation. And as an aside, I have just read that there is also a national shortage of toilet paper in Venezuela. Imagine, all that oil and no *bumf*!

But of course post-Chavez Venezuela continues with his brand of lunacy. There, the looney-Left are proposing to the National Assembly that mothers who do not breastfeed their babies for up to six months, be fined. They want to 'promote breastfeeding and sensitise mothers.' The opposition has described the new proposed legislation as 'coercive' and highlights that the fines to 'offenders' will range from the equivalent of €255 to €38,000! The new bill will also ensure that the advertising of pre-prepared baby formulae and other related products face the same restrictions as tobacco advertising. What in God's name is going on there? Despite another loss in the polls, the independencehungry president of Cataluña, Artur Más, has decided to nominate 'Catalan ambassadors' who will each be paid €100,000 to promote Cataluña abroad. No doubt the unemployed and the ailing health service in his region are very impressed. But then the voracious unions (see page 11) got in on the 'independence act' also. La Razón reports that the Catalan President, Artur Mas, 'purchased' the support of the big unions, UGT and CCOO, for support on sovereignty with 10.4 million € of aid.

The World Player of the Year, Lionel Messi, and his father Jorge allegedly filed fraudulent tax returns for the

years 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009, according to a spokesman for the prosecutor's office for tax crimes in Catalonia. Messi, who was 26 in June, is one of the world's highest-paid footballers with a salary of just over £12m a season, according to Forbes magazine. On top of his Barcelona wages, he pulls in a similar amount in



endorsements from sponsors including Adidas, PepsiCo and P&G and he is 10th on Forbes' latest list of topearning athletes. If charged and found guilty, Messi and his father could face a fine amounting to 150 percent of the concealed earnings and 2-6 years in prison, although an out-of-court deal is another possible outcome. No doubt all at Real Madrid F.C. are saying the Rosary in the hope that he gets 'banged-up' with Big Gay Juan in Cell 69. But the latest is that Messi has now made a voluntary payment of €10 million to the Hacienda, in the hope of doing a deal and averting charges.

A hospital in Murcia had to cancel 25 operations in staff. Vomit, they say, is not cleared up until the following day. Matters may also soon grind to a halt in Castellón General Hospital. Here, the alarm system within the patients' rooms are not operating as the maintenance-system bills remain unpaid. The patients are given a urine-sample cup with paper-clips inside. The patient has to rattle this to get the nurse's attention. The intercom system has not been working for a month and is not expected to be repaired until late summer.

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
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
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The group *Stop Desahucios* (Stop Evictions) have occupied several vacant floors in a building in Calle Caballero de Rodas in Torrevieja. They have already installed a number of homeless families in the building although they have no electricity at present. SabadellCAM, the owners of the building, plan to speak to the pressure group shortly. A spokesman for the pressure group commented that 'although Torrevieja has 35,000 empty properties, society is happy for evicted people to sleep under

Torrevieja council plan to demolish around 200 illegal builds and will delegate the 'dirty work' to an outside company. Some of these builds are particularly 'cheeky.' In one case a houseowner built on a large ground floor extension and then converted it into a public bar. No doubt many of these cases will drag through the courts for some time before anything is knocked down.

As I write this, the Fiesta de San Juan is in full swing. Unfortunately, there are sometimes dangers associated with these fiestas. During a bull-run you are quite likely to get a bull's horn up the backside and jumping over bonfires can also have its risks. A close friend of mine had one of her feet very badly burned doing this one year during San Juan. It is the same with the ubiquitous fireworks. An organised display is always exciting and almost always quite safe. But giving fireworks to kids is as dangerous and dumb as giving a fast sports car to a teenager. During a celebration of the Hogueras, for the Día de San Juan in San Blas, Alicante, a 10-year-old boy was killed on Sat' June 22nd, after a firecracker in a drink's can was thrown. An exploding piece of metal from the can struck him in the neck causing a rapid haemorrhage.

and police freed the two-day-old baby who still had his umbilical cord attached. Although suffering from a fractured forearm and other injuries, his life is not in danger. His mother, (photo - Jose Navarro) a 26-year-old Spaniard, has been charged with attempted murder. She told the police she did not want the baby and couldn't afford an abortion. The baby was wrapped in plastic, but fortunately, there was a hole in the bag so the infant could breath. Naturally, the emergency services are pleased with the rescue and they have dubbed the baby "el pequeño superviviente" - the little survivor.

