Bienvenido a todos and welcome to the October edition.

The weather has started to change now with the early mornings and evenings much cooler. A series of devastating wildfires, exacerbated by the prolonged drought, has racked the province during August and early September. It was



particularly bad in the Jávea area, which is home to a large British expat community. Around 2,000 people had to be evacuated and more than 800 hectares of land have been destroyed. (A hectare is 10,000 sq metres.)

Most of the fires were caused by arsonists, others just by carelessness. One was started by a German hippy who was living in a cave and decided to burn his used toilet paper! The regional government of Valencia says it will ensure

that land damaged by a recent spate of forest fires cannot be rezoned for construction purposes, a ploy which was been used to reclassify land in the past.

With the end of the tourist season here in Spain, the precariousness of the

recovery has become evident. El Mundo reported that 282,000 + sackings occurred in just one day! The end of summer ended five months of growth with 145,000 fewer employees, the worst data since 2008. This is the usual story, particularly in the leisure/holiday industry: hired for the summer and sacked in September.

At the time of writing, Spain appears to be heading for yet another general election, its third in 12 months! This is directly as a result of intransigence in all the main parties. Each general election costs almost $\in 100$ million, largely in subsidies to the political parties, so hey, they are in no rush! The bad joke is that, unless an agreement can be reached, this absurd re-running of elections will continue.

There is now a small charity box in Domino's as well as in Macklin's Welcome Inn. *Reach Out* badly need jarred or tinned cooked foods: meatballs (albondigas) and cooked pulses are preferred as they require little cooking. The charity also urgently require volunteers - a spare hour here or there would be welcome. Let me know if you are interested and I will put you in touch with the right person.

Part of this enormous invoice is down to the European rescue in June 2012 (around 40 billion €), but in addition they injected other public funds.

> A train derailed in Galicia on Friday, Sept' 9, killing four people and injuring 48. The preliminary investigation suggests that the driver was going too fast around a bend, said to be four times the lawful speed limit. On July 24, 2013, a high-speed train crashed near Santiago de Compostela, causing 79 deaths in what became Spain's worst rail crash in 40 years.

El País reports Europe is to put barriers on the free Internet; Brussels is to **regulate** the neutrality of the network and will permit exceptions for the operators. The intention would stop Telefónica, Vodafone and Orange and any other European internet provider to block or filter content which goes against commercial interests and co-generated with Google, Facebook etc. The exceptions would apply in cases of national security.

Brussels has obliged Apple to **pay Ireland 13 billion** ϵ . The European Commission reclaims from the world dominating Communication Company to return this amount, plus interests for between the years 2003 and 2014 when Apple paid 0.005% of tax. Ireland says it needs more time to prepare their appeal against Brussels on Apple. Dublin plans to appeal the decision, while the left wing republican opposition, Sinn Fein, thinks Ireland should accept the decision of the European Commission and keep the money. The Irish Cabinet fears accepting the money would damage the credibility of their taxing system, which they don't consider as a fiscal paradise.

Tim Cook, CEO of Apple, has labelled the demands from Brussels as 'political rubbish'. The CEO of Apple charged against Brussels for demanding that Ireland reclaim the unpaid taxes – some 13 billion \in , and the European Commission claimed this shortfall equated to a payment of 0.005%, which Tim Cook said it was 'false'. Speaking to the Irish Independent the CEO claimed Apple paid 357 million \in to Ireland in 2014. 'I don't know where they have found that percentage as we are paying the statutory tax of 12.5%. The Spanish Treasury is now inspecting the Apple affiliates in Spain. The Tax Administration is investigating three taxes, company, IVA and the income tax for non-residents over three subsidies between 2009 and 2012.

Okay, you may believe, like me, that some of the licensed **taxi-drivers** in Spain are a shower of robbing baskets, but the tale of an Uber driver in north London caps it all. In this case the taxi driver noticed that his fare, a female passenger, fell asleep in the backseat so he decided to go for a bit of a wander, see map. When the poor dear woke up she found she had a bill of £84.95! If you take a look at this map in the opposite column, you will see that the pick-up and drop-off points are on the extreme right of the map. The rest of the journey, 56km, was the detour! After sending several emails to Uber and with a lot of persistence, the lady was finally refunded with the full fare. However, Uber refused to provide any details of the cheater

Then in Alicante in the early morning hours of August 31st, a father called a taxi to take his 10-year-old daughter to hospital. The child has her tonsils removed a couple of days earlier and was now beginning to vomit blood. When the taxi driver arrived he opened the car window by about two inches and said, **'this is an ambulance matter'** and drove off! The family managed to get the child to the hospital themselves quickly and she was released five days later. The Ministry of Transport are investigating.....so no rush then!

