You should know.....

If you pay income tax (**Renta**) in Spain, the tax payable for 2016 is payable by end June 2017. You can however pay in two tranches, one in June and the other in November.

If you are registered as disabled in Spain you may be able to claim an additional tax-free allowance, depending on your disability rating. Again, depending on this rating, you can also apply for a reduced rate of IVA (VAT) when purchasing equipment such as electric wheelchairs etc. However the application process to get registered as disabled is time-consuming and patience testing. Tid applied for this and received it, but it took 18 months and numerous visits to the salud, social workers and to an assessment in Alicante. All she wanted was the correct handicap/parking sticker!


Plus Valia Charge: If you paid this and you sold your property at a loss, you should be claiming a refund now. This local municipal tax may have also become payable if the title in the house deeds was amended. You may also be aware of previous neighbours who moved back to their home countries in the last few years and are still eligible for the refund.

Local municipalities in Murcia are very concerned as they believe that the Plus Valia they have to repay in their region comes to €94 million!

Floor Clause: Once again, if your mortgage had a floor clause, it was deemed abusive and you can now claim a refund. A couple of banks have decided not to contest it and will refund the additional interest paid once you apply. If you do not agree with the amount of the refund, or if you had a floor clause with the many other lenders, you will have to take the case to court after June 1. But once again the judicial system has made it more difficult for the poor consumer. Only one specific court in each province will be authorised to handle the cases. This may mean having to travel to the provincial capitals for the court case. This daft directive means that, for example in the Murcia region alone, there will be 45,000 of these law suits this year and the system will collapse!

What's Up?

As a minority PP government continues to rule here in Spain, the only significant political development in recent weeks has been the election of a new leader for the main socialist party here, the PSOE. Pedro Sánchez, photo, is



the new socialist boss. A hardliner, the purges within the party has already begun. Sánchez is unlikely to be very cooperative with the current PP government and this could lead to greater

instability, particularly if he bonds with the far left parties.

PM Rajoy managed to get the minority government's budgets through, but only with the help of the Basque nationalist party, the PNV. This cost him an extra €2 billion in subsidies to the Basque Country. This is, unfortunately, a regular occurrence with minority governments during recent decades. Nationalist parties in Basque and Catalan areas will both always support....providing the price is right!

Social Security coffers will end 2017 with an accumulated deficit of 80 billion \in - accumulated since the PP has been in office – poor workers cannot sustain rich pensioners and the Government has removed from the pension piggy bank more than 67.3 billion \in since 2012! How in hell's name can that be replaced?

The Spanish banking sector has, during the last eight years, sacked around 200 workers weekly – banks, savings banks and credit cooperatives have lost 81,000 jobs and closed 17,000 branches due to the crisis and the rescue. The emergence and success of online banking has also contributed to the reduction in staffing.



Foreigners purchased 13.75% of all house sales in Spain in 2016, of which 19% were British, despite their weight falling by 6% because of Brexit and currency issues. according to the College of Registrars. The slowdown in British activity was compensated by increased interest from the French and Belgians.

Diario de Mallorca reports 'the Baleares Government finger picked 70% of public contracts without advertising them' And, if you think this is 'crooked', you would be correct!

One newspaper has highlighted that the Costa del Sol has become one of the destinations for medication tourism. Foreign tourists are purchasing large amounts of medicines and pills there, which are several times cheaper that in their home countries and most do not require a prescription. It is also a growing market here in the Costa Blanca with the visiting British stocking-up.

The six large telecommunications operators in Spain, are being accused by a number of consumer associations of fraudulently pricing their optical fibre products. Orange Espagne (Jazztel and Orange), Mas Móvil, Telecom 3.0 (Mas Móvil), Telefónica de España (Movistar), Vodafone España (Vodafone-Ono) and Xfera Mobiles (Yoigo) are hiding additional charges by either not mentioning them or by putting them in the small print, without naming the actual amount. These hidden charges can come to 200% of the initial charges and hit the consumer later. Consumer associations also advise that fibre optic is an independent infrastructure, with no need for a phone line, or a charge for it, so 'it is definitely an The large telecom's companies are the abuse'. institutions which gather the most complaints in Spain and they just appear to be unable to tell the truth.

Fishermen in Caleta de Vélez, Málaga, are complaining that the Malayan dolphins are proliferating in the coastal area and are destroying their nets and eating their catches. They say the losses are enormous.