The average waiting time for a surgical procedure in Valencia is now 81 days, according to El Mundo. Cancers, tumours and high-risk conditions will continue to get priority treatment while non high-risk op's such as varicose veins and bunions will be delayed. By extending surgical procedures to the afternoons in the summer, an additional 5,000 op's will be performed.

BANK CHARGES & YOU.

FACUA-Consumers in action, has come up with a boys! report on bank charges in Spain. The study looked at 12 banks in all and the user profile used in their analysis is a consumer who pays monthly six bills by direct debit, carries out seven payments with a debit card and at least one with credit card every month and makes two transfers, pays in two cheques and pays another two standing orders every year. Read this informative report here.*

The banks that charge the most out of those in the study are Barclays (200.40 Euros), Santander (177.40 Euros) and Unicaja (176.20 Euros).

The study refers to accounts where users are not obliged to state or pay-in their salary or pension or to contract other bank services, conditions under which some banks eliminate a large part of their commission

Only one of the banks surveyed did not apply commission fees to current accounts for maintenance, administration, paying in cheques and transfers, and that was ING Direct.

Of the twelve banks analysed, the average annual charge for maintenance was 47 Euros, Barclays being the highest, which reached 72 Euros, followed by the 60 Euros that Sabadell, Unicaja, Banesto, Banco Popular and Santander charge.

Two of the twelve banks do not charge commission fees for maintenance, ING Direct and Activobank.

I used to bank with CAM, but when Sabadell finally took them over, many expat's started to accrue account charges. I went to Sabadell and told them that if they did not stop charging I would move my account. They then said that if I took out an insurance policy with them, they would reconsider it. I refused, telling them that I was paying in enough money every month anyway! Within a week they changed the account to a no-charge 'Experience' account.


The passenger was unimpressed. He asked loudly, so that the passengers behind him could hear, "DO YOU HAVE ANY IDEA WHO I AM?"

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
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

Lavoff-scam judge accuses labour unions of complicity in massive fraud. (Extract fromEl Pais)

The judge investigating the so-called ERE case in Andalusia, Mercedes Alaya, has accused leading labour unions CCOO and UGT of profiting from the slush fund set up by regional government employees that drained money meant to help companies in financial trouble to meet the severance pay of workers laid off as part of a labour-force reduction plan (ERE).

It is alleged that some 136 million euros of public money was embezzled by high-ranking regional government officials between 2001 and 2010. The case has so far netted some 80 suspects including two former Socialist labour chiefs in Andalusia and the former directors of the Eurobank group, whose subsidiary, Vitalia, was responsible for processing layoff applications submitted to the regional government. It is alleged that the suspects employed a system of awarding early retirement packages and grants to individuals and firms who did not qualify for assistance.

Now, Alaya has accused the very institutions whose job it is to protect workers' rights of complicity in the racket.

"The unions, in addition to membership fees and public subsidies, during a decade also found another formula in Andalusia for irregular financing." According to the judge's report, Vitalia and its partner companies Uniter and legal firm Estudios Jurídicos Villasís, paid 7.6 million euros in commissions to UGT and CCOO in "periodic payments that do not correspond to any definitive service."

When questioned, the former chief of Vitalia, Antonio Albarracín, who also said the unions carried out actuarial work and were paid a commission of 0.5 percent from the money allotted by the regional government to cover the ERE. "It's not just in Andalusia - this happens in all of Spain," said Albarracín, who added that the payments to the unions were "a genuine pressure tool" and that if the fee was not paid "the unions go in person to the company and say they will not sign off on the restructuring agreement."

The two big unions, UGT and CCOO deny any wrongdoing.

The judge alleged that González Mata is the author of a series of financial crimes based on the payment of unnecessary commissions, adding that he acted in cahoots with former regional employment chiefs, Javier Guerrero and Juan Márquez, plus Antonio Fernández, a former director of the Andalusia Development Institute. All three men are in prison awaiting trial. Alaya stated that González Mata's companies - Uniter, Ingotor and Cureña - received 32.9 million euros of regional government funds, of which 20 million came through overcharging for commissions.



Too Much Mercury!

CARTONS OF CIGARETTES.

Spanish women have six times more mercury in their hair than the EU average. A study carried out in 17 countries with 1,848 couples with children has revealed high levels of ambient contaminations*. The consumption of fish has its effect on mercury levels.

Another study, carried out in 2003 by the Spanish Oceanographic Organisation revealed the presence of mercury in sword fish, shortfin, and shark. These animals were shown to have more than a milligram of metal for every kilo of fish.

