

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Did you know that

...at a glance, the Celsius scale makes more sense than the Fahrenheit scale for temperature measuring. But its creator, Anders Celsius, was an oddball scientist. When he first developed his scale, he made freezing 100 degrees and boiling 0 degrees, or upside down. No one dared point this out to him, so fellow scientists waited until Celsius died to change the scale.

...shampoo, oven cleaner, deodorant and other household products are as significant a source of the most dangerous form of air pollution as cars, research has found? Scientists studying air pollution in Los Angeles found that up to half of particles known as volatile organic compounds (VOCs) came from products, also include domestic which paint, pesticides, bleach and perfumes. These compounds degrade into particles known as PM2.5, which cause respiratory problems and are implicated in 29,000 premature deaths each year in the UK. Traffic had been assumed to be the biggest source of air pollution. The new findings, published in the journal Science, led to warnings that countries may struggle to hit pollution targets, with most tackling vehicle emissions. The research came as another study claimed that professional cleaners suffered a decline in lung function comparable to that seen in regular smokers

function comparable to that seen in regular smokers. PM2.5 are one of the biggest global air pollution concerns. Scientists who had blamed them mainly on traffic realised that they could not account for measured air quality levels simply by looking at car emissions, however. They estimate that in Los Angeles as much as 50 per cent of VOCs came from domestic products and said there was no reason why the research would not be replicated in other cities. In past decades, cars have become significantly cleaner and their PM2.5 output has plummeted. Household products, which are also often derived from petroleum, have been overlooked.

The research, presented at a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, came as a Norwegian study found that over 20 years cleaners had a fall in lung capacity and rise in asthma similar to that seen among regular smokers. The scientists, whose work was published in the American Journal of Respiratory and Critical Care Medicine, blamed chemicals in the cleaning products.







A selection from Noel Taggart Little positive or inspiring has come out of the BREXIT negotiations to date other than bluster and wishful thinking. However, it is reassuring to see that the 'remain' lobbies are not letting the grass grow under their feet.

Bremain in Spain (http://www.bremaininspain.com), a group campaigning for the UK to remain in the European Union and to protect the rights of British migrants living in Spain, issued the following press release on the Amsterdam court decision Feb' 7, to refer specific questions to the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg.

The purpose of the case was to establish whether EU citizenship rights would automatically be lost by British citizens living in Europe, in the event of Brexit happening. The case was brought by five British nationals, including Debbie Williams, Chair of Brexpats-Hear-our-Voice, who welcomed today's decision. The ruling brought feelings of relief and hope to members of Bremain in Spain.

Sue Wilson, Chair of Bremain in Spain, says: "The question regarding our EU citizenship rights has kept many Brits awake at night. The purpose of the case was to determine whether EU citizenship stands alone or is tied inextricably to EU membership. Would we automatically lose our EU citizenship rights if the UK was no longer a member state? Our hope was a referral to the ECJ, so this is a great result."

The Amsterdam court stated it was: "Reasonable to doubt the correctness of the interpretation of Article 20 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union that the loss of the status of citizen of an EU member state also leads to loss of EU citizenship. On these grounds, preliminary questions will be put to the ECJ."

Jane Golding, Chair of British in Europe, said: "The applicants have raised fundamental questions about the nature of their EU citizenship and the circumstances in which such essential rights can be removed. The ECJ has played a key role in clarifying the scope of EU citizenship and should be asked to identify when those rights end."

A spokesperson for Brexpats-Hear-our-Voice added: "This case has always been about seeking clarification for the 46,000 Brits living in the Netherlands and the 1.2 million Brits living in other EU countries. As has been demonstrated in recent days, what Brexit means is still extremely unclear. You cannot play with the lives of 1.2 million people as if they are pieces on a chessboard." Wilson concludes: "We hope a hearing and decision will be imminent, providing clarification for those living in limbo. What seems clear is that negotiations on citizens' rights cannot be signed off until the ECJ has made a ruling."

"We have many unresolved issues and the current citizens' rights deal contains more holes than a sieve. Should the ECJ decide that leaving the EU doesn't mean losing our EU citizenship rights, that would be a game-changer. We will follow developments closely in the hope of a good night's sleep!"

Property sales in Spain continue to be buoyant. During 2017, 464,423 homes were sold, up by 14.6% over 2016 and the fourth consecutive year of growth, post crisis.

