Well so far it has been a very hot summer and I hve no doubt that the mercury will rise even higher this month. Once again, please don't underestimate the strength of the sun. There have been far too many fatal accidents with young children so far this year on the Costa Blanca.

At the time of writing, we seem to have missed the jellyfish invasions that usually accompany the hot weather. Hopefully we will get some respite from them this August.

There is little good news in Spain at the moment. The horrific train derailment in Galicia has pushed the seemingly endless political corruption and bribery off the front pages, at least for the present. But there are indication from the polls that the Spanish people have had enough with austerity and tax increases from a political establishment which cannot seem to keep its fingers 'out of the till.' A Sigma Dos poll published in the El Mundo newspaper during the month of July has indicated that if the ruling Partido Popular (right of centre party) were to go to the polls now, their support would drop from the 44.6% they secured in 2011 to 30.7% now, a drop of a third. But this is not enough to give encouragement to the PSOE opposition (left of centre party) who themselves have dropped one point from 28.8% in 2011 to 27.8% now. The one party doing well in the survey is the left-wingers, Izquierda Unida (United Left). Now if these guys were leaning any more to the left, they would be in Cuba. They are now Spain's 3rd strongest party, moving from 6.9% in 2011 to 14.3% today. Rosa Diez,s UPyd (middle of the road party) have also moved up from 4.7% to 8.3%. The Economist published an interesting article relating to this poll stating that the trends indicate that Spain could be moving towards a 'paella coalition' at the next General Election in 2015. The tragic rail crash in Galicia has dominated last week's Spanish news and as this has received saturation coverage, even internationally, I do not intend to cover it here. In their haste to issue a quick statement on the disaster, the government copied and pasted a previous condolence message in error which expressed, '.....deep sympathy for the victims of the earthquake in Gansu, China.' And you thought George W. Bush was dumb! But then the state run RTVE television topped this by showing a picture of a 2003 Chinchilla train crash and including the Chinchilla emergency number as well!

This disaster has also brought to public attention a metro crash which took place in Valencia in 2009. In this incident 43 were killed and 47 injured. The families of the dead and injured have never accepted the official report, saying that it was a 'manipulation of the facts.' Indeed Ferrocarrils, the railway company, paid a PR firm €621,000 of public money to concoct a report which basically said 'it was an accident.' A similar derailment three years earlier was hushed up. This is a 'smoking gun' and we are bound to hear more on this.

Prime Minister Rajoy is 'on the ropes' at present. The ex-PP treasurer Luis Barcenas, who secretly sent €47 million in dodgy money to various Swiss bank accounts, admitted paying Rajoy and other top PP officials substantial cash payments - up to €200,000 to the Secretary General of the PP! Barcenas is now in prison without bail, as he poses a flight risk. Lawyers defending the imprisoned former treasurer resigned in early July, citing "professional disagreements". What actually happened was Barcenas blabbed to El Mundo before he went to jail that the PP had been funded by illegal donations for two decades. This funding took the form of donations from construction magnates and other business people, Bárcenas alleged. However he omitted to tell this to his lawyers. While PM Rajoy has ignored the allegations to date, pressure from the public and media will force him to make a statement to congress on August 1st. Don't expect any revelations or the truth!

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has poured cold water on the recent optimism circulated by the government concerning growth. The IMF predict a contraction of 1.6% in the Spanish economy for this year but have also slashed their forecast for next year by reducing their original growth forecast of 0.7% to a 0.0% rate for 2014. Although some future quarters may see some growth, the annual figure is not likely to be positive until 2015. Although IMF forecasts tend to be more pessimistic than others, the outlook is still grim as Spain battles its longest recession in living memory while austerity measures continue.

Spain will levy a fee on CFCs (chlorofluorocarbon gases used in air conditioners, for instance) that it hopes will bring in 340 million euros this year. (See page 2 for details) Higher tobacco taxes will add an estimated 366 million euros a year in revenue, and alcohol levies will bring the total up to 700 million euros. The government also made changes to corporate taxes, eliminating a deduction for portfolio deterioration that will save the state around 3.6 billion euros a year, although the impact of this particular cut will not be felt before 2014.