Mercury and other contaminates passes from mother to baby before the child is born and after through breast feeeing. Another survey carried between 2004 and 2008 analysed 1,883 umbilical cords, and 64% of them had levels higher than 5.8 milligrams of mercury per litre of blood, a level considered to be high. In Spain mercury levels are highest in Asturias, Sabadell, Valencia and Guipúzcoa. A world pact was signed last January to restrict the use of mercury but you can bet that any new recommendations have not filtered down to those who dump the metal particularly in certain regions. Whereas I love panga, I am often concerned that it comes from waters around places like Vietnam and Cambodia, where the control relating to the dumping of toxic chemicals and metals is not very rigorous.

The above must surely cast a shadow over what used to be the 'healthy Mediterranean diet.'

* The study also revealed that Spanish children have a high indication of cotinine. Cotinine is an alkaloid found in tobacco and is also a metabolite of nicotine. The high readings may come from passive smoking, although people of African descent routinely register higher blood cotinine levels than Caucasians.

SOLUTION TO DOG-POO PROBLEM?

The town hall officials in Brunete, Madrid, have come up with a novel idea for irresponsible dog-owners who leave the sidewalks messy by refusing to pick-up after their pet goes to the toilet.

They have been sending the droppings they find in a small box directly to pet owners' doors, along with a notice warning them that the next time they refuse to clean up after their dogs they will face fines between 30 and 300 euros.

The idea, which was the brainchild of the McCann advertising firm, was put into practice as part of a week-long pilot program launched in February. Volunteers are employed to spot the uncooperative canine owners, and chat to them in order to find out their dog's name. From the municipal register of pets, the owner's address can then be determined. The next day, a town hall official calls at the dog-owner's door delivering a package of "lost items." "Sign here, please," the official tells the bewildered owner.

"We were tired of not being able to solve this problem, so last year we spoke to McCann to see if they could come up with a creative idea," said a Brunete town spokesman.

After a total of 147 deliveries, Brunete officials report that paths and public spaces are now 70% cleaner.

GROWTH OF 'EYEBALLING' & 'TAMPODKA.'

Health authorities have warned that a dangerous 'drinking' trend detected in the UK, USA and Germany is becoming rife in Spain – pouring alcohol into the eye or various orifices so that it gets into the system more quickly. (Surely it must hurt like hell! Mick)

This way, young revelers become drunk almost immediately, and their breath does not smell of alcohol. Head of Toxicology at Valencia General Hospital, Benjamín Climent, says the practice known as 'eyeballing' – pouring shots of spirit, generally vodka, into the mucous membranes of the eye – can cause serious long-term damage, particularly to the cornea, and lead to blindness.

Oxy-shots, whereby alcohol in inhalers mixed with oxygen is taken in, allows spirits to be absorbed quickly by a larger area of the body and almost instantly, since it bypasses the natural filtering process performed by the liver.

'Tampodka' and 'Tampax on the Rocks' are two other trends now being seen regularly in Spain and leading to a number of teenagers and young adults being admitted to hospital in alcohol-induced comas. Here, a tampon is soaked in a high-proof spirit, mainly vodka, and inserted into the vagina or the anus.

Cases have been seen in Valencia, the Canary Islands, Galicia and Navarra, and in recent months hospitals in Asturias have treated three teenage girls – under aged drinkers – who had fallen into a coma through alcohol after inserting tampons soaked in alcohol.

The regional government of the Balearic Islands managed to stop dispensers of 'inhaleable' shots from being set up two years ago, and say the practice is particularly rife in the 'party capitals' of the region, such as most of Ibiza, and Magalluf (Mallorca).



Some Really Bad Eggs!

The Guardia Civil have arrested two managers of an elderly residential home in Galapagar, Madrid. The detainees, a Spaniard and a Peruvian, both 39, are charged with defrauding the elderly of more than €400,000. It seems that this couple of rats persuaded an elderly woman to sign power of attorney to them so that they could purchase some medical equipment for her. They then sold a property she owned, cleared out her savings and fixed-deposits, together with the jewels and valuables she deposited for safe-keeping when she first arrived at the residential home.

The deception only came to light when the woman was transferred to another nursing home following an inspection of the original home. This brought to light certain irregularities and violations which led to closure of the home. The first time the woman was aware of the sale of her property was when a local woman informed her. The whereabouts of the sale proceeds - €153,000 - are unknown. Similarly, the old woman said that after the death of her husband last March, she commissioned the managers to process her husbands funeral. However, she does not know where he is now buried or where his wedding ring is.