Rental prices in Barcelona are at an all-time high – new contracts have broken the $900 \in$ a month on average barrier – some $140 \in$ a day in some cases!

The Danish media described Carles Puigdemont, the fleeing would-be president of Catalonia, as "a demagogue" and "selfish" during his recent visit to Denmark to promote the separatist issue. In one newspaper column, Jens-Kristian Lütken affirmed that "Catalan independence is as stupid as the British exit from the European Union", and jokes about Puigdemont's trip: "The vanguard of the revolution arrived in a Ryanair plane. "

In an effort to combat climate change, the Balearic Government have introduced a law which will prohibit the arrival of diesel cars on the island after 2025. From that date, tourists who drive a diesel car onto the islands will be fined! Locally registered diesel cars will not be affected. The same statute will prohibit new petrol cars from 2035. The objective is to get completely electric or 90% by 2050.

The footwear industry has some 2,579 companies in the Valencian Community. Over the last two years, these have experienced a fall-off in export orders, particularly from France and the UK. This has led to the closure of 160 companies, mainly small and medium workshops, and the loss of 1,500 jobs. A new marketing strategy to concentrate on other EU countries appears to be slowly bearing fruit.

Luis de Guindos, photo, the current Minister of

Economy and Competitiveness of Spain , has been appointed as Vice President of the European Central Bank. He played a crucial role in negotiating the European Union's $\in 100$ billion bailout of Spain's stricken savings banks, and in spearheading the country's overhaul of the banking



sector, labour market and other parts of the economy. His implementation of a program of both structural reforms and austerity measures has earned praise from Spain's European partners and the OECD which estimated that no country other than Greece had implemented more structural reforms than Spain.

There is a pioneering night bus service in the city of Vigo in Galicia. Female bus passengers can alight on request and do not have to wait for scheduled stops.

The Guardia Civil is investigating the death of a British woman aged 39, whose body was found in a watercourse at Los Ramos (Murcia) – she could have been run over on a nearby road – between San Javier and Torreagüera. The owner of a car which was found burnt out a kilometre from the body has been taken into custody and declined to declare before the Murcia Local Police.

The man who invented the USB port was buried today. They got the coffin halfway into the grave, but had to pull it back up and turn it round.

In Murcia, the prosecutor has denounced the 'pardoning' of drivers tested positive for drugs – only 5 of the 1258 tested positive reached court last year in the region. A road safety spokesman wanted the offence to become penal. I would have thought it was anyway!

Electricity thefts in Mallorca have drastically reduced using remote meter readings' – frauds detected have fallen from 4,235 to 1,782 in one year – half of the stolen power corresponded to businesses and some to illegal drugs plantations.

Remaining in Mallorca, it seems that health officials have detected many cases of companies reselling out-of-date food. They also state that 'these are not isolated cases in the region.'

La Verdad (Murcia) reports 'HIV+ test is now in the chemists' – the test costs between 27 and $29 \in$ and reveals in 20 minutes if the tested is carrying the aids virus.

The worst storm in 10 years has removed sand from the beaches in Malaga and as far as Torrox. There were 300 'storm incidents' across the province with fallen trees and broken power cables the most serious.

The Spanish Government wants to extend 'permanent imprisonment'. PM Rajoy wants to progress a draft law to extend the sentence for the crimes of hiding a body, fatal kidnappings and the illegal use of chemical compounds. (Not really quite sure what the latter means.) Anxious to respond to the previous terrorist attacks in Spain, a review of sentencing was announced by both the major parties. The current maximum prison sentence for any crime in Spain is 40 years, though it is rare for anyone to serve that long. Under the new law, anyone found guilty of carrying out a deadly terror attack can get a life sentence but after serving 35 years a judicial review will decide whether they can be released. So it is not a true 'life sentence', but so-called 'reviewable life imprisonment'. Many hold this particular legislation as unconstitutional. The Socialists are likely to revoke the life sentence possibility if they regain power.

Anyone convicted of supplying weapons to terrorists faces up to 20 years in prison, while financing terror networks is punishable by up to 10 years. People who repeatedly visit web pages or social media sites that incite people to join terror groups can be sentenced to five years. Any Spaniard who joins foreign radical groups or receives training from them also can get up to five years in prison.

