Bienvenido a todos and welcome to the April edition.

For those who pay to have it delivered to your post box or by email, your subscription is now due. I will be sending out a PayPal request shortly, so you have one months grace. Many of you have already subscribed for the coming year, so just ignore the PayPal request if you have already paid.

There have been some movements in the retail/leisure outlets locally. Los Lobos in Via Park III has now been taken over by Dave of 'Dave's' in Punta Marina. It is now called Dave's 2. What used to be called Spud Murphy's in Via Park III, will be changed to a new pharmacy in a month or two. Lidl's have reopened their old store in Calle Mosca. It is now a massive retail outlet. Aldi's have also opened another new store. This time it is in Torrevieja, quite close to the Iceland/Overseas Supermarket.

The property outlook continues to improve according to the notaries. Sales up 27%, mortgage lending up 30%, house prices up 2%: It looks like January was a great start to the year for the Spanish property market, although new property sales are down significantly over January 2015, resales continue to grow. Many commentators were worried that the political situation might put off buyers and undermine the recovery. That doesn't appear to have happened to date, although the political uncertainty remains. Money does however continue to flow out of Spain as you will see from the report on page 20.

We have enjoyed an incredibly warm winter here, with a day of showers very recently. If you live here or are visiting soon, do check outside your property for stagnant water - the preferred breeding ground for mosquitos. The highly dangerous Tiger mosquito has already been spotted by a research project in Punta Prima and Campoamor and you can be sure that these pests are also in your area.

The Spanish Meteorological Agency warns of a warmer and drying spring than normal with 2° higher on average. And you can bet that this summer, once again, will be a scorcher - so be prepared.

Watch out for: Fake €20 notes. The numbers on the fakes end with the numbers '854.'

Please keep your dog on a lead when outside your home. A careless owner let a dog loose while relaxing on Via Park III and the dog unfortunately was then run-over by a car. This is pure carelessness and it is not the first time a dog was killed there in such circumstances.

With the weather improving and more people returning to the coast, we will also see the usual influx of chancers, crooks, con-men and women. People collecting for children's charities and others at your gates are not what they seem. Collecting for charity by calling on homes is not allowed in Spain. Don't be fooled!

Did you know that

...the most expensive ham in the world comes from the Huelva province in southwest Spain. Dehesa Maladúa is the world's most expensive ham, coming in at a hefty \pounds ,100 a leg! This prize-winning ham comes from a rare breed of pig called the Manchado de Jabugo, which takes its name from the distinctive dark patches on the animals' coats. Dehesa



Maladúa's founder, Eduardo Donato, helped rescue the breed from extinction a quarter of a century ago when he moved to the tiny community of

Cortegana, in southwestern Spain's Huelva province. Donato, aged 67, produces just 80 hams a year, and says the secret of his success is "patience, passion, and pleasure." The Manchado de Jabugo breed has been kept alive over the years by a handful of dedicated farmers like Donato. A Manchado de Jabugo pig takes up to three years to reach maturity, while other varieties can be sold when they are as young as 14 months. It then takes another six years before the ham is fully cured. Manchado de Jabugo ham's unique taste comes from the fact that the pigs eat only natural ingredients. Donato allows them to forage for acorns, almonds and to root around in the rolling woodlands of Huelva, which is washed by Atlantic rains. His customers are happy to pay top dollar, knowing they are acquiring a unique product as well as helping to save a rare breed. What's more, Manchado de Jabugo ham not only tastes wonderful, but it's good for you as well, being rich in protein, vitamins B1 and B6 and healthy minerals. High in unsaturated fatty acids, a 100 gram portion (which would cost around €50) provides around 185 calories. ... if you complete a Spanish tax return, there is a box

on it which, if ticked, will donate a percentage of your paid income tax to the Catholic church. This is of course discriminatory as other religions do not benefit from this largesse.



Last year, this passive system of donation raised €250 million for the Catholic church, from 34.76% of all taxpayers in Spain.

Once again the Easter processions are solemn, impressive, packed and costly. The above photo is of the massive Virgin of the Dove pasos in Málaga. Putting on two pasos, or processions, in Seville will set you back €25,000 (\$34,000), the member of one brotherhood told Spain's El Mundo newspaper recently. The music bands alone cost up to €7,000 while the wreaths of flowers for the floats can cost €6,000. Add to that €5,000 to candles, up to €8,000 if you need to bring in extra muscle to carry your floats, and €800 for damage insurance in case it rains. Semana Santa is not a cheap affair. Some unions have been organising 'Workers Processions' in protest!