The Government intends to overhaul the entire tax system, to support economic recovery and to boost job creation in Spain. An independent committee of 'experts' has been set up to analyse the existing system and draft recommended revisions, which, given their wide scope, should be far reaching. The committee is due to present its conclusions to the Finance Ministry by the end of February 2014. The proposals must not raise public expenditure. Repsol has admitted that the have been using the 'Monday effect'. This is when petrol stations lower their prices on a Monday, because that is the day the EU takes its reading for prices across the continent. Many drivers in Spain know the trick and always fill their car on a Monday. Repsol contends they drop the price on Monday because the wholesale price has fallen on the Friday, but later they admitted that reducing prices on the first day of the week was a commercial strategy.

Spain has signed an agreement with Uzbekistan to cover the avoidance of double taxation and prevention of tax evasion. So, if you have any camels or tents tucked away in Uzbeki' you may have 'to come clean' soon!

Seat, the Spanish car firm owned by Volkswagen, is planning cut-backs to its factories in Spain. It is proposing that 571 workers a day stay at home from their factories in Catalonia, on a rotating basis, between September and December. Further cut-backs are expected next year. As many of you are already aware, new cars are very expensive in Spain. Taxation on new Spanish cars is 20% more expensive than in the UK. Of course this also pushes up the price of secondhand cars as well, although trade-in prices at the dealers are always ridiculously low, if they will take them!

The Spanish government has now decided <u>not</u> to comply with the revised EU directive on olive oil dispensers. This is a result of lobbying from the olive oil lobby as the government once again 'bends over' for big business. This means that refillable oil dispensers will be outlawed on restaurant tables some time next year.

In Spain an average of three rapes are reported every day — that's one every eight hours. While the 1,161 cases recorded in 2011 represent a decline of 16 percent compared with the total reported five years ago, the number of assaults remain stable, with just a few minor variations. This suggests that nothing has changed regarding the conditions that make this form of violence against women possible. Experts estimate that only about half of the sexual assaults that take place are ever reported. A survey carried out in Catalonia in 2010 revealed that 2.9 percent of women said they had been raped at some time in their lives. (El Pais)

More than 100 Spanish bankers are paid more than one million euro a year, according to figures for 2010 and 2011 released Monday by the European Banking Authority. Specifically, 125 officials in the sector received an average remuneration of 2.4 million euros in 2011, the highest average among the bankers of all European countries paid over one million euro a year. The average in 2010 was 2.25 million euro. In 2011, they jointly received 106.9 million euro in fixed salaries and 198 million in bonuses. And, as we all know, Spanish bankers are as useless as a one-legged man in an ass kicking contest.

Latest: All cyclists under 18 must now wear a helmet in towns. Also, the maximum fine for drunk driving has now been increased to $\leq 1,000$. Associated driving bans will be from one to five years.

At the start of every holiday season petrol prices go up. Petrol is 5.7% more expensive than a year ago, while diesel is 4.1% higher. The cabinet has passed new tax increases on alcohol and tobacco. The tax on spirits will rise by 10% but there is no change for beer or wine, so your bottle of *Oxfam Lager* (Bavaria) is still safe! In Spain, 79.5% of the price of a cigarette is tax.

A 40-year-old Barcelona policeman has been sentenced to 18 months prison and slapped with a €450 penalty after he fined four tow trucks in "retaliation" after his own parked car was towed away on two occasions after he illegally parked on the pavement outside his own house. The court found the man guilty of issuing four tickets to municipal tow trucks for supposedly jumping red lights between October 2010 and February 2011. In one case, the tow truck had not yet left the depot at the time of the alleged infraction. The man was found guilty of falsifying an official document and of abusing his office as a policeman – for which he received the custodial sentence – despite a full confession. He is also banned from working as a police officer for the next 18 months, although his conviction was further reduced by his "psychological alteration" at the time of the events, since he was going through a breakup with his girlfriend! But sentences of less than two years are rarely served in Spain. The prosecutor in this case originally asked for five years.

Sean Connerv, the Scottish actor, and his wife. There have been three similar cases in Almería during the last 12 months.

Nine people were killed and another 22 injured when a bus went off the road in early July near Avila northwest of Madrid. The 54-year-old driver was uninjured but was arrested by the police after allegations that he fell asleep while driving.

A taxi driver in Northern Valencia was arrested after he hit four cyclists over a two kilometre stretch of road near Peniscola. He also tested positive for cocaine.