I have no doubt that these two villains have also defrauded others.

The man known as the Porter of Olot has been sentenced to prison for 126 years for the murder of 11 pensioners during a trial in Girona. But under Spanish legislation the maximum time he will serve is 40 years. He was also ordered to pay between €5,000 and €39,000 to the victims of the families, some €369,000 in all. He had been working at a convalescent home as a security guard in Olot Girona for five years. There, Joan

Vila (photo-EFE) poisoned his victims with bleach, de-scaling acid, overdoses of insulin and various fatal pharmaceutical cocktails, causing them extraordinary suffering. Investigators only became suspicious when an 85-year-old woman, Paquita Gironès, was transferred in agony to hospital after Vila had given her an acid to drink.

A number of points strike me about this. What is the point of giving long jail sentences when the existing legal system reduces them significantly anyway and what is the point of levying fines which the offender will never be able to pay, nor indeed have the will to do so. But much more seriously, why did it take 11 murders in just five years within a single institution before the authorities began to wake up? Such incompetence is stunning.

In this case, the murderer's defence team 'pulled out all the stops.' First they said that at the moment of killing, the accused suffered some sort of 'psychic' breakdown. They then stated that he just wanted to end the suffering of the ill and elderly patients and killed them out of kindness. Now that all this got the creative juices of the defence lawyers flowing they came up with a few more gems. They stated that Vila was a repressed homosexual and that he was 'a woman trapped in a man's body'. They also said he had been a sufferer of medical negligence. Fortunately the jury ignored all this.

Joan Vila's last words to the court were 'I only want to say sorry for what I did, and for allowing it to come to this extreme. I don't want to say anything else.'

Both stories above show that, all in all, some nursing homes are downright dangerous to the vulnerable.

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HIGH SPEED RAIL LINK COMES TO ALICANTE.

The AVE, Alta Velocidad Española, finally links Alicante with Madrid. This new link to the high-speed rail service

operated by RENFE was officially opened in Alicante by PM Rajoy and other assorted suits including Prince Philip of Asturias in mid-June. This new and long overdue link to South East Spain will operate Alicante - Villena - Albacete - Cuenca - Madrid. This route will take two hours and 40 minutes. The direct Alicante - Madrid service takes just two hours and 20 minutes but RENFE hope to have this journey-time down to two hours and five minutes early next year. There will be nine trains daily from Alicante with an extra train on Fridays. The basic one-way fare is €64.90, although if tickets are bought well enough in advance a 70% discount can apply. This, together with other special offers can lower the price to as little as €19.45.



All the new AVE lines have been launched with much ballyhoo and promises of good times to come. When the Valencia - Madrid AVE line was launched, an annual traffic of 3.6 million passengers was predicted. During its first year it barely reached 1.9 million travellers, dropping to 1.7 million the following year. It was also predicted that the drastic unemployment figures would be improved by 136,000 new jobs. Once again an illusion. Whereas it was expected that the AVE would be an economic engine for the region, one of the stops on this line, Requena, is down to 50 passengers a day! It is felt that Villena on the new line might suffer the same fate. Although the new station here cost more than €1 million, it is located in the middle of nowhere with dreadful road links. When the Valencian regional government came to link the station to the motorway, it ran out of money! Unfortunately, many of the minor stations on the AVE lines have been a disaster financially.

The link between Albacete and Madrid, approx. 165 kilometres, cost 1.92 billion euros, that's 11.6 million euros per kilometre. However, the new Alicante-Madrid route plans to be the most profitable of all the AVE routes in Spain. The official projection for passenger capacity on the route was raised by 40% to put it at 2.2 million people every year, twice the number of people who used the 50-minutes-slower existing train service in 2012. This projection may prove to be too ambitious.

One newspaper, ABC, claims that only China has a larger high speed network than Spain. Far from scaling down the previous Socialist government's plans, the centre-right administration of PM Mariano Rajoy intends to invest more than €25 billion over the next decade to almost double the existing 3,100-kilometres high-speed network to reach regions such as the Basque Country, Galicia & Murcia.

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DONKEYS IN MIJAS TO CARRY ID!



Officials in the popular Andalucian resort town of Mijas, on the south-west coast of Spain, have demanded that local donkeys and their drivers wear identification plates as part of a push to improve the standard of the town's taxi service.

"In the event of an accident or complaint, the donkey or driver will be able to be identified," said councilman Juan Carlos Gonzales.

