Bienvenido a todos and welcome to the February, 2018 edition. Issue No.128.

For both December and most of January, we have been incredibly lucky with the warm weather. Beautiful blue skies most days, very warm unless a chilly north wind was present. The temperature hit 24/25° several times, eight degrees more than normal for this time of year, although the record was at 29.2° on January 7, 1982. Most evenings are now quite chilly, the temperature dropping quite a bit in late January. The processional caterpillars are also making an early appearance locally due to the mild weather, so careful when walking your pooch.

The Spanish Met Office tell of a 'warmer and dryer winter' with little chance of substantial rain before the spring. Alicante province faces its fifth consecutive year of droughts, and the driest Autumn for the last 36 years. Water levels in the few reservoirs are very low and farmers are having to deal with greatly reduced crops with little hope of adequate water supplies in the short and medium term. Citrus crops are expected to be down by 30%, in the case of lemons by 200,000 tons. Artichokes, the best selling vegetable have also been badly hit.

It was decided to increase the production of the desalination plant in Torrevieja from the current level of 40 cubic hectometres to 80. (Much of the water coming out of your taps at the moment is from the desal' plant.) But the problem is the plant has

insufficient power to cope with the increase and both Red Eléctrica and Iberdrola advised that the work to supply the extra power to the plant could take up to nine months! Bad planning or what!

Roadworks to bring the extra power to the plant began in December and they have been causing traffic chaos locally. It is fair to say that there are many other roadworks as well for other utilities because of the increase in newly built housing estates, but the electric works are easily identifiable because of the giant spools of black heavy cabling with a copper core as thick as a man's arm. Security guards watch the cables at night to avoid theft.

Locally, many businesses are suffering because of the restrictions with many roads blocked. The local Consum supermarket and other businesses in lower Los Altos have been badly hit and are furious.



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Did you know that

...South Africa is the world leader in penis transplants? I kid you not! This is mainly due to the persistence of traditional male circumcision in many communities particularly the amaXhosa, the second largest ethnic group in South Africa. The traditional procedure leads to dozens of South African men's deaths each year many from dehydration or septicaemia. As many as 46 initiates died in the Eastern Cape in the 2015-2016 season alone. Attempts to reduce the number of deaths through legislation like the Application of Health Standards in Traditional Circumcision Act of 2001 have had little impact, and among those who survive botched circumcisions, complete amputation is often the only recourse. Roughly 48,000 traditional circumcisions took place nationally in 2015, according to government estimates, with most occurring in the Eastern Cape—the poorest province in the country. In one ceremony, 13 boys had their foreskin removed with the same knife. The wounds are then dressed with leaves, which often leads to infection, and if not treated correctly, gangrene and amputation. In one case a donor white penis was transplanted onto a black man. (I suppose they could call it a 'Michael Jackson.') Still, maybe the other way round could become very popular!

...seedless avocados are now available? M&S in the UK has been selling these, with a pack of five costing around £2. These seedless/stoneless avocados are between 5 and 8cm long, are said to be very creamy in taste and the skin is also edible. They are grown in Spain, and are the result of un pollinated avocado blossom. The fruit is "only available during

December, when usually it is sent to a Parisian food market and bought by chefs to be used in top-end restaurants. This year M&S has been able to source a small number of the avocados "exclusively," for their supermarkets. Unfortunately I doubt whether any are available locally. When M&S first introduced avocados to the public in 1968, they were described as as and

were meant to be eaten with custard!

...the 'Three Kings' might originally have come from Andalucia? The last Pope thought so. In his 2012 book *Jesus of Nazareth: The Infancy Narratives* Pope Benedict XVI claimed the gift-bearing trio came from Tarsis – or Tartessosa – a kingdom that historians place somewhere between the provinces of Huelva, Cadiz and Sevilla.