Because no party managed enough voter support for an overall congressional majority of 176 seats, political leaders have been forced to embark on a flurry of cross-party negotiations. They are now trying to build a coalition government, or at least secure enough backing to get one nominee into the prime minister's office at the helm of a minority government. But so far all negotiations have failed, putting Spain in the unprecedented situation of facing a repeat election if no successful nominee emerges within the next two months.

El Mundo reports that the Government will try to avoid S&P, the rating's agency, from placing Cataluña as broke or bankrupt - even though it is! They have asked the rating's agency to soften their report and degrade the debt of 72 billion € in the Catalan Generalitat to the lowest level of 'junk bond.' The Catalans, as you are aware, want to separate from Spain. They feel that with a separatist/independent state, they can do much better. However, in recent years they have shown themselves to be incompetent and, when you take the current Pujol investigation into account, hugely corrupt! If you had your car ITV tested in Catalonia, chances are the Pujols got a commission from it!

El Mundo reports that Cataluña has asked the State to pay the wages bill in the Catalan Generalitat Regional Government which comes to 700 million €; but then, two of the kn*b-head separatists, Oriol Junqueras and Artur Mas, want the Madrid government to hand over €7.5 billion to avoid bankruptcy in the profligate province before the 'disconnection,' i.e. before they 'separate' from Spain. Dream on!

AENA, the Spanish Airport Authority, has approved the freezing of airport landing tariffs until 2021 having reduced this years charges by 1.9% on the instructions of the National Commission for Market Values.

There has been a lengthy strike by rubbish collectors in Málaga. More than 6,000 tons of rubbish lined the streets in the city and 171 rubbish containers have been burned to the ground! Tourists have been taking 'selfie' photos of themselves and the rubbish! What beautiful scenery!

airport management company, which was privatised a year ago rose to 833.5 billion \in up 74.2% on the year. The company which manages a network of 46 airports and two heliports presented the figure to the National Commission for Market Values. The Public Treasury obtained, after paying dividends, more than 207.3 million \in

El Mundo reports 80% of the under 30's still live with their parents. Half of them are working on temporary contracts and in low quality employment.

Evictions fell by a mere 1.1% last year to 67,359. Cataluña is the worst offender with 15,557 (23.1%) and then Andalucía with 10,694 and Valencia Community with 10,037. Far, far too high.

Spain was the world's number one wine exporter in 2015, setting a new record with sales of nearly 24 million hectolitres, in 🦯 which brought revenues of €2.6 billion. Those figures easily beat the 20 million by Italy and the 15 million hectolitres exported hectolitres by France, the second- and third-biggest global exporters, respectively. That said, Spain is still far from the \in 8 billion in revenue earned by France last year, or the more than €5 billion by Italy. The reason for the difference? The average sale price of Spanish wine is just €1.10 a litre, 2.9% down on 2014.

The British Ministry of Defence has invested 10 million €in Gibraltar airport. The terminal belongs to the Royal Air Force, although it accepts civilian flights, and London wants to increase its strategic position. The investment guarantees the airport's operation for the next 20 years in a program to resurface the runway.

The Basque supermarket chain Eroski has sold a 'lot' of 36 hypermarkets to Carrefour for 205 million €.

Mortgage signings increased in 2015 by 19.8% at 244,827. The average interest rate on homes was 3.37% compared to 3.5% in 2014.

Two years in jail for the former president of Caja Castilla-La Mancha. The National Court blames Juan Pedro Hernández Moltó for falsifying the accounts of the first entity which ended bankrupt in 2009. Another two years of prohibition from the financial industry. Just two years! His fine is equivalent to 0.0004% of the 7.13 billion €spent on the savings banks rescue.

More than 100 people have been detained for illegally bringing Chinese people into the EU. Agents from the Spanish National Police and security forces in Britain, France and Italy have uncovered the illegal trafficking network. The criminal trafficking network used Spanish airports to arrive in Europe and then the Chinese passengers were sent to Britain, France or Italy. According to a Spanish National Police spokesman, all the members of the criminal network were of Chinese origin. Among the arrested are the leaders of the operation at Spanish airports of Madrid, Barcelona. Málaga, Bilbao, Palma de Mallorca, Alicante and Arrecife used as staging posts to send on their compatriots into Europe. Over 150 fake passports were also seized.