Local News

Many of you will be aware of the misery and delays caused by the congestion on the two-lane N332 stretch through Torrevieja, particularly during the summer season. Whereas all the other municipalities from Guardamar to Pilar de Horidada managed to convert their stretch to four-lane, Torrevieja, through lack of planning and incompetence, still had a funnel (*embudo*) of just two old lanes with no firm plans to widen their stretch of road. One of the big issues concerning this stretch is the expropriation of the land required for this road-widening project. But even to date, the Torry 'burghers' have done nothing to acquire the land and even start the project. A budget was first drawn up in 2009 - $\mathfrak{S}4$ million and again in 2010 - $\mathfrak{S}6$ million. Now the Ministry of Development is quoting a figure of $\mathfrak{E}42$ million.

It is alleged that the Orihuela Town Council fraudulently awarded local government contracts between 2007 and 2011. At the centre of these enquiries is PP ex-mayor Monica Lorente. Another fifty defendants, including businessmen and public officials are also being investigated. During this July, Lorente attempted to organise a vote of no confidence in the ruling Green/Socialist councillors which, if successful, would have resulted in her becoming mayor. However her attempts were stymied by her own provincial and regional party barons who stated categorically that even if the opposition managed to secure a change of local government, she could not hold the position of mayor. This is because of a ruling within the PP which states that officials who are under investigation by a prosecuting attorney cannot hold public office. Even though she and her supporters tried to force the issue through, one of her own party effectively voted against her (abstained) and two of her supporting votes were ineligible.

It was interesting to read that the Former Chinese Minister of Railways, Liu Zhijun, received a two-year suspended death sentence for bribery and abuse of power. If he behaves himself in prison for that period the sentence will be commuted to life imprisonment. He also had all his assets confiscated and has been deprived of political rights for life. So I wonder, what the effect of tougher and quicker sentencing of corrupt politicians in Spain would achieve? Probably remarkable results.

Five young children have already died this summer in pools in the Valencia region, the latest a two-year-old who drowned in a pool in the La Siesta urbanisation in Torrevieja.

The number two in the sports' newspaper MARCA has been sacked after he tweeted, 'Catalans are shit, they don't deserve anything'. Juan Carlos Gafo made the comment after the disrespectful whistling during the Spanish National Anthem at the World Swimming Championships in Barcelona.

The Alicante town of Torrevieja registered during early Monday morning at 00:28 hrs, June 1, an earthquake of magnitude 1.2 degrees on the Richter scale, although there has been no damage or injuries, as reported by the National Geographic Institute and the Center for Coordination (OCC). On June 13, the towns of Rojales and Guardamar del Segura recorded two earthquakes of between 2.7 and 3.2 degrees on the same scale.

Problems between the Senegalese illegal street traders and the local police continue in Torrevieja. In a recent fracas four policemen were injured. Three had bruises to their necks and shoulders after being struck with belt-buckles. The fourth was punched in the jaw and bit on the fore-arm. One of the assailants was captured and handcuffed, but managed to escape during the confrontation. The rear window to a police patrol car was also broken. Then, just a week later, another three policemen were also injured and three police cars and a van damaged in another incident related to the Senegalese. These scuffles have been commonplace since 2011 and will no doubt continue until the local authority address the problem with some firmness and allocate sufficient resources to the police. A dog who was trapped in the front grill of a car after being hit has been rescued alive by agents of the Guardia Civil in Alicante. See photo. The event took place a couple of weeks ago on the county road CV-943, passing through the area of Guardamar del Segura, when a passing car ran over a dog that was crossing the road. The police took the injured animal to a local veterinarian and the dog has now fully recovered.

Mayor of Orihuela, Monserrate Guillén has warned that pet owners who do not pick up their dog's poo will be fined up to €750. He also reminded owners that all pets have to be microchipped and recorded on the local registry. He noted that the abandonment rates for dogs was 'outrageous' and that around five dogs were being admitted daily to the animal shelter at San Bartolomé.

By the end of June, the new AVE high speed rail link between Madrid and Alicante had broken down three times. On one occasion passengers were stuck in their carriages for 90 minutes with temperatures around 35°. Passengers were given leaflets to fan themselves with and later a full refund of their tickets.

Alicante Airport is to be renamed Alicante-Elche Airport and Elche City Council have budgeted €0,000 for the change of signage at the aerodrome. Incidentally, passenger traffic at the airport during June was up around 11% on the same month last year with 996,864 people. Flights were also up by 12.3% for the same period, with 6,811 flights handled.

A total of 18 children between 3 and 12 years have been poisoned by chlorine in a swimming pool in the Jaen town of Lopera After a swimming lesson, the children showed signs of intoxication. Several of trhem were held in hospital for observation for a few days.

