The main news in Spain is the threatened illegal referendum in Catalonia, scheduled to take place on Sunday, October 1st. This has led to a major constitutional crisis with several senior Catalan *funcionarios* now arrested. If would be prudent to expect some violence, possibly rioting, from the more aggressive of the separatists, particularly the far-left, the CUP, on or after October 1. You can read more on page 3.


But undoubtedly of more interest to the resident British expat's is the BREXIT issue. British pensioners who have retired to other EU countries will continue to have their healthcare paid for by the NHS post-Brexit, after a deal <u>in</u> <u>principle</u> was agreed by negotiators in Brussels. Also, professional qualifications would be recognised across the bloc after Brexit, allowing lawyers, doctors, accountants, seafarers, train drivers and others who have moved to or from the UK to another EU country to work under their existing credentials. There was also agreement to coordinate on social security post-Brexit. However, there was still disagreement on more than half the issues discussed, including the eventual oversight of the legal rights of EU citizens. This is before any positive agreements on either the 'divorce bill' or the Northern Ireland issue. So far, progress has been disappointing.

Of some significance is the recent aspiration of PM May for a transition period (of an unspecified length at this stage) following the BREXIT deadline. This makes sense if only because the British team still do not have their act together but also because many British businesses will require time (and money) to adjust to whatever post BREXIT trade will entail. A two-year period has been bandied about as a transition period, although the British Chamber of Commerce have stated that it should be longer than three years. Some have also argued that, under certain circumstances, the transition period could be indefinite!

Of some concern also is the lack of support and integrity within May's own cabinet. The Conservative Party are notorious for back-stabbing their own and it is not inconceivable that BO JO and the other ideological lunatics within the party could, with a 'coup', upset the whole apple-cart and any agreements reached before the BREXIT deadlines.

It is good to see that many of the local bars are now offering live music for their customers. The Phoenix continues to provide live acts; Baja Bar has three live sessions coming up in October; Doolan's continues to provide live events, as does CK1's, Jessie's Bar and now Lime Bar. Check them out. Worth a special mention is Florantilles Show Bar, where Martin has now opened (after a 12-year closure) an additional larger venue at the location, which can seat up to 300 and will, no doubt, attract many good new acts. Why not pay it a visit!

His coalition of nationalists and republicans won only 39.5% in a regional election in 2015 that it had claimed was "plebiscitary". The first incident was reported to the police when a member of the public spotted a suspicious-looking bag next to two large rubbish containers. On inspection it was found to contain human remains which were taken for forensic analysis, cause of death believed to be knife wounds. The homicide squad soon traced a man they believed to be connected with the macabre suitcase discovery. It was then on entering one of the residential buildings in the street where the 'person of interest' was, when two police officers were attacked without warning by an individual armed with a knife. One of them suffered several knifewounds in just a few seconds and barely had time to react, while his companion put an end to the attack by drawing his weapon and shooting the assailant. Both the wounded officer and his killer were dead by the time an ambulance arrived.

A Spanish fortune-teller called, Pilar Abel Martínez,


claimed she was an illegitimate daughter of the famous painter, Salvador Dali. Martínez, photo, – who was born in 1956 in Figueres, the same town in northwestern Spain where Dalí was born – has been publicly claiming to be the famous painter's daughter since 2007. She



says that her mother told her that she had a secret affair with Dalí. She intended to bear his surname and inherit 25% of his estate. With the result of the tests, the Dali Foundation declared it "an absurd end to an artificial controversy." The mortal remains of Dalí that were extracted at the end of July (nails, a tooth, and two long bones) will soon be restored. His corpse will now be interred for a third time! New Laws on Spanish Mortgages. Part 2

Change in conditions: Changes to the agreement can now be made more easily. Moving from variable to fixed rate mortgage will be more affordable by lowering the costs that are incurred by changing the bank loan or a modification of its terms. The bank that originally granted the loan will only receive compensation for the change in conditions in the first three years of the mortgage life and notary expenses will be reduced to a minimum. In addition, those affected by loans in other currencies (mainly signed in yen or Swiss francs) may exchange them in the currency of the country in which they reside (in euros) or in which they earn their income. An outlet for those trapped in multi-currency mortgages.