"These rules were made not just to regulate an iconic tourist industry but to improve the quality of the service, protect the rights of customers and guarantee that the donkeys meet health and safety requirements." Fifty-two taxi donkeys, 12 horse-drawn carriages and 17 donkey carts have been issued with the new plates according to local daily Sur.

No decision has yet been reached as to whether the 'donkeys' in the local council or regional government should also carry ID.

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

SOME CHANGES TO SPANISH HIGHWAY CODE.

In early June, the DGT traffic department presented a host of new reforms to Congress entitled 'General Rules of Circulation.' It may take some time for these changes to filter through the system. I have outlined just a few below.

Speed: The most controversial part of the new code is the lifting the speed limit to 130km/h on straight sections of motorways. 'It will be exceptional and restricted' said the traffic chief. Panels will be used to change the speed limit in bad weather conditions.

Bicycles: Bicycle riders will have to wear a helmet when in the city. The opposition parties and some 20 town and city halls have opposed this saying it will cut down on the number of cyclists, but a spokesman says there is no way back.

Seat Belts: All the previous reasons for not wearing a seatbelt have been removed with just two exceptions left. When you are parking or reversing you can take you seat belt off. Before taxi drivers, merchandise deliverymen, and the drivers of passenger vehicles were allowed not to wear a seat belt, but no longer. I am not sure when this becomes effective.

Child seats: If the child is 1 meter 35 tall or under, he or she must travel in the back seat. Those aged under four must use an adequate seat for their weight.

Radar Detectors: The new law expressly prohibits the use of radar detectors, some which recently have been capable of detecting mobile detectors. The GPS systems which warn you about any fixed radar will still be allowed and the DGT prints on its website the location of these fixed radar points.

Drugs: The new code brings in a saliva test for the detection of drugs while driving. The person who is stopped can ask for a complementary blood test which he will have to pay for if the result is positive.

Pedestrians: Now I can't quite get my head around this one. In the old code pedestrians were obliged to walk on the right hand pavement in the direction they were walking. Those who walked on the left pavement would have to give way to those approaching. ??? This code may now be removed.

Overtaking: The new law says the riders of motorbikes, mopeds and push-bikes can overtake but only inside the central line of the road, circulating with precaution between the rest of the vehicles.

RV vehicles: Until now where RV vehicles could park depended on the decision of the local council, but now their parking will be limited, presumably to special areas, as the dimensions of these vehicles affects other car parking. Once parked the RV driver and passengers must not set up outside the perimeter of the vehicle and must not dump any fluids or connect to any electricity supply.

ILLEGAL POLITICAL FUNDING WIDESPREAD.

The funding of political parties in Spain has always been a I suppose it could be said that Spain has been a bit of a contentious issue. The long-standing Gürtel case into illegal party funding of the ruling PP continues to shock. The latest revelation here is that the former treasurer of the PP, Luis Bárcenas, who had already admitted to holding €38 million outside Spain, has now had the carpet pulled from under his feet as during June, one of the Swiss banks has admitted that the figure is actually €47 million. It also emerged that an Argentinean painter recently revealed that she was paid to sign false art-sales contracts worth €60,000 to create a respectable front for some of Bárcenas's shady dealings. Bárcenas, you may recall, was found to have kept secret ledgers reflecting donations to the PP and payouts to senior party members and leaders between 1990 and 2008.

The Catalans, who like to think that they are a law unto themselves have also been sticking their fingers in the pot. El Pais reports - The anti-corruption attorney believes there is sufficient evidence to prove that Convergència Democràtica de Catalunya (CDC), one half of the CiU coalition that governs Catalonia, has been guilty of illegal funding activities. The money was channeled through a landmark Catalan cultural institution, Barcelona's Palau de la Música auditorium, whose longtime chief Félix Millet has already admitted to systematically sacking its coffers for years.

The attorney puts the total amount paid by Ferrovial, a large construction company, at 6.6 million euros, adding that, in all, almost 10 million euros have vanished somewhere within the Palau's accounts over the years. But rather than pay this money directly into CDC accounts, Ferrovial used the Palau as a gobetween institution, with Millet and an aide serving as intermediaries. The construction company pretended to be a sponsor of the arts by giving money to the Palau, but rather than spend it on arts programs, Palau managers rerouted it to CDC representatives. The main form of payment, writes the attorney, were "opaque cash deliveries," with these alone worth 2.3 million euros between 2002 and 2008. The current Catalan premier and torch-bearer for Catalan independence, Artur Mas, is today's CDC president. The other half of the ruling coalition, Unió Democràtica de Catalunya (UDC), recently admitted to misusing over €388,000 of European Union funds meant for jobless training programs between 1994 and 1999. The historical admission was aimed at preventing the six defendants in the case from going to jail.