ELECTRICITY TO GO UP AGAIN!

The average electricity bill is set to rise by 3.2% this August. The increase is aimed at attacking the problem of the so-called tariff deficit — the difference between what it costs to produce electricity and the regulated rates charged for it. Industry Minister José Manuel Soria estimated that the shortfall this year will come in at 4.5 billion euro. "The measures in this reform aren't easy for anyone, but they're absolutely necessary," Soria told a news conference. "If we did nothing, the only alternatives would be either the bankruptcy of the system or an increase in the price for consumers of more than 40 percent."

BAD NEWS FOR SECOND-HOME OWNERS.

Along with the increase in electricity bills, taking effect at the start of August, the Govt. has also announced plans to move towards a a fixed electricity tariff that will raise the cost of electricity for holiday-homes and second-homes.

Under the present tariff, electricity bills are made up of 30% fixed fees, and 70% based on consumption. The plan is to move towards a 50% fixed tariff that will increase electricity bills for properties with low consumption, <u>like holiday-homes that are only partially occupied during the year.</u>

Another smart move by this Government to discourage foreigners from buying holiday-homes in Spain..... Who needs those *guiris* with their money anyway?

Surely this will also make the deficit worse? Heavy users will be subsidised by light users, which will encourage the waste of electricity, and bugger the environment.

Household electricity bills went up by 63% between 2006 and 2011, according to reports in the Spanish press.

Makes Sense!

FITTING AN IRRIGATION SYSTEM.

Fitting an irrigation system is not too difficult and ensures that your garden gets the water it needs on a regular basis, the parts for a basic system cost around €100 and can provide hours of DIY entertainment for you, your family, friends and neighbours..... The most expensive item is the programmer. These start from about €35 and you should look for one capable of turning the water on and off maybe twice a day and for periods of 15 minutes up to a couple of hours. I find 15 minutes a day enough for most plants and my own system is set to come on early in the evening.

The first part is planning; an irrigation system can water plants on your solarium, bedroom balcony and, or just, at ground level but the starting point is at one of your taps. From there you need to get water to your plants and an hour or two working out the best route is time well spent.

You should plan to run the large pipe the shortest and neatest possible route to get water to all the places it's needed; balancing valves can, and should be fitted to control water flow to different areas depending on the water required by the plants. Obviously a mature orange or lemon tree will need more water than a small cactus and into the main pipe the small "feeder" pipes are inserted taking the water to each plant or pot; there is a type of outlet available which has a screw top and these can be opened and closed to exactly suit the watering requirements of the plants and several outlets can be used where a plant needs a lot of water. The pipes can be cut with a Stanley knife or similar and a lubricant when assembling the push-fit joints will make life much easier. Adding extra bits on is a simple job once you have the basic installation in place. The pipes can be fixed to the wall with purpose made brackets which need a screw and plug fixing or neatly tied cable under railings etc.

The parts are all available at the local *Ferretaria* or *Bricolage* type places and you will need a new outside tap with a branch to feed the timer or programmer, a roll of "big" plastic pipe and a roll of "small" pipe together with the bends, tees, connectors, valves and pipe clips as decided in the planning stage. It is worth laying the large pipe out flat in the sun for a few hours to let it straighten before attempting installation.

Whichever outside tap you decide to use should be removed (don't forget to turn the water off first) and replaced with the new one, it is often necessary to fit a spacer to move the tap out from the wall to make enough room to fit the programmer, be very careful at this point - some of these taps, especially those exposed to the sun all day, have a nasty tendency to shear off and the repair involves chiselling a hole in your wall to expose the pipes and fittings that will need replacing. These are soldered fittings and can be quite tricky to replace. With the new tap in place the programmer can be fitted and checked for clearance. Remember you will need to access the programmer every year or two to replace the batteries, so make sure it's accessible. After that follow your plan for running the large pipe to wherever you need it. This pipe is pierced as necessary and the smaller pipe to the outlets fitted.

After fitting, the system needs balancing, that is where flow is adjusted to all points on the system. Start by regulating the flow to the programmer from its branch on the new tap, then open each feeder valve to suit the requirements of the plants they serve; balancing valves controlling the water flow to different floors or areas can now be adjusted to get the right amount of water to each section. It will take a week or two to get exactly right but at least your plants will survive the summer.

THE ANDALUCIAN ERE SCANDAL CONTINUES.