Early repayment: The bank can now only claim 'limited' compensation because of the early repayment of a loan. Currently the customer must pay an early redemption fee, which is usually 0.5%, and another for compensation for interest rate risk that is not limited. After the approval of the Law in the coming months, those who have a mortgage with a variable interest rate can amortize early by paying a commission for the amount delivered of 0.5% in the first three years, which will fall to 0.25% until the fifth year, from which it is reduced to zero. For fixed rate mortgages, the repayment fee will be 3% in the first four years and 4% thereafter. The commission will always be calculated on the capital to be amortized.

Default interest: Default interest is limited to three times the legal interest rate of the loan and new deadlines are established so that the bank can request the early maturity of a mortgage.

Evictions: Currently, as of the third month of nonpayment of the mortgage payment, the bank considers the customer to be in arrears and can start proceedings to seize the property. This threshold now changes. The bank will not be able to foreclose during the first half of its life (for example during the first 15 years of a 30-year mortgage) until the amount of the default exceeds 2% of the granted capital or nine monthly payments have been unpaid. In the event that the defaults occur during the second half of the life of the mortgage, the percentage rises to 4% of the capital and the time limit up to 12 months. This new early maturity clause will apply to all existing mortgage loans.

But you must remember that in Spain if the house is handed over to the bank, that does not necessarily clear the debt! The bank can and will still pursue the debtor and guarantors for interest and shortfalls.

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Health Recruits about 100 Volunteers to Test the Anticaries Bacteria.

Alejandro Mira, a biologist from the province of Alicante, leads the research that seeks to end the most widespread infectious disease in the world....End cavities! This is the objective of the research of the biologist Alejandro Mira. The team that has led in recent years has discovered a new bacterium that promises to eliminate this infectious disease, considered the most widespread in the world, affecting 90% of the population.

Mira and her team, who work in the Foundation for the Promotion of Sanitary and Biomedical Research of the Valencian Community dependent on the Department of Health, are now taking another step to put into practice what promising results in the laboratory. For this they are recruiting these days to a hundred volunteers to participate in a trial to test the effectiveness of the anticaries bacteria, called "streptococcus dentisani", administered through a gel, specifically designed to allow the bacteria to adhere to the tooth. It is the largest test developed so far to find a practical application to this bacterium, unknown until now for science, and promising to revolutionize the field of dentistry.

Streptococcus dentisani acts as a shield against bacteria that cause cavities, producing a substance that inhibits them and prevents the onset of this infectious disease. Half of the volunteers participating in this trial, according to Fisabio, will receive a dose of the bacteria daily for seven days. The other half will receive a placebo. The application of the gel will be done with different formulations to see which is the most effective combination.

The researchers "will take samples of saliva and plaque of volunteers and measure the pH values and colonization of the bacteria at 15 days and a month, as well as the ability to neutralize acids," explained since the foundation. between 18 and 65 years old and have a previous history of cavities or active caries at the moment. In addition, they should not have taken medication during the previous month.

preliminary clinical study, carried out in a sample of 12 people,



showed that after administration, colonization of the bacteria takes place, which ends up in the patient's mouth. This study also confirmed that there are no side effects after its application, and that, in addition, it produces an improvement in the pH values of the volunteers.

After the preliminary study, the researchers conducted the first clinical trial, with 70 people, between July 2016 and February 2017. It involved 70 volunteers, who were given a dose of streptococcus dentisani daily for 7 days. The results of this trial are still being analyzed and will be published. The researchers hope to confirm the values of the preliminary study and that the results of both clinical trials help to establish the exact dose to be administered to patients and the optimal duration of treatment with the bacteria.

Alejandro Mira studied Biological Sciences at the University of Alicante, took his doctorate at the University of Oxford and did postdoctoral stays in the US and Sweden. Since 2008 he has been working in València.

Claim's Firm Closed.

A firm responsible for pressuring people into making holidaysickness claims has had its licence stripped by the Claims Management Regulator, the UK's Ministry of Justice has reported.

Intelligence gathered by the Claims Management Regulator (CMR) officers revealed that Lancashire based Allsure Ltd had encouraged British tourists on holiday in Spanish and other European resorts to fabricate or embellish symptoms of gastric illness to get compensation. Further evidence showed the firm had used deceptive sales scripts, exaggerating expected payouts to entice consumers. The action taken against Allsure Ltd is the latest in a series of moves by government to crackdown on fake sickness claims, following concerns from the travel industry of a surge in insurance claims for gastric illnesses like food poisoning being brought by British holidaymakers.