When the case finally came to trial in Elche this February, he had to be ejected from the court for some of the proceedings, due to his arrogant

After the jury left the courtroom to formulate its verdict at 10am on the Monday morning, the lights in the Justice Palace (which are controlled by computer) failed. A dozen relatives and close friends of the victim, together with the attending reporters, still in darkness and freezing were, after some hours, moved to the cafe, which was on a separate electrical circuit, where there was at least some lighting.

When the jury returned with the verdict at 10pm that evening, it was found that the prisoner had been moved back to the prison in Fontcalent! Mad rush then to get him back to the courtroom to face the 'guilty' verdict which was not given until 1:45am on the Tuesday morning!

Naturally, the family of the victim were furious at their treatment and the incompetence. One commented, 'It seems that they are laughing at us. This is not normal. The murderer is having a better deal than we are!'

The magistrate will now determine what the actual jail sentence will be, usually less that what the public prosecutor demands. So much for 'justice' being swift!

I did not see any of the new investment awarded to Torrevieja Hospital or to the Salud in Cabo Roig.

Doggies in the Diner!

The Portuguese Parliament has amended the law, so that animals can now enter restaurants as long as a series of requirements are met.

The regulation comes into effect this May and allows



establishments

that wish to allocate an area or space where the presence of animals can be accepted. This means that it will be the owner of the establishment who will decide

whether to accept animals or not, and may also limit the number of these. Dogs must be on a short leash and will not be able to roam freely around the restaurant.

In Spain, most of the autonomous communities ban the entry of animals to where food is prepared and served. Some European countries do allow animals in restaurants and on public transport. But then again, some animals are cleaner than some people!

March 31st 2018 is the deadline for reclaiming money from CAMbank. CAM aggressively sold a range of financial products, including preference shares to customers, without explaining the risks involved. Banco Sabadell bought the failed CAM institution for one euro in 2011. Sabadell have already paid many claims relating to the misselling by CAM.

Successful claimants can also claim back interest and the legal fees.

If you lost money in the bank failure and have not claimed yet, get your documentation and visit a competent lawyer asap, well before the deadline.

What the Banks Do with the Properties They Seize.

The banks still have more than 5,200 homes for sale in the province of Alicante. In 2014 this figure was 7,000, so the reduction is scarcely dramatic. But this does not mean that the banks have just sold 1,800 in that time, as the banks continue to seize new properties, at the same time selling others. Neither are all the properties the bank wishes to dispose of eventually on the market at the same time.

Of the companies who have been authorised to sell the properties, Haya, has the largest allocation with 1,200 properties. This company was awarded the management of the asset sales of Bankia, Cajamar, Liberbank and one of the lots awarded by SAREB, the 'Bad-Bank' set up by the Spanish government.

Next is Solvia with 1,065 properties, which includes batches from Sabadell and SAREB. In third position is Casaktua, with 973 homes; followed closely by Servihabitat, with 877; Altamira (Santander), with about 500; BBVA Vivienda, with 453; and Escogecasa (Abanca), with about 120. Idealista also carry a large stock, including most of the above - almost 3,000 properties.

Idealista compiled a study of the properties the banks were selling and found that 53% of the properties for sale, mainly flats, were in areas with a population of less than 20,000 inhabitants. This is not good news as the recovery in the property market has been concentrated in the large cities and coastal areas. Moreover, almost a quarter of the properties are in municipalities with fewer than 5,000 residents, where demand has barely awakened! 63% of the properties advertised throughout Spain by and for the banks have a value of less than 100,000 euros; another 22% is between that amount and 150,000 euros; and 8% between 150,000 and 200,000 euros.

Although the above figures of bank properties for sale might seem substantial, they are small in comparison to the overall market. Idealista claim that bank properties for sale in the Alicante region represent only 4.3% of the total sales catalogue. In Murcia the figure is 13.7% and 12% in Almeria.

No doubt some of you will be as curious as I was to see what some of the asking prices are, so I have added some of the web addresses of the sales companies mentioned above. I noticed a three-bed roomed flat for sale in Alicante

for €12,043! Mind you, I wouldn't put a dog in it.....maybe a mother-in-law!

Changes to ITV - no, not the TV channel dummy, but the car inspection!