Former Public Works Minister, Socialist Magdalena Álvarez on Tuesday was formally named in an ongoing investigation into a fraud scandal involving an Andalusia government fund used to help pay jobless benefits. Seville Judge Mercedes Alaya said the former Socialist minister, who also served as economic and finance chief for the regional government from 1994 to 2004, "laid down the rules" in how the money was transferred from the Andalusia budget into the fund. (Alvarez is currently the vice president for Trans-European Networks at the European Investment Bank (EIB), where she earns €20,000 per month!) "Now is the time to take a qualitative step in the investigation and determine the participation of other persons and their activities [...] which would have allowed the misuse of fund transfers, resulting in the waste of public funds," the judge wrote in her ruling. Alaya, who has been conducting the inquiry for more than a year, also named 19 current and former officials of Andalusia's Socialist government for allegedly misusing public money.

The fund was set up by the government to help cash-strapped businesses to pay severance pay to laid-off workers. However, the investigation so far has shown that hundreds of people, such as family members of certain officials, illegally received money from the fund, including those who never worked at any of the companies that benefited from the trust. Judge Alaya has found that some 140 million euro of public money may have been embezzled between 2001 and 2010.

The scandal has rocked the Socialists who have been governing Spain's largest region for nearly 30 years. The Socialist president of Andalucia, José Antonio Griñán, who was scheduled to retire in 2016 has now resigned 'for personal and family reasons'. Griñán is also expected to be indicted shortly as auditors submitted 15 reports on the irregularities while Griñán was Andalucia's finance chief and it seems he ignored them.

The judge has already ordered several former officials held in preventive custody, including Francisco Javier Guerrero, the region's former labour

HEY DUDE, WHERE'S MY FAT BELLY..... AND MY MEMORY?

A court in Palma, Majorca upheld an appeal by the victim to overturn a 2012 ruling which had cleared the medical professionals of any blame.

The 38-year-old man was undergoing cosmetic surgery on his "abdomen and thighs" in 2006 when he suffered a cardiac arrest, according to the Spanish daily, Qué. After being discharged he was diagnosed with ' cerebral anoxia', which caused him to suffer shortterm memory problems, disorientation and difficulties with speech. Doctors say he finds it difficult to remember concepts he has learned only minutes earlier, and that he can't recognize false memories. The man was declared permanently disabled as a result of the incident because of the cognitive disorders and the associated changes in behaviour that they have provoked. These include increased anxiety and aggression, as well as reduced verbal fluency and thinking speed. The original 2012 court ruling went against the man because he had signed an informed consent form. But the victim alleged that the waiver was invalid because it did not contain enough information. The court upheld this appeal and ruled that the man was not properly informed of the risks of the surgery or anaesthesia. There was found to be no specific reference to the surgery in the consent form other than in the title and a single mention of the word 'liposuction'. No information about anaesthesia was included in informed consent section of the 'pre-operation exam' form. Instead, only the patient's handwritten name, the name of the doctor, and the date were given. The surgeon and anaesthetist have now been ordered to pay €160,217

TELECOM COMPLAINTS UP.

Vodafone heads the list of telecom complaints in Spain's FACUA Consumers in Action for the first half of this year. The multinational British operator is also rated as the worst by its mobile phone clients. More than 30% of the telecom's complaints related to Vodafone. In second place in comm's complaints is Movistar with 25% of the complaints in the sector down two on last year, Orange at 24% up 5% since last year, fourth is Ono with 10%, 2% more than last year and fifth Jazztel at 8%, 3% higher than last year. The main reasons for complaints are failing to meet the advertised offers, unrequested & unwanted services, continuing to send invoices after the consumer has left the company, and charging for calls which were not made.

FACUA has accused the Government and the regional administrations of ignoring the problems in the sector. The telecoms sector is the one with the second most *denuncias*, behind only the banks.

FED UP WITH COLD CALLS?

The phone companies in Spain have been told to control their telesales operations. New legislation forces Movistar, Vodafone, Orange, Jazztel, Ono and Yoigo to cold call only between 10am and 8.30pm on weekdays, and 10am – 2pm on Saturdays. Cold calling is banned on Sundays. The new regulations do not affect other companies who want to bother you when they feel like it. One thing you can do about them, although it will not necessarily work, it will give you something to say when you get a cold call.

Go to the page *listarobinson.es* and register your name. Cold calling companies are supposed to look at this list to see the people who do not want calling. If you do get a call when you are on the Robinson List, you can tell the caller that she is breaking the law by calling a number on the Robinson List, (a slight exaggeration but it works well!). Typically Spanish.