There have been a number of **horrific murders** in the little town of Pioz, Guadalajara, 60 km from Madrid. Two Brazilian residents, both about 40, and their two children aged one and five were murdered about a month ago. The children were left intact but the adults were dismembered and the limbs and bodies stuffed in six large plastic bags. Neighbours alerted the police to the foul smell coming from the building. Sources close to the investigation stated that death was quick for the victims (no torture) and that the professional killers probably used a butchers knife or axe.

Now this is a strange story. **Divers** off the coast of Calp discovered several packages at a depth of around 19 metres. The packages were not together but around 300 metres apart. The packages consisted of sheets knotted at each end but containing human bones, animal parts, leaves, twigs, feathers, a wooden cane split in two, a knife and other items. Then several more packages were found with similar objects. It is believed that the bones were taken from old graveyards and the items were being used as part of a 'magic' ceremony, probably African.

And speaking of **gruesome**, police are investigating if the appearance of a severed head in Elche is the result of a settling of scores. The body part was found at a rubbish treatment plant which deals with rubbish from five municipalities. An employee at the plant spotted the head - male and around 40 years old.

Italy has rescued from the sea more than 6,500 refugees in one day. The good weather has stepped up the exodus from Libya.

Madrid City Hall has fined El Corte Inglés the sum of $\notin 3,000$ for selling olive oil at a loss; having paid $\notin 2.50$ for a litre and then selling it for $\notin 2.20$. Then the Extremadura Government fined Carrefour $\notin 42,120 \notin$ for selling olive oil at a loss. The farmers association UPA reported the French multinational for the practice of loss leaders in an attempt to get more people into the store.

The National Commission for Markets and Competitiveness has **fined 23 cemeteries** \in 29 million for price fixing, and sharing information between the years 1999 and 2014. I have to say that this National Commission do some excellent work in Spain. Although the new authority was not formed until June 2013, it has been punching well above its weight since then and not afraid to take on the giant public companies.

Get good locks! El País reports of home kidnappers, in organised gangs who will **squat in houses** and demand money from the owners to leave.



As I have said before, and again elsewhere in this issue, beware financial advice from the banks. Some of you will only be too aware of this already. Here's another example: A Spanish court has ordered officials to enter a Barcelona branch of Bankia to recover €26,925 in interests and legal fees incurred after the bank knowingly missold so-called preference shares to an 81-year-old customer. The bank has refused to hand over the money, and the new ruling, the first of its kind, means that unless the branch in question returns the amount, court officials will be authorized to enter the premises on October 3 to recover "money in cash, furniture and **belongings**". Spanish banks sold more than €5 billion of complex financial instruments such as preference shares and subordinated debt to customers over several years in the first decade of the 2000s, promising them that they could recover their investments at any time. Bankia alone sold roughly €5 billion in preference shares and subordinated debt, and only a portion of those will likely escape the enforced writedowns. The company began an arbitration process in 2013. Nine years after this old lady bought the shares she wanted to cash them in and pay for her daughters medical expenses. The bank said the shares could not be cashed and her daughter died in 2012. Sadly, stories like this are common.

Did you hear about the blonde couple who were found frozen to death in their car at a drive-in movie theatre? They went to see *Closed For The Winter*.

So far this year, the Orihuela town council has granted building permits which have exceeded last year's figures by 18%. The vast majority of these new builds are of course in the coastal area. Unfortunately, and as usual, most of the revenue obtained from these works will go to the city of Orihuela, with little being spent on improving the facilities on the coast itself. New builds in Orihuela Costa, along with Torrevieja and Pilar de la Horadada, have bucked the national trend in the sale of new homes, which has flattened out and is reduced in much of the country. It is international buyers who dominate the purchases in this area. Developers are saying that buyers are now demanding better quality. A cursory look at the quality of brick and blockwork on the new builds tends to negate that, although much of the finishes can be quite attractive. Why is it that the developers continue to build properties with smaller and smaller rooms suitable only for minions? Maybe all the architects are small people, but shoehorning the properties into smaller plots is not quality.