The government have introduced a number of changes to the Vehicle Technical Inspection (ITV) similar to the MOT in the UK.

New equipment and new tests are now better able to detect fraudulent manipulations of emissions by the vehicle software. Whereas the modern vehicle can have 100 electronic control units and thousands of electrical components, special equipment is needed to detect any issues relating to the emissions and the vehicle safety.

Another change is that if the vehicle fails the first inspection, the user will have the right to go to another ITV centre throughout the national territory within a period of one month and without an extra cost for a retest. Previously, it was necessary to go to the same centre after correcting the anomalies within that same period.

The new decree also transposes a set of community directives that, among other things, will allow the recognition of ITV certificates issued in other EU member countries. This is to facilitate the process of registration in Spain of a car brought from abroad.

Whereas it used to be cheaper to get your car tested in Murcia rather than Valencia, the costs are now almost similar. In Valencia the charges are: Gasolina €44.19, Diesel €55.54, Motorbikes €17.56 and in Murcia the charges are Gasolina €39.85, Diesel €53.70 and Motorbikes €24.09.

Catalan Regional Police Under Investigation.

The Catalan regional police force, the Mossos d'Esquadra, is being investigated for allegedly providing protection to politicians responsible for organizing the illegal independence referendum that took place in the region on October 1. In a decision issued on Thursday, High Court Judge Carmen Lamela demanded the Mossos hand over records relating to the creation of the so-called "TIC commission," which was set up for the "security and protection" of regional government members, authorities from other institutions and other public figures.

This record will reveal "who ordered the protection of politicians linked to the preparation of the referendum and how this protection was managed," according to Lamela's writ.

The illegal independence referendum was the pretext for the unilateral declaration of independence passed by the Catalan parliament on October 27. The Spanish government responded by invoking Article 155 of the Spanish Constitution, which stripped Catalonia of its selfrule and gave the central government in Madrid emergency powers.

Lamela has called upon the Mossos to explain if in September and October the so-called TIC commission was tasked with providing security measures to "specific individuals" – including those who were part of a security

operation known as Ágora. The judge has directed her request to the former Mossos chief of police, Josep Lluís Trapero, photo, and superintendent Teresa Laplana. Both police officers are under



investigation for sedition. Laplana is being investigated for her role in the protests on September 20 and 21 outside

The protest involved acts of vandalism against Civil Guard patrol cars, and hindered the work of officers who were inside the building in search of election material to confiscate.

Trapero, meanwhile, has been accused of directing the Mossos to support the independence movement in defiance of orders from the courts.

Judge Lamela has also called on Civil Guard Colonel Diego Pérez de los Cabos, chief of the body tasked by the Spanish Interior Ministry to stop the October 1 referendum, to testify on February 14. During the referendum, efforts by the National Police and Civil Guard to close voting centres ended in confrontations with regional police officers, who refused to follow orders and faced off against the state authorities.

As part of the sedition probe, Judge Lamela has asked the Catalan prosecutor's office and regional prosecutors to provide copies of all reports and records presented by the Mossos, in accordance with the judicial instructions related to the October 1 referendum. In the decision, Lamela also demanded the Mossos Internal Affairs division hand over information on the investigations into Mossos police officers who defied the Civil Guard and National Police - instances that were captured in numerous videos. Lastly, the judge has asked the Mossos for information on the intervention of former Catalan Interior Minister Joaquim Forn on September 14. In the lead-up to the referendum, Forn said that the Mossos would "ensure the people can vote with freedom and security." The ousted minister is now serving pre-trial detention for charges of sedition.

National Police foiled a plan by the Mossos to destroy 36 boxes of documents which reveal that various members of the PP [Popular Party] were put under surveillance and followed by members of the Mossos force. According to documents that have been seen by EL PAÍS, as well as sources close to the investigation, the operation was ordered by officials from the Democratic Convergence of Catalonia (CDC) party. An investigative report says the goal was to collect compromising information about the politicians' "movements, meetings and links in Catalonia," which could then be used as leverage in potential negotiations with the Spanish government over the independence drive. But there are still many skeletons in the Catalan cupboard yet to be revealed including those of Artur Mas and Pujol family! And maybe the Mossos should be disbanded?

Who pays mortgage expenses – lender or borrower? The jury is still out!