THE FACE OF EVIL.

This wretch in the photo is José Bretón. Just two weeks ago, a jury of seven women and two men found him guilty of murdering his two children, Ruth and José, aged

6 and 2 on October 8, 2011. Although the jury vote was unanimous, a majority of seven would have been sufficient for a guilty vote (and five for a not-guilty vote).

Bretón said he lost the children while taking them to a park. Described as a 'very cold character,' Bretón is separated from his wife who



was also divorcing him. It is believed that Bretón gave the children tranquillizers and then took the bodies to his parents' farm in Córdoba. There he took the bodies, and together with 250 kg of firewood and 80 litres of diesel, tried to incinerate and obliterate the remains, the fire reaching temperatures up to 1,200 degrees.

A search of the parents farm near Córdoba revealed some bones, which an inept coroner initially stated were animal bones. A competent forensic scientist hired by the mother later revealed that the bones were indeed human. However no DNA was found. The forensic scientist did however find human teeth, and confirmed that they belonged to two children aged between 2 and 6.

Bretón, who is believed to have killed the children in revenge for his wife leaving him, has been sentenced to a total of 40 years in jail, 20 for each murder. But, under the Spanish legal system, he is unlikely to serve more than 25 years. Let's hope that these are very demanding.

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GOVERNMENT RENEGES ON PROMISE TO PAY SUPPLIERS.

The third service provider payment-plan will not even cover half of last year's unpaid invoices by the end of 2013. Of the 19.35 billion euros of unpaid bills, the first stage of payments will cover only 8.2 billion euros, and the Finance Ministry won't free up these funds until the end of the year. Priority will be given to town councils, which will receive 3 billion euros, followed by the regional governments.

Most of the private sector service providers will have to wait until next year to receive their payments. Companies in the construction, contracting and lending businesses that work with service providers are understandably angered at the newest delays, even if they are not voicing their frustration loudly. The government's inability to pay these service providers on time is the main reason that their balance sheets are in disarray, and they are tired of financing the public sector's spending in this way.

The healthcare industry has been hit hardest by delayed service provider payments, racking up a total of 7 billion \in in back payments. The pharmaceutical industry in particular has 3.53 billion \in in unpaid hospital medicines. The pharmaceutical companies are trying to channel investments outside of Spain and have even started to increase their foreign sales in order to compensate for domestic sales struggles.

Service providers have had to make a series of cutbacks to their staff and salaries, but these will have little effect because now they will have to wait even longer to receive their payments. Cristóbal Montoro, who promised to reduce the term that Public Administrations have to pay their service providers to just 30 days by the end of this year, was not able to keep his word. And 2012 invoices will still be unpaid as we enter 2014 as companies keep financing the government. (ElEconomista)

STAMP FRAUD.

The pyramid selling of rare stamps (Ponzi fraud scheme) in Spain has finally led 14 directors of **Afinsa** to the accused bench. The judge has set bail at 1.928 billion \in The judge says that the stamp investing was just a cover-up which has seen the defrauding of 190,000 clients. Many of the investors are pensioners for whom investing their savings in rare stamps appeared a more attractive option than placing them in a lower-return bank savings account. The personal investments ranged from 600 to 600,000!

Customers bought a series of stamps, which the company promised to buy back in the future. The customer was also paid interest on the stamps' value, say 6% over three years. Customers were strongly discouraged from taking the stamps home, as 'stamps were very delicate and the more expensive they were, the more vulnerable they were to damage.' The company also offered to hold the stamps in safekeeping for the clients free of charge! Surprisingly, very few buyers even asked to see the stamps and those that did were just shown the same stamps as other customers who asked.

The court is accusing the Afinsa directors of fraud, punishable insolvency, and the laundering of capital. The first arrests were made in May 2006 and it is not until seven years later that the leaden wheels of justice are starting to turn. One of the Spanish consumer associations, ADICAE, has been warning the government and the public about these type of operations since 2002 but were largely ignored.

A similar company, **Forum Filatélico**, operated around the same time and went bust with a debt black-hole of more than 3 billion. It is believed that around 400,000 investors in total have been defrauded by both companies.



Eggs, cholesterol, Omega-3 fatty acids and beer.