La Verdad in Murcia headlined that 'a scientific committee will control and make public the analysis of the **Mar Menor** (algae pollution problem)'. The regional government thinks the deterioration of the lagoon has stabilised and said 'it cannot be allowed to happen again'. But it will happen again unless the pollution is stopped.

Here's a photo of the cockpit of a **Lufthansa plane** where a black vulture crashed into the nose of the plane on a flight from Munich to Palma. The plane made an emergency landing on Palma without any problems.



La Verdad in Murcia headlines 'the ministry has ordered urgent improvements to the water supply

and will place three desalination plants **on full production**'. The sharing of 10.4 cubic hectometres has been ordered and the drought decree extended.

Información in Alicante adds that the desalination plant in Torrevieja will now double its output to produce 80 hectometres.

At least 20 people staying at a large hotel in Guardamar contracted **food poisoning.** The most serious, including some children, were admitted to Torrevieja Hospital. It seems the buffet was the likely culprit.

What's large and hard and pink in the morning? The Financial Times crossword. During late August, police arrested a man who was practising as a doctor in what *Informacion* described as, a remote urbanisation in Torrevieja. The urbanisation was populated mainly by the British. The clinic was stocked with various medical paraphernalia but the chap had **no medical qualifications** and had no linkage to the local and regional health authorities.

He was rumbled when some of his patients complained about the poor treatment they received.

The closed airport at **Corvera** is still costing the Murcian taxpayer €22,000 a day!

The regional treasury is now using drones to detect illegal buildings in 40 municipalities. More buildings = more revenues and of course more fines.

The town hall of Orihuela-Costa is offering to all foreign nationals free online Spanish courses. Check out the website here, which is available in several languages. There are also a number of

helpful guides in PDF (in English) on the website.

There are, however, a number of hoops to go through. This from the website:

- Registration is free and accepted in strict order of receipt of applications. The registration application implies acceptance of the requirements for registration and for remaining on the course.

- It is compulsory to present a copy of council registration (Padrón) issued by your local council together with your application.

- All communications will be by email so it is essential that you give a proper email address and check it regularly.

Because of the limited number of places, to keep your place you must:

- Connect during the first week after receiving the access codes to take the level test, otherwise you will be de-registered without prior warning.

- Spend at least 10 hours online during the first month of the course. Students who do not reach this minimum will be de-registered without prior warning.

- Spend at least 50 hours over the six months' course duration to receive the course certificate.

In Murcia 'the average **waiting time for surgery** has reached as long as four months' according to La Verdad. Residents of Cartagena have to wait 26 more days for surgery than in the other districts. It is fair to say that delays due to the austerity measures are still taking their toll. This is also true in our area in relation to Torrevieja Hospital etc. I have heard of a number of cases - often direct from the patient - about delays and cancellations, primarily due to a lack of resources.

In one case during May, this particularly lady's operation was cancelled, with one day's notice, and it has not been rescheduled yet. The excuse being given is that tumour operations are being given priority, despite the poor soul having a major dual incontinence problem. In another case, a cancerous tumour which should have been removed in July was postponed until September, because of the holidays! Health and education have been the two areas hammered by lack of funds. IT IS a moment every traveller dreads. You wait for your luggage at the carousel after a flight, but the last bags come and go, and yours isn't among them. You leave your name and number with the airline and wait for a call. Weeks go by; the phone never rings.

Is there any hope of tracking down these lost items? There could be, but it might require a trip to a small town in the wilderness of northeastern Alabama. And some luck.

All across America, bags routinely go missing and unclaimed, for a variety of reasons. All of them make a strange journey to a remote corner of the country and a gigantic thrift store in Scottsboro, Alabama, where they are unpacked and the contents sold to shoppers.

The Unclaimed Baggage Centre (pictured) began as a one-man operation in 1970, when Doyle Owens borrowed a pickup truck, drove to Washington, DC, and used a \$300 loan to buy his first load of orphaned



luggage. Today the company has exclusive contracts with American airlines, giving it sole rights to purchase and sell detritus from flights. The UBC claims to be one of Alabama's top tourist attractions, drawing more than a million visitors a year from around the globe. (This photo just shows the men's clothing section! I wonder if the ladies found the baby there? Handy!)