Spain is divided between Provincial Courts (*Audiencias Provinciales*) who rule that lenders should reimburse borrowers for 100% of mortgage setup costs, and those that do not think banks should return the AJD tax (Actos Juridicos), which represents the lion's share of setup costs. While waiting for the Spanish Supreme Court to clarify the issue, we will review the current case law.

The clause that appears in mortgage loan deeds commonly described as "expenses borne by the borrower" (*gastos a cargo del prestatario*), is generating much expectation in recent weeks.

It is estimated that consumers spend an average of \notin 3,500 on mortgage setup costs, between taxes, registration and notary. It is an important sum, both for lenders and borrowers, so the jurisprudential evolution in this regard causes so much expectation.

If the court considers that the clause expenses charged to the consumer is abusive due to the fact of being generalized contracts in which the consumer does not have negotiating capacity, the bank will have to take care of all the expenses of constitution of the mortgage: notary, registration and tax.

If the court considers that these expenses benefit both parties equally and both the bank and the consumer are interested in formalizing the deed, the bank will be responsible for half of the expenses.

If the court considers that the interest of the consumer is only the loan itself, as a contract, and it is the banking entity that has the greatest interest in being formalized before a notary and registry, in order to have greater guarantees, then the bank will not be responsible for the AJD tax.

The controversy is greater when referring to the AJD tax (*Actos Jurídicos Documentados*), due to this tax supposes between 70 and 80% of the total of the expenses. The fact that the mortgage expenses are declared null assumes that the bank must return to the borrower the amounts paid in the constitution of the mortgage. According to Intereconomia.com, the Spanish banks risks the payment of 18,300 million euros, almost triple the return estimated by floor clauses.

At the moment, as we see in the map above, 10 provincial courts (*Audiencias Provinciales*) have ruled that it is up to the bank to return the mortgage expenses to consumers, including taxes (AJD), compared to 8 who consider that only the Notary fees and registration are returned, but not the tax. Until the Supreme Court makes a clear decision on this matter, the balance is not tilted on either side: consumer or bank. (Abridged from Del Canto Chambers)

(I would be surprised if the Supreme Court will find for the consumers. The establishment will be anxious to protect the banks and no doubt looking for a seat on the board when they retire!)

The Phoenix Golf Society


We played at New Sierra Golf Course on Sunday 18th February 2018. The course has improved quite a lot and the greens were hard to read - but overall fair.

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British Consulate Meetings Recently in Alicante Province.

(Press release from British Embassy, Madrid) British Consul Sarah-Jane Morris, photo, visited nine

towns in the Alicante province over the past month to update British nationals on the progress of the citizens' rights part of the Brexit negotiations and to answer questions. Mrs Morris also reminded British nationals of the



benefits of registering as a resident in Spain, both with the national police ("residencia") and with their local town hall ("padron").

Attendance across the towns was high, the Consul having reached nearly 2000 people. Representatives of Brexpats in Spain pressure group were also on the panel at the meetings, as were local mayors and councillors. Various topics came up during the question and answer sessions, especially regarding healthcare, pensions and residency rights and obligations. On residency rights, all speakers were united in encouraging British nationals to check they are properly registered in Spain, and to get registered if they haven't already done so.

Consul Sarah-Jane Morris said, 'I would advise anyone who is concerned about Brexit to make sure they always go to the original source for information. Everything that has been discussed and agreed so far can be found on the gov.uk website – it's easy to check and sign up for email alerts. I also picked up that a lot of people are still not clear about their residency status in Spain in terms of renewing their residency and padron. As I said in the meetings, I will follow this up with the relevant local authorities and we will continue to publish up-to-date accurate information on our gov.uk website and Brits in Spain Facebook page.'

The number of British people registered on the padron, the local register held by the town halls which is used to allocate funding from central government, has been in decline over the past few years. Mrs Morris stated that despite the one million homes in Spain owned by British citizens, less than 300,000 are registered on the padron nationally. Town hall representatives welcomed attendees at the meetings to come and check their registration status at their local town hall office.

The Consul finished the meetings by reminding people to check for updates about the Brexit negotiations from the official sources – namely the Gov.uk website (www.gov.uk/world/brexit). Videos and interviews recorded at the recent meetings will soon be posted on the Brits In Spain Facebook page.