El País report the PP in Valencia charged commission on hospitals. The investigators believe the illegal financing of the PP included health centres.

Whistleblowers are often a target in Spain. This is largely because they embarrass when they uncover the corruption and shame of the guilty. But the actions of one of Spain's largest trade union made me gasp. El Mundo reported that the UGT union has called for jail for the person who uncovered the ERE fraud in Andalucía. They accused him of the 'revelation of secrets' for copying 22,500 documents when he was an administrator. The ERE fraud, which I have covered in previous issues, is one of the two big frauds in socialist Andalucia.....and the unions have also been up to their necks in it! The man who leaked the corruption in the UGT union in Andalucía is the whistleblower, Roberto Macías, who is also quoted as saying 'From day to day in UGT, they inflated invoices.' But a recent development in this case also surprised me. Because of the size of the case, magistrates are recommending that if the individual offence is more than 10 years old and if the amount involved is less than €430,000, then the case should be shelved! Who says crime doesn't pay?

An eight-year-old in Majorca stabbed a 12-year-old in the chest following an argument over a skateboard. The victim is in a serious condition but as the aggressor is underage, he remains criminally unimpeachable.

Three young thieves, aged 19, 16 and 15, stole a funeral hearse in Almeria in early March. The hearse had a coffin inside but no body. The youths crashed the vehicle shortly afterwards causing more than €5,000 worth of damage.

Spanish customs authorities intercepted a 15-metre sloop 90 miles off the coast of Cartagena. The yacht contained eight tons of hashish sealed in 320 packages. The crew had to travel on deck as there was no room left in the cabins.

A 'Dear John.'

The British soldier serving in Afghanistan was annoyed when his girl wrote breaking off their engagement and asking for her photograph back.

What the hell has been going on in Polop, Alicante?



In October 2007, the mayor of Polop, Alejandro Ponsoda (photo), was shot outside of his home and died in Alicante General Hospital eight days later.

Ponsoda was a popular mayor, being elected mayor first in May 1995, and then again in 1999, 2003 and 2007.

A brief chronology of the case:

November 2, 2007 .- John Cano was elected mayor by the municipal council.

October 24, 2008 .- The City of Polop unanimously approved a motion that the Prefectures and the court that the murder of Alejandro Ponsoda be clarified as it had been outstanding for a year.

November 3, 2009 .- The Civil Guard detained a man in Albatera (Alicante) on suspicion of the death of Alexander Ponsoda. The detainee was being sought since February 2008 for another investigation.

November 15, 2009 .- A businessman in the footwear sector of an industrial estate in Polop was arrested for alleged involvement in the

case. Two days later, he entered prison.

November 18, 2009 .- The Civil Guard detained the Uruguayan manager of a hostess club (photo). He entered prison two days later.



November 19, 2009 - The City of Polop de la Marina (Alicante) announced a private prosecution in the case. November 20, 2009 - The Civil Guard detained two men of Czech nationality. Both were admitted to prison three

days later, for their alleged connection with the case. November 20, 2009 .- A new arrest occurs, this time the owner of the hostess club.

November 24, 2009 .- The mayor of Polop, Juan Cano (PP), was arrested in relation to the murder of his predecessor. He now refuses to testify.

November 24, 2009 . The first deputy mayor, Maria Dolores Zaragoza is now the acting mayor.

All were released a few months after entering prison.

The case has now been stalled for several years, but then in late February this year, the principal witness for the prosecution (a janitor, who states that he heard the assassination being planned in the hostess club) states that he has been receiving death threats and has also been offered a bribe of €30,000 to change his evidence.

El Corte Ingles state that they will claim compensation of five million €per year for loss of income if they are forced to close on Sundays in this region. The company has 88 department stores, 43 Hipercor hypermarkets and more than 200 supermarkets under brands Supercor and Opencor. In addition they own the DIY chain Bricor, the fashion shops Sfera, the Opticians 2000, their 500 Viajes El Corte Inglés outlets, the car workshops Motortown, Computer stores and the Telecor shops.

The current full time workforce is over 80,800. For the first time in its history, El Corte Ingles has allowed a foreign shareholder. This is the Sheik Hamad Bin Jassim Bin Jaber al Thani, a member of the royal family and former prime minister of Qatar, who was prepared to exchange 1 billion \in for 10% of the company. Earlier last month El Corte Inglés reported that it was planning to sell some 200 properties valued at one billion \in .