Only a tiny fraction of passengers' luggage makes it to Scottsboro. According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, just 3.86 bags for every 1,000 flyers go initially unclaimed. Of those, nearly 98% find their way to their owners within five days. Then, over the next three months, half of the remaining bags make it home.



But if that 90-day period passes, the leftovers become the property of the airlines. They then sell it to the UBC, which loads it onto tractor-trailers at airports around the country and transports it to Scottsboro. (The airlines don't turn a profit, but recoup some of their costs associated with tracking and handling lost luggage.) Even that small percentage is quite a haul. The warehouse occupies more than a city block; the main building has 40,000 square feet of shopping space, and a three-story annex is located next door.

The shop's processing centre sorts the items and prices those appropriate for sale. The company appraises jewellery, tests electronics and wipes them of personal data, and dry-cleans more than 20,000 items of clothing a day at its own facility. (Which, it says, makes it the largest dry-cleaning operation in Alabama.) Most of the items for sale are what you would expect: clothing, cameras, golf clubs. But sometimes more exotic treats turn up, such as vacuum-packed frogs, a 19th-century replica suit of armour, and an engraved tombstone.

According to Thrillist, most items are sold for a discount of 20-80%; jewellery is sold at half its appraised value. But since not all items are appraised, there are sometimes great deals. A traveller from Mexico City once bought a \$20,000 painting for \$60.

Customers in need of fashion assistance can hire a personal shopper on site. Every day at 2.30, visitors can win the chance to open unprocessed bags themselves. And if they find, say, a suit of armour that they would like to take home, the store does ship.

The UBC has mostly rave reviews on TripAdvisor, where it's ranked number one out of all the (six) things to do in Scottsboro. The most recent correspondent spent seven hours there; another this month wrote that it was "definitely worth the 5 1/2 hour drive from Indiana!" One reviewer warned, however, that the store limits shoppers to three laptops per customer.

But if you are the frustrated soul from the top of this story, pining for a lost suitcase, don't count on the UBC staff to find it for you. The FAQ section on its website asks, "Can you find my lost suitcase (glasses/laptop/jewelry/favorite sweater)?" The answer is: "Regrettably, 'No.""



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

62-Year-Old Pregnant with Third Child.

A 62-year-old Spanish woman is due to give birth to a baby girl in October, igniting more ethical debates about using fertility treatments on older woman. Doctor Lina Alvarez (photo), already has two sons, one aged 27 who is disabled and requires constant care, and a 10-year-old. According to the Spanish news service Agencia EFE, Ms Alvarez said: "I feel like a woman in her 30s. To feel better than this is impossible. I am very happy because I am living now my reward for so much suffering. It is a miracle."

The mum-to-be revealed that always wanted to be a mother again, but most medical experts refused to treat her. "However, some years ago I met a gynecologist who agreed to help me if the tests were OK, and they were positive so he planted an embryo," she said. She added that the baby was developing well and already weighing in at 2kg.

Some months after the crime, the family of Brian Moore

had reported him missing to the police in the UK, who then requested help from Spain.

Tipping in Spain.

Ground Clauses &

Euribor Tracker Mortgages Banks Refund.

If you have a mortgage with a Spanish bank the chances are your interest rate is tied to the Eurobor/Euribor rate. Euribor is the interest rate which a large number of European banks provide short term loans to one another. So the interest rate you will pay on your mortgage will probably be the Euribor rate plus a percentage, say 1% or 2% or whatever, depending on how ethical and fair your bank is.

(Regular readers will be aware that I have a very low regard for Spanish banking, despite having spent the first 30-years of my working life in international banking. IMHO, what separates the Spanish bankers from the *bandidos* is that at least the *bandidos* wear a mask and not a smile!)

But when the Eurobor rates dropped during the last few years (it is now in negative territory) the Spanish banks introduced ground clauses to their mortgages, so when the Euribor rate took a dive during late 2011 & 2012, the banks ensured that the rates they charged their borrowers, did not follow the previously agreed formulae and kept these rates artificially high by using a ground clause.