One of the problems with modern living is that food we were once told was bad for us is now good and vice versa. Back in the early 70's, the American Heart Foundation recommended limiting egg intake to three a week. Since then this theory has been debunked by a number of sources, the latest being the University of Granada. Health professionals traditionally insisted that eating eggs increased cholesterol levels, however, the most recent research suggests that increased serum cholesterol is more affected by intake of saturated fats and transfats -- present in red meat, industrial baked goods, etc. -- than by the amount of cholesterol in the The research, which involved nine countries, diet. demonstrated that eating larger amounts of egg is neither linked to higher serum cholesterol nor to worse cardiovascular health in adolescents, regardless of their levels of physical activity. The conclusions, published in the journal Nutrición Hospitalaria, confirm recent studies in healthy adults that suggest that an intake of up to seven eggs a week is not associated with an increased risk of developing cardiovascular diseases. The taking of 'supplements' has always been surrounded by controversy. Of these, Omega-3 fatty acids, which are found naturally in oily fish, have long been hailed as protection against a host of maladies including heart attacks and strokes, arthritis and various cancers. But a recent controversial study found that men with high levels of omega-3 in their blood were at 43% greater risk of prostate cancer than those with low concentrations, while less common aggressive "highgrade" tumours were 71% more likely than in those not taking supplements. The difference in blood concentrations of the fatty acids between the two groups was the equivalent of more than two portions of salmon per week, researchers said. Now this is not excessive. It is unclear why omega-3 increased the risk of the disease but the effect could be related to the body's conversion of fatty acids into compounds which can damage cells and DNA, and suppress the immune system, researchers said. They also have higher intake of iodine, which is likely to prevent prostate cancer.....A more plausible explanation of what's going on here is that men with high Omega 3 in their blood ALSO have high mercury levels, from consuming fish. Omega 3 and mercury are correlated because they both come from fish. There is evidence that mercury (and other pollutants that come from fish, like PCBs, and brominated fire retardants) cause prostate cancer.'

In this hot weather, dehydration is a common problem. Men need to drink about three litres a day, women 2.2 litres. The Spanish Society of Dietetics and Food Sciences has now revealed that beer is good for hydration! Now how many Phd's did they have to determine this? They recommend a moderate intake of beer for men - two to three cañas a day but only one or two for women. They warn that in healthy adults, a dehydration of 2.8% of body weight after exposure to heat and strong exercise, leads to a decrease in concentration & short-term memory, increased fatigue, head pain and reduced response times. The History of Spain, Part 33. Recap' of 19th Century, Economic Development and the Rise of Anarchism. 20

Recap: Looking back very briefly over 19th Century Spain, we By the start of the 20th century, the bulk of the land still saw war with Britain, invasion by France, disruption to the remained in the grasp of the Church, industrialists and the monarchial line, regular interference by the army in the running large estates of the land-owning nobles. of the country and the disappearance of the Spanish Empire.

The resumption of hostilities with Britain led to the destruction Mining Act of 1868, a mine could be established for the of the French and Spanish fleets by Nelson at Cape Trafalgar in 1805. The French military occupation of the country led to the departure of Ferdinand VII to France, where he ceded the Spanish throne to the Bonaparte's. The occupation also led to a popular and violent uprising by the Spanish. The rebel Spanish investors an annual average return of 70% on capital leadership fled from Seville to Cádiz. Here the Cortes of Cádiz invested! convened in 1810 under the leadership of the liberals. After much discussion (two years!) they promulgated a new constitution with Spain becoming a parliamentary monarchy, and would later abolish the Inquisition. A combined British, Portuguese and Spanish force, under the command of the Duke of Wellington, defeated the French at the Battle of Vitoria. On his return Ferdinand quashed the new constitution and established an absolute monarchy. The Spanish American colonies used the chaos in Spain to break away from the *patria*, with the exception of Cuba and Puerto Rico. The Philippines in the Pacific also remained as a colony for the present.

The pronunciamiento of Major Rafael de Riego in 1920, once again brought the parliamentary monarchy to the fore but it also gave the army a taste for interfering in politics, which they continued to do for the remainder of the century. There were pronunciamientos and more pronunciamientos, interspersed with three wars with the Carlists - a reactionary and legitimist political movement from the north of Spain; a brief experiment with a Spanish Republic, abdications and finally a Restoration System, where a constitutional monarchy was re-established and a new constitution in 1876. Betweeen 1875 and 1923, the turno *pacifico* was devised so that the Conservative and Liberal parties could alternate power through managed (rigged) elections.