The Spanish Socialist Party was involved in an illegal funding case in the late 1980s (Caso Filesa), as established by a court in 1997. In this case, millions were paid into PSOE foundations.

Efforts were made in 2007 with the Parties Funding Act, amended in 2012, to improve the situation and limit illegal funding with more openness and regulation. But even today the system has all the transparency of a lead coffin and is subject to constant abuse. This despite the fact that the political parties AND the unions receive massive funding from the state, i.e. from you, the taxpayer. According to the current law, the maximum legal donation by person or entity in one year is €100,000; all donations exceeding €0,000 have to be reported to the Court of Auditors with the sums donated reported by the Court in June of the following year. However, it usually takes between five and six years before the report is finally released by the High Court! The current legislation on party funding is patently ineffective.

Whereas the PP (Partido Popular) appear to be the main champions of illegal funding, it is events relating to the Socialists (PSOE) and now the big unions who provide us with the latest jaw-dropping revelations in relation to the current investigations into the ERE scandal in Andalucia. ATTITUDES: THE GERMANS AND THE SPANISH.

magnet for the Germans. First of all there was the Visigoths who established a kingdom here in Spain in the 500's AD. These were nomadic tribes of the Germanic peoples. Their kingdom survived in the Iberian Peninsula until their monarch, King Rodrigo, was killed during the Muslim invasion in 711, the peninsula coming under Islamic domination by 718.

The Germans came again during the Spanish Civil War 1936-39, although not in any great numbers, when they supported the Nationalists and helped them towards victory against the Republicans. More on this in the future history articles.

But the real German invasion came with the tourist boom in the 60's and has continued ever since. Now that many Germans live here and indeed millions visit every year, a number of publications and surveys have been highlighting nuances in the relationship, particularly now in these austere times.

A 2013 survey by the Pew Research Centre has pointed out that while the Spanish picked Germany as the "most arrogant" and "least compassionate" nation in Europe, they also indicated that it is the country most deserving of trust. Spain's unhappiness with Germany is believed to be related to its prominent role in Europe's response to the ongoing economic crisis, with 57% of Spaniards claiming that German Chancellor Angela Merkel has done a bad job. She still fares better than Spain's own Prime Minister, Mariano Rajoy, who is believed by 72% of surveyed Spaniards to be handling the EU crisis badly!

But then a new pole on "Brand Spain" run by Spain's Real Instituto Elcano, raised some concerns on modern German attitudes to Spain. It showed that back in 1996, during the days of the so-called 'Spanish miracle', only ten percent of Germans mistrusted the Spanish. But this figure now stands at 50 percent. Germans are also now much more likely to call the Spaniards lazy.

Back in the mid-1990s, two out of every ten Germans thought Spaniards didn't work much. Now that figure has doubled so that four out of ten Germans believe Spaniards to be lazy.

But the real bombshell reached the Spanish press on June 24, when El Mundo reported on a story in the Sunday edition of Germany's Bild am Sonntag, the World's best selling newspaper. Whereas the Bild noted that Majorca was a popular holiday destination for Germans and a favourite retirement destination, it went on to say that the economic crisis is ruining the island. They go on to say "Swindlers, pickpockets and cheap prostitutes dominate Palma beach after sunset," before going on to claim that Majorca's crisis-related 30 % unemployment level has left it in the hands of criminal gangs. A total of 74,573 crimes were reported on the island last year, the co-owner of Real Mallorca Football Club, Utz Claasen, stating that "Majorcan justice is overwhelmed."

But job-seeking Spaniards still look to Germany. Spanish emigration to Germany has taken off to the levels last seen 40 years ago. Last year 29,910 Spaniards moved to Germany for a job, 45% more than in 2011.



People in Latin American counties were also prepared to embrace racially diverse neighbours. The data from the survey by Niclas Berggren and Therese Nilsson was mapped for the Washington Post by Max Fisher.

In India, 43.5% said they did not want someone of a different race as their neighbour. In Jordan it was 51.4%, while in Hong Kong and Bangladesh, over 70% said someone of a different race was their biggest concern in a neighbour.

Europe showed widely varying results, with France coming out as notably racially intolerant at 22.7% . Former Soviet states such as Belarus and Latvia proved to be more tolerant than many of their European neighbours, according to the study.