Consumer associations and individuals fought this restrictive clause through the courts on a local basis first, and then nationally in the Supreme (national) Court and in the European Court.

The clause was then found to be abusive in the courts. But the Spanish Supreme Court ruled that the banks would be required to pay the difference, but only going back as far as 2013! The time limit was then appealed to the European Court who, rather surprisingly, agreed with the Spanish Supreme Court. (If the clause was backdated fully, it would have cost the banks billions.)

So now you can reclaim any interest you have been overcharged going back to 2013. The law is now pretty clear on this, so you would be likely to win your case.

First, check with you bank to see if your borrowings had a ground clause. If you renewed your mortgage this year, they probably got you to sign-up to a much higher rate anyway! Find out how much the previous rate was and get the answer in writing.

Check with a lawyer how much they would charge for handling your claim. Some may claim a percentage, say 30%; others may charge a flat fee which could take any funds you are reimbursed with, so take care and ask!

The Spanish Land Registry.

Many of us who have lived in Spain for some years are only too aware of the leaden-footed bureaucracy that accompanies any enquiry or official procedure. Inadequate guidance, multiple form-generation, unhelpful functionaries, delays and general bloody-mindedness can wear you down.

So what a relief it was to come upon the new Spanish Land Registry sites, which not only provide for online searching in English but also offer a translation service (at a cost) of the relevant documents as well. Also, they have prepared a number of introductory sites to the service in English, which are very helpful. If you own a property in Spain, or wish to buy one, or indeed are just curious to obtain the core relevant details about another property, much of the following will be of use to you.

First of all, take a look at the following website -

https://buyingahouse.registradores.org/

This particular site was 'created to help international users to leap over the language and legal terminology barriers which sometimes make difficult for non residents interested in investing in Real Estate in Spain, to properly assess and interpret information issued by the Land Registry Offices.'

It also provides a link to an example of a sample set of deeds in both Spanish and English, which illustrates the information which is available on any registered property in Spain! So, if you have reservations/doubts about the swarthy, sweaty, hairy chap, who has been chatting up your daughter, maiden aunt, sister or whoever and spouting about his considerable assets, this is a sample of the information you can obtain using a simple search - see https://buyingahouse.registradores.org/static/sample.pdf

How Drunk You Think You Are Depends on How Wasted Your Friends Are.

Have you ever noticed that the more people you go out drinking with the more drunk you get? This boozy breed of groupthink recently got empirical validation in the form of a new study by University of Cardiff researchers in the journal BMC Public Health. Team members went out on Friday and Saturday nights, between 8 p.m. and 3 a.m., stopping every seventh person they saw, and asking them to take a Breathalyzer test and answer a couple questions about how drunk they were, how extreme of a night they were having, and how much they thought booze would affect their long-term health. They ended up doing alcohol tests with 1,862 people, 400 of whom answered all the questions.

And as you may have inferred from every terrible night out you had in college, it wasn't the absolute number of drinks that individuals had that predicted how drunk they thought they were, but rather how much their friends were or weren't drinking. The research team, led by Cardiff publichealth researcher Simon C. Moore, concluded that it was a matter of "rank": If you had downed six beers through the night but had drunk the fifth-most among a crew of six revelers, you'd report being less drunk than if you'd drunk the same amount but been the heaviest drinker among your crew.



"Animals, ranging from crayfish to monkeys, are generally very sensitive to rank position within a hierarchy," the researchers write. Indeed, the authors say, the rank-based reasoning may explain how entire cultures shift from drinking more to less, as Britain has, a couple times. "Such rank sensitivity may also explain why drinking increases in a society; if everyone drank another 10 units per week, no one would believe themselves to be more at risk of alcohol related disorder as their rank positions would remain the same, " the authors write. This also explains why New York is so soaked in booze —nobody drives, everybody drinks — while a place like Los Angeles — everybody drives, everybody slugs wheatgrass — is so comparatively dry. If cultural norms say a behaviour is normal, it is.