A number of hospitals in Spain are now coming under pressure due to the continuing austerity measures and lack of staffing and resources. Fortunately, that is not so in our immediate area. However in Malaga some patients are waiting 70 hours for a bed. It is similar in the Isle of Palma. Here, the Hospital Son Llàtzer is full with their overflow patients being moved to the hospital in Son Espases. But the situation is now getting increasingly chaotic with 146 waiting for a bed for almost 24 hours and ten of them had been waiting more than 48 hours. The 'oldest' patient was waiting for 67 hours and 19 minutes, and an 82-year-old spent 18 hours on a trolley. All this before the high-season and the tourist influx!

25-year-old Neymar, one of Barcelona's top players is to stand trial for alleged corruption. Two presidents of Barcelona FC together with two football clubs -Barcelona and Brazil's Santos - are also facing a range of charges. An investigation began after a Brazilian investment company, DIS, received $\in 6.8$ million - its 40% of the $\in 17$ million fee paid to Santos by Barcelona in 2013. However DIS now say that a large part of the transfer fee was concealed by the two clubs and the Neymar family and that the amount Santos was actually paid was $\notin 25$ million.

Lawyers for DIS want five-year jail sentences for Neymar, photo, and his parents as well as eight years for



the Barcelona FC presidents. But Spanish prosecutors have recommended that Neymar be given a two-year suspended sentence and the family fined €10 million. Once again the Spanish establishment has 'bentover-backwards' for its heroes,

the professional footballers. You would think that Neymar, with a weekly paycheck of $\notin 300,000$ and a $\notin 100$ million + fortune, could afford a decent haircut.

The European Union has fined the cash-strapped Valencia Region $\in 19$ million. The former regional government run by the Partido Popular cooked the books when reporting public expenditure. There was a massive 'falsification of accounts.' Unpaid bills totalling $\in 1.9$ billion were discovered hidden in drawers when the new coalition regional government took over. Public debt for the region now stands at $\in 40$ billion. What is truly amazing is that no one will be hauled to account for this!

The media in Málaga have reported that 'the crisis has multiplied the number of squatters living in holiday homes on the coast.' It seems a legal loophole exists makding it difficult to expel the intruders, and those owned by the banks are the most affected. In Marbella and Estepona, the neighbourhood communities are attempting to upgrade local security.

In their seemingly never ending quest towards extra taxation, the Secretary of Finance for the Catalan Generalitat, Lluís Salvadó, is to introduce a new tax on sugar drinks "as part of a new culture to correct health issues." According to the Association of Manufacturers and Distributors (AECOC), the measure foresees two increases: one of 8 cents per litre if the product has between 5 and 8 grams of sugar per 100 millilitres, and another of up to 12 cents per litre in case the sugar exceeds 8 grams per 100 millilitres. The affected products are all soft drinks or sodas, fruit nectar drinks, sports drinks, tea and coffee drinks, energy drinks, sweetened milks, alternative milk drinks, milkshakes and milk drinks with fruit juice, vegetable drinks and waters Salvadó states that the objective of the with flavours. legislation is to "correct certain habits". What a pity they didn't 'correct' the 3% 'commission' the separatist parties collected from government contracts for decades nor the scores of millions purloined by Pujol Dynasty. The Catalans now want to extend the 'sugar tax' to other foodstuffs.

The University Hospital of Torrevieja, managed by the Ribera Salud group, has installed an open, free Wi-Fi network aimed at its patients, making it the only public hospital in the area with this service. From now on, all users who visit the hospital have an open internet connection, making it possible to quickly consult their emails, applications and web pages, with a broad bandwidth, capable of providing coverage to all dependencies of the Hospitals. Users can easily access the internet by entering their health card number and date of birth, obviously not restricting it to patients only.

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CHECK OUT OUR SPECIALITY COFFEES! On Sunday, May 7, a 28-year-old woman, while driving under the influence of drugs and alcohol, ploughed into a group of six cyclists on the N-332, between Denia and



Oliva. Two of the cyclists, aged 28 and 50, were killed while three of the others were placed in intensive care, the sixth allowed to go home. The driver suffered only superficial injuries but was detained by the police without bail. It seems that in 2013 the same woman was arrested, charged and found guilty of driving under the influence. The photo above of the scene illustrates the carnage and damage caused, with bits of bicycle scattered over a large area. A third cyclist died some days later. The sixth cyclist, who suffered minor injuries, stated that the car was driving fast on the outside lane, when it then swerved across and into the cyclists.