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

A sex shop in Torrevieja has branched out into sex aids for dogs. So far, the only thing they have is an inflatable human leg. Orihuela City Council has tripled in less than a year, the average payment period to suppliers. It now takes the council four months to pay their bills. As they have broken government guidelines with this, the Hacienda has refused to allow the council to delay the repayment of a loan of \$45,650 for the normal 10 year period from 2013. The Havienda has demanded that, as a penalty, the council repay the loan immediately.

Unfortunately, Orihuela has also been less than efficient with the tenders for the first aid and lifeguard service on its 11 beaches. A short term contract has had to be ordered for the Easter period as critical dates in the process will not be met. The main contract will be issued for a two year period and cost €420,000 per annum.

Regrettably it is the same story in Torrevieja, with the town council also 'dragging its heels' and having to settle for intermittent contracts. Here it is a three-year contract of around S75,000 annually, renewable for a further three-years - more than three million euros in all. One has to question the general level of competence with these local councils. It seems that Torrevieja have brought a former councilor out of retirement at the cost of S0,000 p.a., (this sum would equate to his S0,000-year-year public pension!) so that the renewal of the rubbish contract and others such as the bus contract - can be dealt with appropriately. This new job was not advertised but hand-picked by the new left-wing mayor. The Spanish newspaper, Informacion, described the council's handling of the contracts as "Cluelessness." The PP opposition believe that the current council want to 'municipalise' the rubbish contract at all costs.

A flock of seagulls collided with a Norwegian Airlines

flight just 10 minutes after the plane took off from Alicante-Elche Airport in early March. The plane, which was on route to Munich at around 7am, had to return to Alicante. The birds hit one wing and the nose of the plane. No one was injured but some of the 150 passengers were reported to be very distressed after what was reported to be a very 'heavy' landing. Only two days previously, Aena (the aviation authority) and the Town Halls of Alicante and Elche had detected a

new zone of gathering birds, mostly seagulls attracted by a rubbish tip in Fontcalent which is close to the runways. The birds would fly over the airport at dusk and dawn while going from and returning to their nesting areas. Another aircraft was called from the UK and the passengers were ferried to their destination in the afternoon. The operators at the dump have promised to step up their vigilance.....now, doesn't that make you feel better?

Nine cats were poisoned in Pilar de la Horadada on Saturday, March12. Last September in the nearby El Mjon area, 14 cats were also poisoned. The poison is believed to be a substance to control crop pests.

Not really a local story but illustrative of a major Spanish work problem - absenteeism. The Policia Local in Palma, Mallorca, appear to be a very delicate bunch with nearly a third of them claiming to be ill. With 257 of the 885 agents supposedly ill, it is impossible to run an efficient



service. No doubt the thieves, rapists and other assorted villains are quite happy with the situation.

The three desalination plants will not supply enough water for Ibiza this summer' the general director of Hydraulic Resources has warned about the continuing drought and the increasing number of tourists which could 'complicate' the situation.

In 2004 the British community in Torrevieja had more than 12,000 residents. Most were pensioners with home ownership in the city. Today they remain the largest foreign group with 8,000 registered residents, but with a decrease in numbers of 4,000. A similar trend has occurred in the case of the German community who now have just over 2,000 registered on the census. Once they came close to 5,000 and was the second largest foreign community in the city by population. Now it ranks fifth, overtaken by residents of Russian origin that despite the economic crisis afflicting the country has consolidated its presence in Torrevieja with more than 5,000 on the census.

The high speed AVE rail link between Alicante and Valencia should be in place after 2017. The new AVE route should reduce the travelling time between the cities to one hour. It is also planned to introduce a bus shuttle service between the AVE point in Alicante and Benidorm.

The Richest & The Poorist.

The leafy Madrid dormitory town of Pozuelo is Spain's richest town, while Torrevieja, a run-down resort on the coast of Alicante province, remains the poorest, according to the latest municipal wealth and inequality survey published by the National Statistics Institute (INE).

The study covers 109 Spanish municipalities throughout Spain, and shows that at €70,298, annual household income in Poseulo, around 15 kilometers to the northwest of the capital, is five times that of Torrevieja's €13,977. Pozuelo is dotted with exclusive gated communities that are home to soccer players and other celebrities. Torrevieja has a significant number of retirees living all year round, many of them from the UK and Germany, and its economy is largely dependent on the summer season.