These false claims were substantial enough for the Spanish government to request the British government to take action following substantial lobbying from the Spanish hotel industry. It is believed that hotels in Spain have been forced to pay out tens of millions to cover dubious claims.







Drownings!

A total of 375 people have died of drowning in Spain in the first eight months of the year, of which 235 have been drowned during the three months of summer, with July being the most tragic, with 95 deaths. This figure is only for the first eight months of this year.

There have been 50 more drowning deaths than in the same period of 2016 and almost 100 more than in 2015.

The profile of the drowning victim in Spain is that of a male (80 percent), of Spanish nationality (75 percent), older than 35 years (71 percent), between 10 am and

8 pm (70 percent). By autonomous communities, Andalusia is the one with the highest number of deaths until August 31, with 66 victims (17.6 percent of the total),



followed by the Valencian Community and the Canaries, with 55 deaths (14.7 percent) and Galicia, with 49 deaths (13.1 percent).

This figure is far too high, particularly for a country with so much beach tourism.

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

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UK passport — made in France?

It was supposed to be a defining symbol of Britain's identity post-Brexit — traditional, blue and embossed with a proud lion and unicorn crest.

But it has emerged the new British passport could be designed and made by a European company after two foreign firms were shortlisted for the £490m

contract. Insiders say the companies, believed to French be and German, will battle it out with the British private security

company De La Rue to win the contract to produce 6m passports a year. The Home Office is expected to announce the winner before Christmas.

The prospect of a European Union company winning the contract has left some Eurosceptic MPs seeing red. They were counting the days before ditching the burgundy-covered document introduced in 1988 to match the other EU countries.

Last night the Conservative MP Andrew Bridgen said the proposal was bordering on the ridiculous: "While I want to see the government achieving the best value for money, it would be ludicrous if our passports were made in Europe."

Andrew Rosindell, chairman of the parliamentary flags and heraldry committee, said: "I want to see the new British passport manufactured in Britain in a British factory employing British people because if it is not it rather defeats the objective of upholding British identity."

The Home Office and De La Rue declined to comment. (Sunday Times)

Pee in the Pool!

Now hold on! This is not a request. It is an antisocial act that normally goes under the radar (or water), but many swimmers have long suspected the truth: people are peeing in the pools.

Now scientists have been able to confirm the full extent of offending for the first time, after developing a test designed to estimate how much urine has been covertly added to a large volume of water.

The test works by measuring the concentration of an artificial sweetener, acesulfame potassium (ACE), that is commonly found in processed food and passes through the body unaltered. After tracking the levels of the sweetener in two public pools in Canada over a three-week period they calculated that swimmers had released 75 litres of urine – enough to fill a medium-sized dustbin – into a large pool about one-third the size of an Olympic pool, and 30 litres into a second pool, around half the size of the first.

The findings make for unwelcome reading, but swimmers might find some comfort in the measurements from eight hot tubs, which were found to have far higher urine levels. One hotel Jacuzzi had more than three times the concentration of sweetener than in the worst swimming pool.

Dying is not free!

This is what can happen when a deceased person has no funeral insurance and his family cannot afford the funeral in Spain. This is a rough translation of a comment column by José Antonio Casado Mena in Informacion on 13/09/2017.

At dawn on Friday, September 1, the soul of my dear cousin José María Perello Mena left the body of the one who used this earthly life to meet God in Heaven, as a man of faith who he always was.

My parents and my sister ran to the morgue. A silent anguish drowned them. Jose Maria, our Jose Maria, had died. I arrived a little later. Between tears and memories, an incredible thing began to happen.

I tell you a little to give you some background. My cousin was a young man of 43 years, divorced. He had a 7-yearold daughter with his first wife and a 3-year-old daughter with his second partner. His mother, my Aunt Rafaela, is a pensioner of 600 \notin / month. The deceased had no death insurance, as did 43% of those who die in Spain. Nor did he have money saved, neither his descendants, nor his mother, nor his ex-wife, nor those who in life would have been obliged to feed him (as the Civil Code says) could cover the expenses of the funeral, so a problem arose.