The DGT says more than 400 cyclists have been killed on Spain's roads since 2008.

During 2016 the Civil Guard performed 525,000 alcohol controls with just over 2,000 ending with criminal proceedings for exceeding the maximum limit of alcohol allowed.

The Mar Menor beaches and ports lost 19 Blue Flags this year! This was due to the deterioration in the lagoon water quality which was largely ignored by the relevant authorities until after the 2016 summer. After they gathered in the millions of euros from the tourists, they threw their hands in the air and said, 'Oh my God, how could this happen?' This despite the once beautiful lagoon turning cloudy during very early summer. The water may look clear there now but it could take a long time for the sea grass and water quality returns.

But it is good news in Orihuela Costa! Blue flags have been awarded to the beaches of Punta Prima, Cala Mosca, Cala Estaca, Cala Bosque, Cala Capitán,



La Caleta, Cala de Aguamarina, La Glea**BLUE FLAG** and Barranco Rubio. This makes eight, **2016 / 2017** marinas at Cabo Roig and C.N. Dehesa de Campoamor

have also received these awards.

For the first time in 30 years, the Torrevieja Salt company has had to import salt this year. Heavy rainfalls in December and March has reduced salt harvesting in the nearby lakes. The French owned company has imported 3,500 tons of salt from another one of its resources in Italy. The salt was brought to the port in Torrevieja in May by a German freighter.

A six-year-old girl has died after a bouncy castle full of children flew up into the air at a restaurant on the Costa Brava. Six other children were injured, two of them seriously, in the incident on Sunday afternoon, May 7, when the giant inflatable uprooted and lurched into the air at the Mass Oller restaurant in the resort of Caldes de Malavella on the coast of Catalonia in northeastern Spain. The children were hurled through the air from a height of over ten metres before hitting the ground. One theory is that a faulty air valve led to a built up of pressure within the inflatable causing it to blow up. Local reports claimed it was only secured at just two of the six anchor points.

More weirdness in early May in the Vega Baja area. A 16-year-old girl hid in the church of the monastery of Santa Faz de Alicante on Saturday May 6, and remained there until the church reopened on the following Sunday, when she escaped. While there the young girl turned seven crucifixes upside down and engraved '666' and an inverted cross on the protective glass to a sacred relic. (The relic is purported to be the shroud that Veronica dried the face of Jesus on his way to Mount Calvary.) Video cameras in the church identified the girl who was arrested on the following Monday.

The Friday Market in Torrevieja has now moved to it's new location next to the water park.

On the early morning of Friday, May 12, a German shepherd belonging to a British man saved his life by barking a warning about a fire in the kitchen in a house in Almoradi. Although the man survived with no injuries, unfortunately the dog succumbed to smoke inhalation and died.

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Should You Tip Your Hotel Room Cleaner in Spain?

Many hotel chains on the Costas now outsource their room cleaning services. The reasons for this are the same for much outsourcing - less administration and it's cheaper!

But of course it is the working individual who is at the end of this particular food-chain who pays the price - the cleaner.

Informacion, my favourite Spanish organ, carried out a good expose on the matter during May.

Outsourcing on room cleaning varies throughout the Costas, varying from 10% of hotels to 90%, depending on the seasonality of the business in the area. It is estimated that in Benidorm outsourcing cleaners is around 10%, whereas in cities like Alicante it is closer to 90%.

However, the demands placed on the cleaners are exploitative and the rewards are paltry.

A typical contract will be classed as part time for a maximum of six hours daily. The cleaner will not be able to take holidays or free days and if the cleaner falls ill, she, (as is mostly the case) will have to take the time off as unpaid leave, if she wants to be hired again in the future.

Outsourced cleaners can earn a gross pay of



€770 approx. (This is monthly. just 40% of what directly а employed cleaner by the hotel would receive.) After deductions, this is a take-home pay of €707. This works out at about €23.57 for

cleaning an average of 27 rooms. This comes to 87 cents per room!

Last April, the General Directorate of Labour fined 22 hotels in the province for infringing workers rights. The fines amounted to ϵ 268,700.....or the cleaning of 310,000 rooms.

Why the Spanish Love Belize.