...the Vatican uses milk to paint its buildings? An ancient recipe mixes milk from the Pope's cows with slaked lime and natural pigments. The Belvedere Palace, which dates back to 1484 and houses precious art of the Vatican Museums, is currently being repainted with milk. It's an ancient recipe that has proven more lasting than any modern synthetic paints: "We're not nostalgic for the past," said the Vatican's chief architect, Vitale Zanchettin. "The point is that we think these solutions age better. They are tried and tested."

After the snap regional election in Catalonia on December 21, no single party there gained an absolute majority. The turnout rate was a historic high of 81%, higher even than at the landmark post Franco Spanish elections of 1982.

The centre party, Ciudadanos, was by far the most voted party, attracting over 1.1 million votes (25.37%) compared to 940,000 (21.65%) for its nearest rival, the separatist Junts per Catalunya, the party of ousted Catalan premier Carles Puigdemont, which won the largest number of seats (34) of the three pro-independence parties. Catalonia's three secessionist parties had secured a combined 70 seats in the regional parliament, two more than the 68 required for a majority in the 135-seat assembly. While Puigdemont's party won less votes and seats than the constitutionalist party Ciudadanos (37), it hopes to govern with the support of the Catalan Republican Left (ERC) and the anti-austerity party CUP, which won 32 and four seats respectively. The biggest surprise of the election was the growth of Ciudadanos (Citizens). The regional election was disastrous for the PP, who now have less than five seats in the region. Although still languishing in Belgium (with a short trip to Denmark), Carles Puigdemont still wants to be premier and says he can govern from abroad! However, parliamentary bylaws expressly forbid remote appointments, meaning the sacked premier would need to physically appear before Congress in order to be sworn in.

Following the increase in votes for Ciudadanos in Catalonia, a national poll revealed that if a General Election was held in Spain today, Ciudadanos would be the party most voted for. Although they would not have an absolute majority, they would if necessary, ditch their support for the PP, whose voters seem to be in rapid decline.

After waiting 10 years for compensation, property owners who have had their land expropriated for the building of Corvera Airport are being forced to incur judicial costs to secure their agreed payments.

There are lots of red faces concerning the high speed rail link between Alicante and Barcelona. The 'high speed' link is now 15 minutes slower than it was 20 years ago! Excuses are being offered such as track modifications and it did not help when one train ploughed through 60 sheep on January 2. Anybody like to buy some cheap lamb? A bit mangled.

The Spanish football Liga wants to cutback the excessive amounts surrounding the British Premier League, with a plan for the next decade to expand the international audience. Javier Tebas, president of the Spanish Liga, said that the Premier League earns approximately 40% more than the Spanish do, who obtain 1.7 billion € for audio/visual rights.

Banks in Spain have already returned two billion euros to clients, in repayment of the 'ground clauses.' That represents 43% of all claimants so far according to sources. If you have had a mortgage for some years and have not checked whether there was a 'ground clause' in the mortgage, you could be throwing thousands of euros in compensation away. Worth checking out?

Pfizer has given UK pharmacies permission to sell Viagra over the counter in the UK from Spring 2018. But of course you were always able to buy it online......so I am told!

The Ministry of Finance is withholding over €2 billion in support for the various regions until they have their budgets approved.

Wages in Spain are only increasing at a quarter of the average increases in Europe.

During the last two months, almost everybody I know has come down with a very bad cold, often accompanied by an annoying cough, particularly restricting one's sleep. As we are also in the 'flu season' doctors are demanding extraordinary measures from the Department of Health to tackle the current flu epidemic. In the Valencian Community the epidemic reached its peak with a rate of 281 cases per 100,000 inhabitants in weeks two and three of January. The most affected are children and young people up to 14 years old and 92% of the patients were not vaccinated. The influenza vaccine being used this season is showing an effectiveness of only 25% due to the unanticipated predominance of the B strain.

Heavy snowfalls in Northern Spain converted the AP-6 into a rats' maze' after 400 cars were trapped on the motorway for some 18 hours. The Government is fining the concessionary company who blames the volume of traffic combined with the snowfall. The Military Emergencies Unit mobilised more than 240 soldiers to free the cars and rescue the passengers.