The morgue, faced with insolvency, stated that if there was no insurance and no one taking care of the expenses, the protocol to follow was to put the body in cold storage for about eight or ten days, until a competent court gave them the order to bury it in a common grave, to be paid later by the city. My family put their hands to their head, in tears, as they wondered how it was possible that in the XXI century the Spanish State could not cover something like this. The undertakers immediately took out a fee schedule and said that depending on a number of circumstances, such as the destination of the coffin (cemetery or cremation), coffin, certificates, fees, mass, wreaths, tombstone, obituaries, funeral services and taxes could cost about €6,000, but adjusting it could leave it at \notin 4,600, when the average cost of a funeral per municipality is about € 3,545, according to the OCU!

And so it is, however sad and because of many taxes we have paid during our life and how honourable it has been, that the State abandons you without any mercy, although not before charging you a luxury tax of 21% for funeral cost & expenses due to the fact that Minister Cristóbal Montoro was responsible for increasing VAT by 13 percentage points (from 8% to 21%) in 2013 - except flowers, where the VAT is 10% and rent of the niche and religious service which are exempt. Thanks for the gesture. With this scenario, the Mena family had only two options left, a collection between friends and family, or wait for someone to offer to pay for everything so that my cousin

could have a wake, a mass and a dignified burial. Finally, my father did, in order to grant my cousin the dignity that the Spanish state had usurped. The cousins on our part proudly carry the coffin on their shoulders.

This brings me to moral issues in which I wonder what we have done wrong as a society so that the guests at a wedding give gifts and huge amounts of money to the couple but we are not able to put even a single euro for the funeral of a deceased or to help the widow or orphaned children who, on many occasions, are so helpless.

When God judges us may we have many banknotes!

If you have, or are about to become a resident in Spain, there are a couple of things you should do to ensure that your passing does not have cause even more misery to your nearest and dearest.

First, take out a Spanish will, with a notation to mirror the inheritance nuances of your previous home-country. See Sol Med on page 12 who offer a reasonably priced and very competent service.

Secondly, sort out your funeral insurance. There are many schemes available locally - some better than others. I have written at length on this subject before and if you do not organise this, the *tanatorios* <u>will</u> take advantage of you or your loved ones! I have seen many cases of how they have inflated the costs to expats regularly, by between one and two thousand euros.

We particularly like and have availed of the funeral plan offered by Rocamer on page 28. This plan is very affordable and has much going for it.

Even if you 'peg-it' while visiting the UK or any other location in the world on holiday, they will repatriate your remains back to your home town in Spain, together with travel assistance for others on the policy.

Frankly, if you are middle aged or of mature years, i.e. an old fart, to ignore either of the above is irresponsible.

New Builds booming in Alicante, Resales still top and Brits still main foreign buyers.

The following article is an abridged and adapted translation (by Spanish Property Insight) of an article published by the Spanish daily El Mundo on the 11th of September 2017, explaining how real estate development is recovering faster in the Valencian Region's Alicante province than in the regional capital itself, largely thanks to Alicante's foreign demand. I have also added my own comments to it in brackets.

Alicante doesn't beat Valencia very often when it comes to big economic figures, but there's one activity where it does win against its northern neighbour: the property sector. Construction in Alicante is recovering at a faster rate than in Valencia.

Both have suffered similar problems since the property bubble burst back in 2008, although the impact was higher in Alicante. But almost ten years later, the property industry is on the way to stability. And in the race to recovery, Alicante is ahead of Valencia thanks to the driving force of residential tourism.

While Valencia beats Alicante in some market sectors such as luxury city homes, offices, business premises and industrial warehouses, when it comes to sales of houses and land, new developments, finished projects and investment figures, Alicante leads the race.

In terms of sales, Alicante is way in front of Valencia. Official statistics point to 32,068 sales in Alicante province in the year to June compared to 23,644 in Valencia province.

The trend for number of new-build starts is similar. According to the latest Spanish government figures, some 2,080 new builds were started in Alicante between January and May this year. The Alicante Architects Association say 2,544 were started by June. In Valencia, the figure sits at just 698, three times lower than Alicante.