Well, not all Spaniards, just the crooked ones! Belize formerly British Honduras, is now an independent country on the eastern coast of Central America. T one time it was home to pirates who would raid the Spanish Main. Nowadays it is home to a new kind of pirate booty, that of Spanish politicians and hucksters. Belize has a diverse society, composed of many cultures and languages that reflect its rich history. English is the official language of Belize, with Belizean Kriol being the unofficial language. Over half the population is multilingual, with Spanish being the second most common spoken language. Belize offers nonresidents the ability to establish offshore accounts. Because of this loophole, it is desirable for many drug



traffickers and money launders to utilize Belize as a money laundering

banking entity. As a result, the United States Department of State has recently named Belize one of the world's

"major money laundering countries" following reports from the CIA.

So little wonder that several Spanish scammers have channeled millions through the tiny country using 'frontmen'. Iñaki Urdangarin, who is married to Princess Cristrina, the kings sister, embezzled around six million euros of public money and used Belize Bank as a tax haven and 'hidey-hole'.

Louis Barcenas, the former treasurer of the PP, also used the island to hide over $\notin 22$ million but came clean about another $\notin 21.9$ million during the 2012 tax amnesty. He used the Sinequanon Foundation. This was money from "commissions and donations." Once again Belize Bank was used for the foundation.

Then there is the Pujol clan from Catalonia, who are alleged to have extracted not millions but billions of euros in commissions and dodgy dealings while complaining over three or four decades that their region needed independence as it was being starved of funds by Madrid! Huge amounts have been channeled through the Kopeland Foundation whose legal address in Belize Bank.

Last, but certainly not least, is Ignacio Gonzales (see *Idiots*, page 32), former PP president of the Madrid Region, who with others, is believed to have spirited-away some €23 million plus, once again using the facilities of the Belize entity. Gonzales, the latest of the New Pirates was taken into preventative custody in April.

The current executive president of Belize Bank is the British Michael Ashcroft, who until 2015 was the representative of the Tory party in the House of Lords and in 2010 was distinguished by the Queen of England with the title of Baron Ashcroft. It is estimated that his personal fortune is around 1,300 million pounds. (Abridged from Wiki & OK Diario.)

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Spain's Golden Visa.

Spain's Golden Visa scheme, introduced in 2013, offering qualified residency in return for certain investments has brought in $\notin 2.16$ billion since then, with results improving after the scheme was tweaked in 2015 to make it more attractive to foreign investors.

Under the Spanish 'Golden Visa' residency scheme non EU-nationals can get a qualified type of permanent residency including Schengen-area travel in return for certain types of investment, including €500,000 or more in real estate.

The scheme got off to a slow start being more bureaucratic and less attractive than similar schemes in countries like Portugal and Malta, not to mention the USA. But results improved after the Government streamlined the visa application process in July 2015, and allowed investors to include more family members. Golden Visa investment in 2016 was four times greater than in 2014.

In the three years since it was introduced 27,301 residency permits handed out to 2,236 investors and their family members, and 72% of investments were in property, with 59% of investors coming from China (714 investors) and Russia (685 investors).

Close to half of all property investments driven by Golden Visa demand has been in Barcelona (893), followed by Malaga / Costa del Sol (348), Madrid (306), and Alicante / Costa Blanca (151). My sources in the industry tell me that Chinese and Russian investors favour Barcelona, and Latin American investors (many from Venezuela) favour Madrid.

Given the housing crisis in Barcelona, with prices and rents increasing fast, I'm sure the local Government would like to see the back of the Spanish Golden Visa scheme.



Did you benefit from a PIVE plan?

This was where you received a subsidy of $\in 1,000$ from the government if you traded in your old car for a new one. The car dealers would also add another $\in 1,000$ to the discount.

BUT, the grant of $\in 1,000$ from the government, not the car dealership, must be declared on your tax form and taxed accordingly!

In the Valencian Community, there were 15,704 who benefited from the grant. Nationally the figure is more than 100,000. I would guess that most were not informed of their subsequent tax liability.

At this stage the government is taking a 'softly, softly' approach. All those affected are exposed to a possible sanction by the Tax Agency. However, this public law entity attached to the Ministry of Finance and Public Administration provides the fine as a last option. In fact, the central government explains in its parliamentary statement that "each citizen is being notified of his duty to declare the amounts corresponding to the aid of the PIVE Plan (Efficient Vehicle Incentive Program)" and at the same time encourages them to submit a Additional statement to avoid sanction (fine).