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

The National Police has arrested 32 people accused of defrauding 1,076,000 euros in unemployment benefits, hiring subsidies and other aid they obtained without being entitled to them through different companies in the province of Las Palmas in the Canaries. The defendants, Spanish nationality, Moroccan, Senegalese, Mauritanian and Bangladeshi, benefited from all kinds of benefits and subsidies for unemployed and foreigners in need that were granted after claiming that they had been hired by the companies involved in the fraud, who also did not pay their corresponding fees to Social Security. The 32 people are accused of crimes of document forgery and Social Security fraud.

Attempted frauds to claim insurance in Murcia have increased by 127% in a year' – the assurance companies have detected some 12,500 cases in the region in 2016 – exaggerated amounts around 20 million \in .

each resident in the Murcia region owes on average 20,706 € to clear the regional administration debt.

Probably worthy of an entry to the 'Idiot's' section is the left wing mayor of Madrid, Manuela Carmena, seen here on the right of, the equally controversial mayor of



the city of Barcelona. She made two major pedestrian thoroughfares one way on the same street in the downtown shopping areas. So, if you were on one side of the street and wanted to cross to the other, you had to walk to the end of the

pavement you were on, cross in the only permitted area, and then walk back up the other street to the shop you wanted to visit. Madrileños were not amused. One said, 'Baaaa! We look like sheep. They won't even let us walk wherever we like on the street,' complained one man walking ahead of a number of police officers stationed there to enforce regulations. One woman barred by police from crossing before the designated cross over commented, 'Carmena will say that this thing has worked. By force, that is. If you try to go in the wrong direction, you get slapped with a fine, I shouldn't have to go all the way around the block because a random politician wants me to. This year they've come up with a real dumb-ass idea.'

More than 22,000 migrants from Africa entered Spain via the Med' during 2017. The figure for 2016 was 13,000. The ever increasing flood of misery has put great strain on the provision of adequate detention facilities. Inadequate warehouses and old jails are now being used.

Ten traffic radars in the Balearies collected nearly two million € last year from Jan' to October. The Calvià motorway alone captures around 40 speeders a day.

The number of British buying homes in Spain fell by 16.4% in the first half of 2017, but still remain the largest group, followed by the French and Germans, according to the General Council of Notaries. British made 13.9% of the total foreign purchasers, French 8.8%, Germans 8.2%, Italians 7.7%, Romanians 6.9%, and Belgians 6.2%, totalling 51.2% of total sales. Sales to Russians are now down to 3% and 4.7% to the Chinese.

The trade unions in Spain have been quite successful in negotiating retirement (ERE) deals for bank staff facing early retirement. Staff between the ages of 55 and 63 in the Santander and Popular banks receive pensions of 80% of their wages. Very generous. Nice to know that the bank charges on your pension are going towards another pension!

The Catalan separatists opened a number of Catalan 'embassies' throughout the world in an effort to promote their 'independence.' These were all closed down by the government in Madrid under Article 155. The 'embassy' in the US of A cost \in 1,100,000 and one in Geneva, Switzerland cost \in 760,000. Another seven embassies were also created, Portugal (\in 450,000), France (\in 895,000), Germany (\in 500,000), Italy (\in 738,000), Austria (\in 700,000), Denmark (\in 520,000) and Poland (\in 500,000). These represent a cost, for 2017 alone of \in 6,163,000! The 33 people who staffed these have also been sacked.

Two school bus drivers have been detained after testing positive for drugs — both from Alcantarilla in Murcia, one for hashish and the other for cocaine. So far this year, 56 professional drivers under the influence of alcohol or drugs have already been caught on the roads in Murcia.

One would think that companies (or individuals) securing a supply contract to a town hall would be a major boost to their business, however in many cases it can be an economic kiss-of-death. The problem is that many town halls can't afford to pay their suppliers quickly or on time. The government amended the law so that all suppliers should be paid within 30 days. But this is still extremely rare. One town council in Malaga, Andalucia - Cortes de la Frontera - takes more than two years to pay its bills. In the province of Malaga alone, 25 town councils exceed the 30 day pay limit and 13 take more than 100 days to pay.