The BBVA has ratified that Alicante will be one of the most provinces affected by Brexit. The exit of the United Kingdom from the EU could reduce regional GDP by five tenths. The slowdown in the British economy and the devaluation of the pound could affect tourism arrivals, the motor of the regional economy. It could also reduce 'the permanent income of the British residents, which would have special relevance in Alicante and Murcia' because of the high British population. Also the Valencia Community is the region which exports the most to the United Kingdom, with Aragón and Murcia. (TypicallySpanish)

Japan has warned Britain that its banks, car manufacturers and pharmaceutical companies may leave the UK for Europe if Brexit leads to the loss of tariff-free trade. The warning came during the G20 meeting in China, where Theresa May has been conducting talks with world leaders. A Japanese Government task-force has published a 15 page list of demands from companies and warned that Britain may become an increasingly "unattractive" place for business.

The report concludes:

"Japanese businesses with their European headquarters in the UK may decide to transfer their head-office function to continental Europe if EU laws cease to be applicable in the UK after its withdrawal," the report concludes.

It says: "In light of the fact that a number of Japanese businesses, invited by the government in some cases, have invested actively to the UK, which was seen to be a gateway to Europe, and have established valuechains across Europe, we strongly request that the UK will consider this fact seriously and respond in a responsible manner to minimise any harmful effects on these businesses."

Half of Japanese investment in the EU comes to the UK including companies such as Nissan, Honda, Mitsubishi, Nomura and Daiwa. (Telegraph)

The head of Germany's central bank has warned that London's position as a financial centre would be dealt a severe blow if the UK left the single market because banks would be denied the right to operate across the 27 remaining members of the EU. The Bundesbank president, Jens Weidmann, said that banking "passporting rights are tied to the single market and would automatically cease to apply if Great Britain is no longer at least part of the European Economic Area" (EEA). (The Guardian)

S&P warns the current economic recovery in the United Kingdom after the Brexit vote is a mere mirage. The macro-economic data shows a bounce upwards in the British economy in August is a mirage. 'Any celebration will extrapolates the data from August to return normality to the British economy will probably be proven to be premature, or even a mirage, at least in the long term'. The European Union is studying charging British tourist 59 € to enter the eurozone after Brexit. The equivalent 50 pounds would purchase a special visa. Amber Rudd, British Interior Minister, has recognised this possibility is on the table, and a 6€ surcharge for rapid passport control. The European Commission is preparing a draft law to create a computer system to control exits and entries with previous authorisation. They will study a similar model in the United States where such a special visa costs 14 dollars. (S&P)

In a stark reminder of the challenge Britain faces at the negotiating table, Robert Fico said Hungary, Poland, the Czech Republic and Slovakia – known as the Visegrad, or V4, group – would not hesitate to block any future trade accord that



threatened the key EU principle of free movement of workers. "The V4 countries will be uncompromising," Fico said on Saturday, a day after EU leaders met informally in Bratislava, without Britain, to try to chart a roadmap for the bloc's future after the shock of the Brexit vote. "Unless we feel a guarantee that these people [living and working in Britain] are equal, we will veto any agreement between the EU and Britain," Fico told Reuters. "I think Britain knows this is an issue for us where there's no room for compromise." (The Guardian)

Should the attainment of free-trade deals prove impossible or take too long, the UK may attempt to trade on World Trade Organisation terms. Brexiteers say this is simple, as Britain is already a member of the WTO. Yet its tariff, quota and subsidy rules are fixed by its EU membership. Post-Brexit it needs terms of its own, and they have to be negotiated and approved by all 163 other WTO members, a process that the WTO's director-general has called "tortuous". The alternative of scrapping all tariffs and quotas might appeal to some economists, but it would not be welcomed by British farmers or manufacturers, and it would deprive Britain of bargaining chips for future bilateral trade deals. Trading with the EU under WTO rules would mean tariffs on cars, pharmaceuticals and most agricultural products, and it would not cover services. (The Economist)

The Alicante province, reports El Mundo, has the biggest provincial glut of never-sold homes on the market. The problem is that most of Alicante's glut is in the wrong place. We often have a chuckle at the stupid laws in some countries, including Spain. However, the UK still has some gems. When new laws are written, unfortunately many of the old statutes are 'left on the books' and not repealed. OFFENCE 1 - Carrying your shopping home

It is a crime to walk home from B&Q if you've just bought a ladder or a plank of wood. Section 54 of the Metropolitan Police Act 1839 makes it an offence to "roll or carry any cask, tub, hoop, or wheel, or any ladder, plank, pole, showboard, or placard, upon any footway, except for the purpose of loading or unloading any cart or carriage, or of crossing the footway". The law only applies in London. But be reassured that it's OK to carry your shopping along the pavement – as long as you're heading towards your car. Maximum fine? \pounds 500!