José María Mollinedo, the secretary general of the Technical Union of the Ministry of Finance (Gestha), corroborated to the newspaper Informacion that the Tax Agency "prefers to inform rather than sanction", although he qualified that in case the affected ones ignore its recommendations and do not carry out the supplementary declaration statement, there will be a fine. Then it would proceed to make a request requesting the taxation of the aid and the sanction will be imposed. This could reach 50% of the subsidy - that is 500 euros - which could be reduced to approximately 260 if the infringement is then accepted and paid in a short period of time. Mollinedo explains, however, that the sanction will depend on the taxable base of the taxpayer's declaration.

Gestha's secretary general also clarified another question:



What happens if a citizen has benefited from the aid of the PIVE Plan, but his income does not reach 17,000 euros and therefore they are not obliged to make the declaration of income? "All aid that exceeds 500 euros has to be declared," said Mollinedo, so a tax declaration form to include the grant has to be submitted, even though it is most unlikely to be taxed.

Do bear in mind that the tax agency will have details of all who benefited from the PIVE.

Adult-onset Allergies Are, Unfortunately, a Real Thing - A view from the U.S. ²⁵

Ah, springtime (or even early summer). Filled with flower blossoms, new beginnings — and, for a lot of people, redeyed, snot-nosed misery. Welcome to the club.

If you've never before been one of the estimated 50 million Americans who suffers from some sort of nasal allergy, consider yourself lucky. At least you've made it this far. But, yes, there's a chance those good times are ending. Because in between the chronic seasonal-allergy sufferers and the lucky jerks who have somehow escaped scot-free, there's a third group: the people who, after decades of enjoying the spring without any allergy-induced misery, suddenly find themselves one warm May day sneezing at everything in sight. According to immunologist Kanao Otsu, an assistant professor of medicine at National Jewish Health, it is possible to develop seasonal allergies later in life — not terribly common, but definitely not unheard of, either. Here are a few of the unfortunate reasons why adultonset allergies can strike.

Because you're going through the second "peak" of allergies. Most people generally develop allergies in one of two time

periods, Otsu says: either the early



elementary school years or early adulthood (from around 18 to the early 20s). It's pretty rare to develop brand-new allergies any later than that, especially as people move in to their 30s and 40s — but once you do have allergies, they tend to worsen gradually. "Over time, people who have had symptoms of mild allergies can increase to have more symptoms," she explains.

So what can trigger this second onslaught of allergies? Part of the reason may be that, as adults, we just have less exposure to seasonal allergens — grass, pollen, and mold are the most common culprits — than we did as children, when we were constantly running around outdoors. "A lot of the immune system is developed as children, but it does constantly change," explains Feryal Hajee, an allergy and immunology doctor at Metropolitan Asthma and Allergy in Little Silver, New Jersey. If your immune system doesn't regularly come into contact with those outside allergens, it's possible that it may start to recognize them as foreign or toxic agents.

Because you may have had allergies all along, and they've just gotten worse.

It's possible that your seasonal allergies aren't new, but a

change — like a move to a new environment — might make you more aware of them, Otsu says. For instance, if you move from a cooler, drier climate to someplace like humid, vegetation-rich Florida, your previously dormant allergies might suddenly kick into high gear. The reason has to do with how long the trees there are pollinating: If they don't die off in winter, you're around these outside allergens a lot longer.

You could also suffer more seasonal allergies if you move to a place with more pollution, like going from a rural to an urban setting, Hajee says. Traffic congestion makes a difference, as excess diesel and gasoline fumes can exacerbate allergies. So do animals: If you've recently brought home a furry friend, you may have noticed an uptick in allergy like symptoms. It could be new seasonal allergies, but it could very well be that a pet allergy is making itself known.

Because you're actually experiencing something that just looks like seasonal allergies.

During allergy season, many people assume that common symptoms like nasal congestion and sneezing are a sign that their allergies are acting up. But those same symptoms can be caused by a sinus infection, a cold, or even just be your body's reaction to the changing temperature.

If you're not sure if you have allergies, Otsu says, you can get a test to find out for sure. (The test looks for a specific antibody that your body produces to battle certain allergens.) And if you're worried about allergies developing or worsening, there are some steps you can take to keep allergens out of your house: Try changing your mattress every 10 to 15 years or so, and wash your linens every other week. If you think your home is mouldy, or you smell something strange, make sure to get it tested.