The appalling slowness of the Spanish judicial system continues. In the Murcia Region during the third quarter of 2017 alone, the regional courts received 42,300

cases. Of these, only 3.5% of the cases were ruled on according to the General Council for Judicial Power. Nationally, 165,000 ground clause cases are delayed.



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Scumbag!

Rodrigo Lanza is a squatter and political activist of the extreme anti-system left and *independenistas* in Barcelona. In February 2006, a group of agents of the Guàrdia Urbana were called to a squat in Barcelona following reports of disturbances to public order during an alcohol and drugs party. Lanza, photo, threw a rock from five metres at one of the guards, 33-year-old Juan José Salas, which hit him on the forehead. Juan collapsed and hit the back of his head on the ground. Lanza remained in a coma in hospital for several months, but when he finally awoke, it was discovered that he was now a quadriplegic, with lasting mental damage as well. Lanza was 33 at the time.

In 2009 the Supreme Court sentenced Lanza to five years in prison. He was also ordered to pay Juan Salas €935,641.85 for the assault and injuries and €120,767.65 euros to his wife and children for moral damage. Of course, Lanza never paid a penny and was released from jail after serving just two and a half years. Some of the warders referred to Lanza as 'the worst we ever had!'

Then in 2015 a TV documentary, *Ciutat Morta*, partly financed by the current mayor of Barcelona, Ada Colau, and promoted by the far-left Podemos Party, claimed that Lanza was innocent. Barcelona City Council awarded Lanza, not the victim, €7,000!

On December 8, 2017, 55-year-old Víctor Laínez was having a drink in a bar in Heroismo, Zaragoza. Laínez was wearing trouser braces which had the colours of the Spanish national flag. Lanza was also in the bar with three friends, a man and two women. The group started to call out to Laínez - 'Fascist' and 'pro-Franco'. When Laínez tried to leave the bar it is alleged that Lanza attached him from behind and hit him on the head with a blunt object. It is also alleged that Lanza's friend also kicked Victor when he was on the ground.

Víctor Laínez died in hospital four days later and Lanza was arrested. No doubt this jerk will, if convicted, be out in a couple of years and once again claim to be the victim. I just wonder how much Barcelona City Council will pay him this time?

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
The Lottery, Cheese and Messi.

The club is located just off the AP-7 on the outskirts

of Elche, about a 40 minute drive from here, open every day except Monday from 10:00 to 20:00 hrs.

There are 6 separate ranges at the club for everything from air pistol, small bore and full bore pistol, 100



metre indoor rifle range as well as muzzle loaders and historical arms. In addition there is a large clubhouse/bar and there is an active social side to the club which has a membership from all over Europe and Scandinavia.

Up until a year ago members were allowed to take guests to "have a go" but sadly, due to tightening of firearms regulations this is no longer possible, instead the initial membership fee includes a 6 week course of 2 hours a week the first being safety and the next 5 practical tuition leading to a simple proficiency test after which a firearms licence is granted, after that, membership is \in 40 (\in 25 for over 65's) a quarter and for that you can use the ranges without limitations.

Heathrow Airport Complaints.

Heathrow received 78,794 noise complaints last year, and 62% of those were made by 10 people, according to new figures from the airport.

The 10 people who made the most complaints last year accounted for 48,562 complaints, while 2,775 individuals filed a complaint over 2017.

Just 10 residents in Slough clocked 6,074 complaints over the course of three months.

Direct Ferry Service - Ireland to Spain.

Brittany Ferries have announced the launch of the first ever direct ferry service from Ireland to Spain. The route will be from Cork to Santander, departing from Cork every

Wednesday and Friday and will take 26 hours. The newly chartered ship, the 'Connemara' (photo), will have a capacity for 500 passengers and 195 cars.



The new route, which runs from late April to November should be a boon to haulage companies and give Irish tourists a greater choice of holiday options. Bookings will be available from late January this year. The company expects a 50/50 split between passengers and freight carried.