OFFENCE 2 - Flying a kite

It is that same Metropolitan Police Act 1839. It threatens a $\pounds 500$ fine for any person "who shall fly any kite or play at any game to the annoyance of the inhabitants or passengers, or who shall make or use any slide upon ice or snow in any street or other thoroughfare, to the common danger of the passengers". Which makes flying a kite on a snowy day twice as dodgy, of course.

OFFENCE 3 - Wearing fancy dress

Been invited to a fancy-dress party? Make sure you don't go as a sailor or a soldier. The Seamen's and Soldiers' False Characters Act 1906 prevents you from passing yourself off as a member of the armed forces. The law states that a person is committing an offence if he or she "personates the holder of a certificate of service or discharge". You could theoretically end up with a onemonth prison sentence. This law is still being enforced: in 2009, one poor man was arrested in London for dressing in a bearskin hat and a bright red tunic.

OFFENCE 4 - Getting drunk in a pub

Everyone knows it's against the law to be "drunk and disorderly". You may also know that it's illegal for a publican to serve you if you're drunk. But did you know that being drunk is illegal in itself? Even inside a pub?

Section 12 of the Licensing Act 1872 outlaws "every person found drunk in any highway or other public place, whether a building or not, or on any licensed premises". So, leave the house and drink more than three or four beers and you could be facing a $\pounds 200$ fine.

OFFENCE 5 - Playing knock-down ginger

Do kids still play this game? If they don't, that's wise. Because ringing on someone's doorbell and then running away also contravenes the Metropolitan Police Act 1854. It's a crime to "wilfully and wantonly disturb any inhabitant by pulling or ringing any door-bell or knocking at any door without lawful excuse". Maximum penalty: a £500 fine.

OFFENCE 6 - Keeping pigs outside your house

If you're in the city, you need to watch where you keep your porky pals. Under the Town Police Clauses Act 1847, anyone "who keeps any pigstye [sic] to the front of any street, not being shut out from such street by a sufficient wall or fence, or who keeps any swine in or near any street, so as to be a common nuisance" faces a fine of up to $\pounds1,000$.

OFFENCE 7 - Cleaning your doormat after 8am

It's our old friend the Metropolitan Police Act 1854 again. Section 60, subsection 3 makes it an offence to beat your carpet in the street. There is a partial dispensation for doormats, which may be beaten before 8am - though not after that time. It is also an offence to "lay any fish, offal, or rubbish... into any well, stream, or watercourse, pond, or reservoir for water" – which presumably forbids anglers from tossing back into the water anything that they have caught. Punishment? A fine of up to £500.

OFFENCE 8 - Asking a stranger for parking money

You've parked the car and you don't have any change for the ticket machine. Don't dare ask anybody for a pound coin. It may only be a quid. You may never have asked a stranger for money before - but it's still begging under the Vagrancy Act 1824. "Every person placing himself or herself in any public place, street, highway, court, or passage, to beg or gather alms... shall be deemed an idle and disorderly person within the true intent and meaning of this Act."

The punishment? Being sent to "the house of correction" for a month or less.

OFFENCE 9 - Hailing a moving taxi

The London Hackney Carriages Act 1843 states even if a licensed taxi has its "for hire" light on, the driver is only allowed to seek trade when at a standstill. According to section 33 of the Act: "Every driver of a hackney carriage who shall ply for hire elsewhere than at some standing or place appointed for that purpose" shall be committing an offence, for which the current maximum fine is £200. So why are taxi drivers not being prosecuted every day of the year? And why, indeed, do they have that orange light?

Because the police have come to an understanding that a moving taxi with its "for hire" light shining brightly is not officially "plying for hire". It is only when the taxi driver pulls over to the kerb and stops that he is deemed to be announcing that he is available. Hey presto!

OFFENCE 10 - Handling salmon in suspicious circumstances (????!!!!)

No, we don't know what it means either. But section 32 of the Salmon Act 1986, specifically outlaws "handling salmon in suspicious circumstances". So please stop doing it.