But there is some good news: As you get older — think 60s and later — your allergies will likely start to fade, Hajee says. Granted, it's a piece of good news that comes with a pretty big caveat: The reason for the change is that as you hit your later years, your immune system begins to weaken, which also leaves

you more susceptible to infection. But hey, at least you can look forward to the outside world in the springtime becoming a little more pleasant.

BREXIT - THE CURRENT POSITION.

The EU's chief negotiator, Michel Barnier, has penciled in 19 June for the first formal day of talks with Britain about its withdrawal from the European Union. Barnier wants to reach agreement on citizens' rights, the UK's EU divorce bill and on the border of Ireland in a first phase of talks which he hopes will be concluded by the end of 2017. If it is then deemed appropriate by the EU 27 leaders, Barnier will spend from December 2017 to the spring of 2018 negotiating the scope of a future trade deal with the UK.

But the Brexit secretary, David Davis, said the EU's programme was "wholly illogical and wrong", predicting "the row of the summer" as the UK would insist none of the above could be addressed until the future relationship, particularly trade, was clear.

The foreign secretary, Boris Johnson, told the Telegraph the EU could end up paying a Brexit bill to Britain rather than the other way round, warning that Brussels would "play dirty" and "try to bleed this country white". When it comes to spouting nonsense and wishful thinking, Johnson appears to be UK's version of the Trump verbal train wreck. Certainly never short of bombast, particularly as there is a general election due in early June, the Tories initial stance on the Brexit negotiations is opposite their European neighbours, who see its citizens as a priority.

<u>Meanwhile Guy Verhofstadt, the European parliament's Brexit coordinator, said MEPs would veto any Brexit deal that</u> <u>failed to uphold the rights of the 3.5 million EU nationals in the UK and 1.2 million Britons in Europe.</u> The EU parliament, which has the right of veto over any Brexit deal, will ensure it exerts "the necessary pressure" to bear. Verhofstadt said: <u>We will never give consent if the issues of citizens' rights, on both sides, has not been dealt with in a satisfactory way.</u> Certainly for the expat's in the EU (and of course Europeans in the UK), this is at least reassuring. On the other hand, the noises coming from Downing Street are much less supportive. The Conservatives see a 'trade deal' as the priority and will use the issue of EU expat's as a bargaining tool. Their new manifesto commits to bringing immigration below 100,000 a year and businesses will have to pay more to hire overseas workers. There will also be higher payments for foreign workers who use the NHS! Hardly a good start!

It is fair to say that the Spanish are much more pro-active and supportive in the present circumstances of their countrymen and women in the UK. Madrid is creating an inter-ministerial work group called "Task Force Brexit" with the aim of providing "support and advice for Spanish citizens in the United Kingdom" ahead of the country's exit from the European Union. The task force, the creation of which is already "considerably advanced," will be based at the Spanish embassy in London and will count on a team of 15 people, spread across the embassy, sectorial departments and the consulates in London and Edinburgh. This is much more supportive than the watery platitudes and lukewarm reassurances the Brit's are currently receiving from their embassies in Europe.

SPAIN RANKS EIGHTH IN THE WORLD FOR BEST HEALTHCARE!

ORS

A report funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and published by The Lancet, indicates that Spain obtained a 90% success rating in the world ranking.

The access and attention to healthcare in Spain is eighth with 90 points among a ranking of 195 countries, published recently by the prestigious British magazine The Lancet.

Andorra leads the rankings with 95, Iceland (94) and Switzerland (92) in their first edition of the report 'Healthcare Access and Quality index based on mortality from causes amenable to personal health care in 195 countries and territories, 1990-2015 – a novel analysis from the Global Burden of Disease Study 2015.' (Gasp! What a long title!) According to the report the Spanish health system has increased by 15.7 points over the last 25 years, leapfrogging Italy (89), France (88), Greece (87), Germany (86), UK (85) and Portugal (85).

Other countries to obtain over 90 points are Sweden, Norway, Australia, Finland and Holland.

Spain gained 100 points in the treatments of ditherier (probably meant diphtheria), tetanus and measles, and 99 points for disorders related to maternity and respiratory infections.

Lowest points are for the curing of Hodgkin Lymphoma (64) Leukaemia (66) bile conditions (74) and skin cancer without melanoma (74).

The report also highlighted the differences with the Central African Republic with the lowest rating (29), Afghanistan (33), Somalia (34), and Chad (38).