In general, the north of Madrid is home to the capital's wealthiest inhabitants: in Majadahonda, the country's second-wealthiest town, annual household income is around €6,000. Four more of Spain's 10 richest municipalities are also to be found around the capital: Alcobendas, Las Rozas, San Sebastián de los Reyes, and the city center itself.

Unsurprisingly, the survey reveals a close link between household income and joblessness, a relationship particularly evident in Andalusia where many of the poorest municipalities in Spain are located: Sanlúcar de Barrameda (42.3% unemployment), La Línea de la Concepción (40.1%), and Jerez (39.4%). Unemployment in Pozuelo is nine percent, while its similarly wealthy neighbors have comparable levels of joblessness.

The survey also provides insight into the gap between rich and poor within Spain's major cities: data from 2012 puts average annual household income in the capital's two wealthiest neighborhoods, El Viso and La Piovera, in the northern area of Madrid, above $\leq 100,000$. Barcelona's Pedralbes comes in third at $\otimes 2,755$. The poorest neighborhoods in Spain are to be found in the south of Seville: Polígono Sur, Los Pájaros and Amate, where average income is little over $\leq 12,000$ a year.

The INE survey is part of the European Union's Urban Adult project, which measures living conditions in cities throughout the EU. (El Pais)

(As you will see from this report in El Pais, Torrevieja is described as a 'run-down resort'! A bit unfair and uninformed I think. Tourism towns generate surprisingly low incomes, witness Torrevieja, Benidorm (20,003) 7th from bottom), Marbella (8th from bottom with 20,401). This is largely, I believe, because of the poorly paid service industry. Large numbers of restaurant, bar and cleaning staff can have a depressive effect on the figures. But in terms of the local economy, this is more than compensated by the massive amounts of cash earned and spent by expats. Expat incomes/pensions are not included in these figures, which refer to the whole household income. British Contribution to Spanish Health Service.

The British Government has revealed how much it repays the Spanish Health Service.

Last year the amount returned was 285 million € hardly 0.5% of the total cost of the Spanish Health Service, for the services to the retired or tourists.

David Cameron has warned in the case of Brexit the British <u>could</u> lose their right to live in Spain and no longer obtain a free health service. It's estimated some 750,000 Britons live in Spain, mostly to retire. Another 15 million people visit from the UK each year for their holidays.

Cameron was forced to reveal the figures after a parliamentary question was placed by Labour.

In total the British Government shared 670 million pounds (857 million €) paying European health services. France gets the second largest repayment at 150 million pounds, followed by Germany at 25.9 million pounds.

On the other side of the coin the UK Government collects repayments totalling some 50 million pounds from other European Governments and Spain, despite the increasing population in Britain only returned 3.4 million pounds.

Gunfight at the Windy Corral!

A gun battle broke out between feuding neighbours in eastern Spain after one farted within earshot of another.

The fracas erupted between gypsy (Spanish Romani) clans near Valencia, when a member of one family let rip while walking past a young man from the rival family shortly before midnight in late February.

The young man returned the insult in the same way; by farting in his direction.

The situation quickly escalated with a wife of one the men joining the fray claiming she was insulted, and then the other man's wife also getting involved, until guns were pulled and shots fired.

"In that way, what began as a bit of silliness grew more and more violent and ended up with a double shooting," reported the newspaper.

A 57-year-old was shot three times in the stomach and is being treated in the intensive care unit at Valencia Hospital where his condition is described as "serious".



His 29-year-old son received a bullet to the leg but is expected to make a full recovery.

Two other men were taken to hospital, but have since been discharged and four people have been arrested.

Around 50 police officers have been sent to patrol the neighbourhood of Xenillet in Torrent to keep the peace amid fears of revenge attacks. Other teams have been posted outside the hospital.

The neighbourhood is home to a large number of *gitano* families and the two clans involved in the scrap have been sworn enemies for decades, local media reported.

In-flight Snacks Marked up By as Much as 2,646%.

It's a rule of thumb that airline snacks are hellish expensive, but passengers flying with budget airlines may find themselves paying as much as 2,646% of the retail value for in-flight refreshments. Peanuts, chocolate and still water are all marked up to a staggering extent by low cost airlines, with Ryanair, Flybe and EasyJet among the worst offenders, according to new research by KAYAK, the travel search engine.