In 1898 Spain was shaken and humiliated by the loss of Cuba, Puerto Rico and the Philippines to the 'sausage makers' in the United States. Referred to as 'the Disaster', this loss of national prestige caused much soul-searching and talk of 'regeneration.' One philosopher-writer, José Prtega y Gasset, commented, 'In Spain, there is a good deal to see but not much to eat. Spain today, rather than a nation, is a cloud of dust remaining after a great people galloped down the highway of history.' Although the country may have been at 'rock-bottom', the first quarter of the 20th century witnessed the highest cultural level in Spain since the 17th century with writers of the calibre of Machado, Juan Ramon Jimenez, a Noble Prize winner, Pio Baroja and Jacinto Benavente, another Noble Prize winner. In the latter part of the 19th century and the beginning of the 20th,, Basque and Catalan nationalism began to be more vocal and demanding. Economic development: Although in this series of articles I have not covered much about the economic development of Spain, it was in these two regions, Basque & Catalan, that the country's industrial strength lay. Although they were still a half-century behind Britain and much of Europe, protectionism still kept many foreign imports out, particularly cheap American wheat. Luddism was also often a problem, even into the early part of the 20th century when peasants in Catalonia destroyed a local meteorological station and killed the director as they believed the station caused drought.

But Spain was still mainly an agrarian society, although an inefficient one, not benefiting from the modern technological advances in the sector or the transport revolution. Average yield per hectare was around half that of France and Germany. Of Spain's three main crops, wheat, olives and vines, it was cereal production that occupied more than 50% of all arable land. Until 1931 it represented twice the total value in money terms of all other agricultural production, and five times coal, iron and steel production put together.

But one of the biggest problems of the 19th century was the failure of successive Spanish rulers and governments to facilitate and promote land distribution and ownership among the public.

It was in the south that mining came to the fore. With the equivalent of £20. Spain was the bargain basement of the world for copper, lead, iron, mercury and zinc. Rio Tinto was the flagship of the mining bonanza. Established in 1873, between 1897 and 1911 it yielded British and Spanish

Despite the lowest wages in Spain and a deadly level of contamination, the famished and desperate southerners had no option but to work in these hell-hole mines or in the sweltering above-ground furnaces. Dreadful conditions led to some savage industrial conflicts and the massacre of a peaceful demonstration in front of a town hall in 1888. The conniving and repressive attitude of the Spanish authorities shocked even the conservative deputy for the area who reported the slaughter to parliament.

The rise of Anarchism: Prior to 1868, social unrest was normally an agrarian phenomenon, but now with the growth of industry and the equally onerous working conditions in that sector, new political groupings began to emerge in the south and in Barcelona, hoping to improve the lot of the worker. The anarchists' political philosophy first came to Spain in 1868. This was based on the teachings of the Russian Mikhail Bakunin. He called for the end of all governments. He stated that 'The new world will be won only after the last king has been strangled in the guts of the last priest.' The starving, exploited and destitute peasants of Murcia, Andalucia and Extramadura had had enough and were now looking to revolutionary violence propaganda by deed' to better their miserable lives. Within five years there were 50,000 Spanish anarchists and their violent philosophy soon spread to many other regions in Spain.

In 1883, a conspiracy by the anarchists to murder the entire upper class of Andalucia was uncovered and 14 anarchists were garrotted in Cádiz. Later thousands of peasants armed with sickles marched into Jerez de la Frontera and attacked anyone wearing good clothes. Bombings by the anarchists began in the 1890's and were indiscriminate.

The government responded to these bombings with equal savagery. Following a bombing in Barcelona, there was a mass arrest of 400 suspects. Many were horribly tortured, several dying before they came to trial. Five were eventually executed but the original culprit was never found. There was considerable international outrage at the treatment of the prisoners at the time.

During a performance of William Tell in the Gran Teatre del Liceu, Barcelona, in November 1893, two bombs were thrown into the audience. Twenty people were killed and many more injured.

Anarchists would later assassinate three prime ministers, wound another and make two unsuccessful attempts to kill the king. The anarchists would then form a trade union, the Anarcho-Syndicalist union, CNT - Confederacion Nacional del Trabjo - in 1910 'for a final battle against a decrepit capitalist society.' The CNT would have a membership of 700,000 by 1919!

By contrast the founding of the Marxist Spanish Socialist Party, the PSOE, was almost muted in 1879. Their disciplined, legalistic approach failed to strike a chord with the majority of Spanish workers, with the result that their membership grew very slowly until the 1930's.