During the last week in April, former president Barack Obama made his first formal post-presidential appearance at a panel discussion at the University of Chicago. He spoke of his plans to mentor the next generation of leaders and bemoaned the influence of money in politics. But, on the same day, Obama also accepted \$400,000 to speak at a Wall Street conference, reports the Financial Times. This follows a book deal for ex-president and first lady worth over \$65 million! 'Do as I say not as...............'

A woman who gave birth nine months after a threenight tryst took a German hotel to court to find out the identity of the likely father of her child. The woman, who has not been identified, gave birth to a son, Joel, after the encounter in Halle, eastern Germany, in 2010. She wanted to force the hotel to reveal her lover's identity and address as she was seeking child support. All she knew about him was that his first name was Michael.

The hotel refused, arguing that it had no legal obligation to hand over the personal data of one of their former guests, according to German newspaper the Abendzeitung. A court has now rejected her legal bid, saying that she had no legal right to demand the data from the hotel and did not provide enough information to be sure of the man's identity. The court argued it could also breach the privacy of four men named "Michael" who were registered at the hotel at the time. The judgment was reached last October but was only recently made public.

According to the court, the father's right to selfdetermination of his own information took precedence over the woman's right to child support. Publishing its decision under the title 'Father Roulette', the court wrote: "This right is affected by the exposure of the data because as a result, the possibility of [the man having] a sexual relationship with the complainant, as the mother of the child, would be irrefutably placed in the room."

Francisco Granados, who has appeared in these columns before, is one of a legion of corrupt PP politicians. Formerly the Counsellor of Presidency, Justice and Interior of the Community of Madrid, he is now held in prison on remand in case he scarpers and will face a raft of charges including money laundering and fraud. The court blocked his accounts in Switzerland and Singapore, with total balances of $\in 11$ million. The head of a large construction firm that 'bunged' Granados



said, 'Of all the uncles we paid commissions to, he was the greediest.' When questioned by the judge as to why he never declared his Swiss bank account, Granados (photo) said, 'I forgot I had a Swiss bank account.' Interesting during 2010 Granados was

accused of spying and phone tapping his own PP colleagues. A judge later shelved the case, but it is unlikely that the PP would want it reopened.

In 2011, 68-year-old Robyn A. M. from Australia believed she had found the love of her life. Her Facebook friendship with Nicaraguan student Bismarck A.L., 36, had developed into so much more than she could have hoped for.

After three years of virtual intimacy, Robyn travelled from Singleton, New South Wales, to Madrid to meet her suitor. The encounter was a success and Bismarck, ever the perfect gentleman, continued to woo her. So in love were they that it didn't seem at all odd when he suggested she sell her home in Australia and buy a flat in Madrid where they could live together.

Robyn agreed and, in February 2015, she transferred \notin 136,347 from Westpack Banking Corporation to Bismarck's account in the Spanish capital. Bismarck bought a flat in the commuter town of Alcalá de Henares on the outskirts of Madrid and told Robyn she wouldn't be able to put her name on the property deed as she lacked the required Identification Number for Foreigners (NIE), a document which costs \notin 9.45 and can be obtained from embassies in just five days.

In June 2015, Robyn received some unexpected news: Bismarck told her he was already married to a Spanish woman and had a four-year-old daughter. They would all be living together in the flat he had just bought with her money, he said. Understandably, Robyn flew into a rage and told Bismarck in no uncertain terms that she wanted to sell the property and for him to return her money.

Bismarck went onto the attack and wrote a stream of messages on Facebook, including one that called her " an arrogant old woman."

"The property is in my name, not yours, you idiot. I'll throw you out," he said in a mail. "There's nothing to say the house is yours. I'll sell it if and when I want," said another. "And I will treat you well when you deserve it. Starting from tomorrow, I'm going to watch you in the house." In more sinister vein, he said: "The first thing I'm going to do is be your enemy," adding in another, "As soon as you transferred me the money, you were in my power and under my control."

To all of this, the beleaguered Robyn replied: "You're not my employer, you're my lover."

On May 15, Bismarck found himself on the bench of Madrid's Provincial Court as the prosecutor demanded seven and a half years behind bars for severe threats and fraud. He also demanded a three-year restraining order and, of course, the return of the \notin 136,347 that paid for the supposed love nest in Alcalá de Henares, northeast of Madrid.

The story came to light after the teachers at the Escola Montbui primary school created a WhatsApp group for parents asking for the money to be returned and the exchange was read on the radio programme Julia en la Onda on Onda Cero.