Low Crime Figures for Orihuela.

According to an annual report of the Ministry of the Interior, both Orihuela Costa and Elche, are towns/municipalities with populations in excess of 60,000 with the lowest crime rate in Alicante.

Both have a crime rate of 21 crimes per 1,000 inhabitants.

However, things are worse in Benidorm, with an average crime rate of 43.87 per 1,000 inhabitants and 42.36 in Torrevieja.

Experts say that the figures are rather surprising in respect of Elche and Orihuela, since both cities have a large population area, with many districts and country areas, where robberies are traditionally more frequent due to the



difficulty of the police agencies to "cover" many of the outlying areas.

In Alicante, with a population of almost 330,000 people, the crime rate is 27.25 crimes per 1,000 inhabitants whilst in Villajoyosa the report shows 22.52 crimes per thousand inhabitants

Police sources say that the towns with a higher incidence of crime are usually in coastal areas where many of the properties lie empty for much of the year, thereby proving to be a major attraction to criminals.

The figures above relate to reported crimes, obviously. Many thefts and other illegal activities are not reported, due mainly to the palaver involved in reporting them.

The law is scarcely a deterrent with jail sentences of two years or less being rarely served for first offences. Also, if the goods stolen are less than around three to four hundred euros, it is unlikely to come to court. Add to this an incredibly slow judicial system. It is no wonder that there are legions of thieves still plying their trade.

This was followed by the death of the Basque bullfighter Iván Fandiño, who died following injuries received in a bullring in Aire-sur-l'Adour, southwestern France, in June 2017.

Waning in popularity in Spain, with an active and vociferous anti-bullfighting lobby, it was banned in Catalonia in 2012. However in October 2016, the ban was lifted by the Spanish Constitutional Court.

Bullfighting is very popular in Mexico where there are many bullrings and famous bullfighters. But what caught my eye was a bullfight in the new year in Plaza de Querétaro, Mexico City. During the fifth bullfight of the day, 21-year-old Francisco Martínez, was knocked unconscious. 
Prior to his 'job' with the Bibliographic Action Unit, Carles flirted briefly with the far-right politically and then joined as

Another one of his super heroes was *Españísima*, photo, who flew around on a guitar, used a fan as a shield and imparted justice in Valencian lands. (I think I'm in love!)

Carles was then given the job of Head of Publications in the Valencia Delegation. Soon gained an audience with King Juan Carlos I

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
Stop Charging Your Phone Overnight!

Most nights, the last thing I do before I close my eyes and drift off to dreamland is scroll through my phone and charge it by my bedside overnight. If you are like me, your phone battery won't last the entire day and you've made a routine out of charging up your phone while you sleep. However, the convenience of charging overnight may actually be killing your phone's battery

According to tech experts, charging your phone overnight chips away at the phone's long term battery capacity much faster than if you only charged your phone for a couple of hours each day.

"If you think about it, charging your phone while you're sleeping results in the phone being on the charger for 3-4 months a year," says Hatem Zeine, founder of Ossia, a developer of wireless charging technology told Time. "So even though the manufacturers try their best to cover this scenario, this process inevitably lowers the capacity of your phone's battery."

The good news is that tech experts agree, you can't overcharge your phone. Once your battery is charged to 100%, the hardware inside shuts off the charging. "Modern



smart phones are smart, meaning that they have built in protection chips that will safeguard the phone from taking in more charge than what it should," says Edo Campos, spokesperson for battery-maker Anker. "Good quality chargers also have protection chips that

prevent the charger from releasing more power than what's needed."

However, what is killing your battery is the "trickle charge." What happens during an overnight charge is your charger turns off when your phone reaches 100%, but the charger tops off the charge during the night--this is called the "trickle charge." So overnight, your phone is constantly switching between 100 percent, a little less, and the "trickle charge."

While you won't see the battery damage immediately, you will see the effects of overnight charging in about two to three years. If you get a new phone every couple of years, greatbut if not, a failing battery can be a real pain.

So what do these experts recommend?