Houses are also being finished more quickly in Alicante – between January and May this year 1,487 were completed. In Valencia, just 501 and it's a similar story for nonresidential construction. In Valencia, work started on 60 buildings in the first five months of the year while in Alicante, the figure was 63. Office and industrial construction is, however, higher in Valencia (11 buildings) than Alicante (5).

Real Estate Investment: According to the Alicante Technical Architects Association, some $\in 182$ million was invested in new residential projects in Alicante in the first six months of this year. Bearing in mind that construction activity in Alicante is considerably higher than in Valencia, it seems to logical to conclude that investment is also much higher.

Spanish government figures put new-build investment in the Comunidad Valenciana region at \in 236 million. If Alicante is building 70% of the developments, some \in 165 million of the total was invested between January and May.

Land sales are also more active in Alicante than Valencia. In the former, there have been 796 land sales over the last year with a value of $\notin 135$ million and a total size of 1.3 million square metres. In Valencia province, 692 land sales took place with a value of $\notin 86$ million and 1.08 million square metres.

There are several reasons why the residential sector in Alicante is busier than in Valencia. The main one is demand from foreigners who buy 40% of all homes in Alicante, 12,700 properties out of the total 32,000. In Valencia, just 2,000 homes are bought by foreigners. (The British continue to be the main foreign buyers. Even though their overall percentage in the foreign buyers has dropped because of Brexit uncertainties and a weak sterling rate, British purchasers remain, by far, the major foreign buyers.)

Alicante has always had more appeal for foreign buyers. Resorts such as Las Marinas, Torrevieja, Orihuela Costa and Pilar are dominated by the foreign market. "There are more residential projects because there's more demand, especially for holiday homes," say construction companies.

Proof of this is the fact that Spain's largest new-build construction companies are concentrating more on Alicante than Valencia. Aedas, Neinor, Activum SG and Lar y Merlin all include the Costa Blanca in their new development plans. Valencia is also included, although to a lesser extent. And Sareb (Spain's so-called bad bank) also does more business in Alicante, tipping the balance in favour of Alicante.

(It is worth bearing in mind that purchases of resales still remain significantly more than new build purchases. More taxation is paid on the latter and I believe that most new builds are small - too many little boxes squeezed into smaller plots, some too close to the main roads and just too expensive for such small living spaces.

Prices: It is good to see that, after the collapse of property prices for several years, prices are on the 'up' again. But resale prices are more realistic than the new little boxes currently being offered by the developers. Resales on the Costa Blanca are up

5% on last year, while some banks such as BBVA, are predicting ríses of up to 10% nexi year. This is a bít O wíshful thinking, Ι belíeve. Spain does

not need a new property bubble so soon after the last one. But then again, even the lessons of history, no matter how recent, are rarely learned. Mick)

In March, 2017, the US Department of Commerce kickstarted an anti-dumping campaign with a review of all US imports as part of Trump's bid to protect local jobs.

A runaway bride who allegedly fled with £13,000 of her fiance's stag-do fund has been arrested.


Rachel Doran, photo, vanished following the incident regarding a missing stag-do fund during early September. Her fiance Chris Mahone, 27, had reportedly let her

A British man has been fined for swimming across the Colorado river at the Hoover Dam, photo, while drunk



on a stag do. Aaron Hughes is thought to be the first person to survive the swim across the reservoir at the 221mtall (726ft) structure, which is on the border

of Arizona and Nevada.

The 28-year-old was told he escaped being dragged under only because nine of the 10 hydroelectric turbines were not in operation at the time.

Hughes, a forklift truck driver from Denbighshire, north Wales, was arrested and handcuffed immediately after getting out of the water and fined \$330 (\pounds 250).

"It was around 45-50 degrees outside and we were on a stag do in Vegas. You go to Vegas to have fun, don't you? We made the *Hangover* movie look tame......we were all just standing there and I thought fuck it, I'm going for a swim. I got to the bottom and thought: I can make that," said Hughes. It took him 30 minutes to cross the reservoir.

"Even though I was knackered halfway across, I knew I had to get to the other side. The water was pulling me in towards the dam."

In the last 10 years, 275 people have died at the site and no one had previously survived swimming across its breadth. However, it is thought that had all of the turbines been switched on, Hughes also would not have survived. I bet his parents are very proud.

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
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