"This morning a fifth-form primary school pupil has distributed 100 euro notes he'd taken from his house. 'If your child has been given any of this money, please contact the school immediately so it can be returned to the pupil's family.

"More than €10,000 needs to be recovered. We ask for your utmost understanding and cooperation. This is not a joke." One of the parents of a child who had received some cash told the radio station: 'Yes, it's true. Unbelievable but true.'

EU agencies: a Brexit loss nobody's talking about

Brexit doesn't only mean the UK leaving the European Union, the single European market, the European Economic Area, the customs union, the European Investment Bank and the European Atomic Energy Community. There are also more than 40 specialist EU agencies throughout the continent from which the UK will no longer benefit.

Some, such as the European Food Safety Authority in Parma, have important regulatory roles. These agencies are full of experts whose work directly benefits British people's health, security and economic well-being. Are they experts Britain can do without?

Leave campaigners implied that quitting the European Union would be as easy as giving up a gym membership. Instead, the process looks fiendishly complicated – and that's before the impact of abandoning EU agencies has been discussed. Presumably Britain will no longer contribute, nor have access to agency expertise unless it negotiates continuing association. It would have to pay for that privilege.

One of these bodies is the European Defence Agency in Brussels. The EDA seeks to enhance European defence and security by identifying duplication and inefficiency between nations. It makes recommendations about how to improve equipment interoperability between armed forces, weapons systems, and software. It encourages pooling and sharing in the interests of efficiency and effectiveness, pushing member states towards a better use of their resources. This is clearly in the UK's national interest and in the interests of NATO. Reduced engagement with the EDA cannot possibly benefit Britain's security.

Other agencies include the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control, based in Stockholm, the Agency for European Global Navigation Satellite Systems in Prague, and the European Chemicals Agency in Helsinki. These all deal with global concerns of high importance, so reduced UK involvement smacks of insularity and arrogance.

Manifold benefits

EU agencies cover many health, safety and security issues. Collectively they help to ensure the quality of the food people eat, the medicines they take, chemicals, education, justice, the quality of working life, environmental protection (European Environment Agency), and the safety of transport by air, sea and rail (European Aviation Safety Agency, European Maritime Safety Agency, European Agency for Railways). They work on international security (Institute for Security Studies), policing (EUROPOL), fundamental rights, justice, cybersecurity and many other fields. The UK should remain at the heart of international efforts to boost safety and the quality of life in all these areas. Among the more esoteric but nevertheless important is the wonderfully named Clean Sky Joint Undertaking. Clean Sky works with European aviation industries to reduce the environmental impact of flying by developing technologies to halve noise, cut carbon dioxide emissions and reduce fuel consumption.

Two EU agencies are based in London. One, the European Banking Authority, was set up in the wake of the financial crisis to help stabilise the EU by safeguarding the integrity and efficiency of the banking sector. It will now almost certainly move to a eurozone country. This would mean a loss of expertise that contributes to the security of UK banking. The financial crisis and the Libor scandal highlight the arrogant complacency in assuming that the City can manage banking perfectly well without the transnational expertise the EBA contributes.

The European Medicines Agency is also in London. This researches chronic conditions including AIDS, cancer, Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases, and diabetes. It contributes to developing medicines for children, rare diseases, advanced therapies, and herbal and veterinary medicines. It brings together clinical research from across Europe. In 2013, the EMA dealt with over a million adverse drug reports and recommended 81 medicines for authorisation, including 13 for treating cancers. Does Britain no longer wish to engage with the EMA?

Presumably, UK negotiators will enjoy the immense challenge Brexit presents. They might arrange continued membership of a few EU agencies, some of which may welcome UK involvement, but the most rabid Brexiteers would cut all links. Will the government regard agency expertise as expendable and give up the benefits? Or will the UK create its own equivalents? This would mean duplicating work and failing to profit from the international knowledge, intellectual capital and economies of scale provided by these agencies. It would also damage the UK's reputation as a valued partner in creating knowledge capital for the benefit of all humanity.

Unfortunately, post-Brexit resentment is inevitable. Britain will suffer from cutting its engagement with EU agencies, adding to the already visible loss of expertise from universities, hospitals and research institutes. Prominent Leave campaigner Michael Gove declared that the UK has had enough of experts. No-one expected the government to adopt this sentiment with such bizarre enthusiasm.

Quitting the single market will close down access to EU agencies. Some transactional relationships will survive, but few divorces end up as harmonious partnerships between friends.

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