Don't wait until your phone gets close to a 0% battery charge until you recharge it.

Once your phone gets down to around a 35% or 40% plug it into a charger since full charges wear out your battery faster. Keep your phone cool while it charges because heat damages you phone. So take it out of the case while it charges and don't put it under your pillow or blankets.

The Christmas Lottery Launderers & the Crooks.

In the hours after the winning numbers in Spain's massive El Gordo Christmas lottery are drawn every December 22, discreetly dressed men and women carrying suitcases stashed with bank notes fan out across the country headed for bars, lottery outlets, and banks before the fortunate owners of the prized tickets cash them in. Acting on behalf of wealthy clients, their mission is to buy their winning tickets: they pay cash, ask no questions, and offer a generous bonus on top. It's a very simple way to help reduce their clients' tax bill.

"Everybody knows that the Christmas lottery has always been used to launder money," says veteran tax inspector José María Peláez Marcos, adding that it is almost impossible for the authorities to detect this kind of fraud.

"Lottery tickets are untraceable, so unless we are present when they are bought [...] it is pretty much impossible to establish who originally purchased them," he says.

According to Spain's OCU consumer rights organization, winning lottery tickets can be sold on for up to 20 percent more than their value. But the association warns that the seller of a winning lottery ticket will then have the problem of explaining to their bank and the tax authorities how they came into so much money, and may end up being fined.

The odds of buying one of the big winning numbers are one in 100,000 – the amount of El Gordo ticket numbers available – so it's little wonder that the authorities are suspicious when well-known figures such as Carlos Fabra, the former head of the Popular Party-run provincial government of Castellón, are photographed holding a winning ticket for the umpteenth time. Fabra,



photo, who was sentenced to four year's prison in November 2013 for fraud, won the lottery nine times in 10 years. Gosh, he was so lucky!

In 2011, another

Popular Party (PP) politician, Enrique Crespo, the former mayor of the small town of Manises, in Valencia province, was seen on television toasting his good fortune with his colleagues after winning second prize in the Christmas lottery, although he was unable to say just how many tickets he had. It turned out that the local PP had bought 850 décimos — or tenth shares in a ticket — with the winning number. Hmmmm? Crespo, who was being investigated for corruption at the time, was summoned by a local magistrate that very day and given 24 hours to

explain how many winning tickets he had bought. Crespo admitted he had purchased just one. "The judge was smart and fast," says tax inspector Peláez, noting that this case was very much the exception. Public prosecutors later asked for Crespo to serve a three-year prison term for having allegedly hidden 99 other tenths of the winning

way to launder money, says Peláez. "You have to bear in mind the amount," he notes. In El Gordo, the maximum prize for a décimo is €400,000. "It's doubtful that this is going to solve the money-laundering problems of somebody involved in criminal activities," says Peláez, adding that it is a more attractive system for somebody who has the equivalent of three or four décimos, which is to say less than €2 million.

"If you want to buy 20 décimos, you have to buy them from a number of different people, and this increases the risk of somebody finding out what you are up to," continues Pérez, pointing out that when it comes to large amounts of money, most people looking to avoid paying tax use other means, such as keeping their money in offshore accounts. But for "those who have a bag full of money at home earned from illegal commissions and bribes, the Christmas lottery is still the simplest way to launder money."

The OCU website warns lottery winners against selling their winning tickets, even when offered generous incentives. The main problem is proving the origin of the money to your bank. If the tax office becomes involved, it can impose heavy fines.

The organization illustrates the dangers with an example: a person with an average annual income of $\in 30,000$ who wins $\in 400,000$ on the Christmas lottery and sells their winning ticket for $\in 450,000$ could face a fine of more than $\in 200,000$.

Five Spanish women who were secretly filmed stealing products from their workplace have each been awarded €4,500 in compensation by the European Court of Human Rights (ECHR) in Strasbourg. 


their way to a house nearby following complaints about a noisy party when this chap hit them head on. See photo of police car. The driver had double the allowable rate of alcohol.


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The Salesman.