Flybe is responsible for the biggest mark-up, selling Cup a Soup (70g) for £2.50, when the same amount retails at just 12p in supermarkets – an increase of 2,646%. Thomas Cook Airlines sells the same product for £2.40, representing a 1,820% increase. Meanwhile, olives bought on an EasyJet flight, costing £1.80 for 65g, have been marked up by 1,259% from the average supermarket value of 22p for 100g.

It's a similar story for drinks: passengers on Ryanair can expect to pay $\pounds 2.34$ for a 500ml bottle of still water, a 1,324% increase on the supermarket price of 16p. The 'budget' airline also charges more for less, with passengers having to pay $\pounds 1.96$ for a 250ml can of cola, when the supermarket price is just 25p for a 330ml can.

"Airlines are providing a service when it comes to food and drink on board, which accounts for some of the mark-ups we see," says Loella Pehrsson, KAYAK Regional Director UK, Ireland & the Nordics.

"However, travellers are allowed to take food items through security, so it really makes sense to plan ahead and take your own snacks onto the plane. When it comes to drinks, get around the sky-high in-flight prices by purchasing drinks in the terminal."

Investors took €70.2 billion out of Spain in 2015, according to new balance of payment figures published in early March by the Bank of Spain.

The amount lies in billion investors put in December 2015 the general election taken out.

Nevertheless, the figures are a long way from the record set in 2012 when €170 billion was withdrawn from Spain.

The balance of payments is the result of looking at what Spaniards invest in outside of the country and what foreigners send to Spain over the same time period.

A number of legal firms have confirmed that owners of large fortunes have begun taking their capital out of Spain because of increasing uncertainty in the country following the inconclusive December general election, which has so far failed to produce a new government, as well as the risk of rising taxes.

The recent governing agreement signed between the Socialists and Ciudadanos includes a new tax on major fortunes and left-wing party Podemos has also included plans to increase levies on large sums.

The \notin 70.2 billion taken out last year is the result of the withdrawal of \notin 21.3 billion in direct investment and \notin 48.8 billion taken out of the country in the form of other investments, such as loans, repos and deposits.

Investors also withdrew €700 million in portfolio investments last year. In the area of financial derivatives alone there was an increase of €600 million taken out. (El Pais)

Spanish Inheritance Tax.

Remember, Spanish Inheritance (and Gift) Tax is unlike the UK one. Here, the beneficiary pays, not the estate, and you have just six months to pay it, otherwise penalty interest sets in. 



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Keep an Eye on Your Bank!

These bandits have been increasing their commissions by 25% to compensate for the very low interest rates. The Bank User's Association has produced a report which describes some of the increases in charges as 'outrageous.'

The Spanish banking sector already grabs €20 billion in income from customer commission charges. This represents 30% of their income.



A 68-year-old Spanish widow spent 56 hours on the Murcia, called the helpline number after seeing it advertised on television, not realizing it was actually a premium rate telephone number scam. One night the desperate woman saw a telephone number advertised on the TV with the message "call us and we'll help you" - so she did.

The woman was desperate to find a job for her 36-year-old unemployed son. He was depressed and they could barely pay their bills on her meagre widow's pension. She has now received a telephone bill for €1,400!

The scam, in which unsuspecting members of the public are made to call high cost telephone numbers, is one of the most common in Spain according to consumer watchdog, Thader.

Three people, two women and a man, have been arrested in Spain in February after duping an Australian woman out of €100,000 by posing as her online boyfriend and telling her he needed money for medical bills. The Australian woman, who has not been named, met "Robin" on an internet dating site in February 2014 and the pair struck up an online relationship.

In November 2014, the woman was contacted by a "friend" of Robin, who informed her that Robin had been in an accident in Spain and needed €5,000 for medical bills because of his lack of insurance. The woman transferred the money, but Robin's friend continued asking her for more, "for specialists, visits to hospitals with better medical teams and eventually, to be repatriated to Australia so the couple could be together", reported regional newspaper, Navarra.com.

Eventually, the woman handed over a total of around €100,000 to cover, what she thought, were her boyfriend's medical needs. But the plan came unstuck when the woman decided to visit Spain after receiving news that her boyfriend had died. On arrival in Spain she travelled straight to Navarra's Clínica Universidad hospital in Pamplona, the place where she had been told that Robin had died.

But staff at the hospital told her there was no record of anyone with that name having stayed at the hospital, much less died there.


