The evening of November 18 and the early hours of the following morning saw some torrential rainfall in the coastal areas. The subsequent flooding was quite serious. Many of the local beaches, particularly La Glea in Campoamor were badly damaged, the nearby roads also being closed to traffic. Over 100 litres of rain per square metre fell in just a few hours in Torrevieja with several vehicles partially submerged. Although this flooding appears to be at least an annual event now, the local authorities seem to lack the ability to either mitigate the damage or introduce measures to improve storm drainage.

Congratulations to Colin Philpot who managed to raise the equivalent of €650 for charity throughout Via Park III. Colin went on a month-long alcohol-free sponsorship drive. Local sales of cider slumped enormously, while Colin drunk enough blackcurrant juice during the period to guarantee signing up to Type 2 Diabetes. €505 has already been donated to the Pink Ladies' Cancer Charity and £135 sent to Macmillan Nurses Cancer Support. Well done, Grizzly!

Spain has claimed a major diplomatic last-minute coup after forcing Theresa May into giving written confirmation of their 'veto' over Gibraltar being covered by post-Brexit trade negotiations.

The Spanish move, which hands Madrid massive negotiating leverage over the future of the British overseas territory, came after days of diplomatic wrangling had threatened to derail the 'seal the deal' Brexit summit in Brussels.

After 48 hours of diplomatic arm-twisting, the British government conceded in writing that no part of the future agreement can apply to Gibraltar without the agreement of the Spanish government! Spain's foreign minister Josep Borrell said the agreement was "highly positive" for Spain and "the most important one since the Utrecht Treaty of 1713" when Gibraltar was ceded to the British Crown.

At an extraordinary summit in Brussels, the bloc's 27 heads of state and government took a decisive and historic step towards sealing the terms of Britain's split from Brussels after 44 years of membership. Unanimous support was given to the terms of a voluminous draft withdrawal treaty, covering citizens' rights, the £39bn divorce bill, and the Irish border issue, along with a 26page political declaration setting out the basis of the future relationship.


But this deal is most unlikely to be passed by the British parliament, adding more uncertainty to that of the previous two years. I think the Lithuanian Prime Minister put it in a nutshell when he said that 'this deal is good for no one!'

Although initially hailed as a 'Frankenstein Government,' the relatively new government of PM Pedro Sanchez, photo, is now being referred to in some media as a 'Zombie' one. As



several previous supporters, including the separatists of Catalonia, have withdrawn their cooperation, Sanchez no longer boasts a majority, with few new changes being introduced, save for a few decrees. Being **unable to pass a new budget** due to lack of support, the socialist government will now have to rely on budget of the previous PP government.

One commentator referred to the administation as *mucho ruido - sin nueces!* (much noise - no nuts!) A general election is possible during 2019, or at the latest 2020.

On December 2, **Andalucia**, the most populous community in Spain, **will hold regional elections**. The region has had a socialist government for the past 37 years. Known as the 'black hole' for funding in Spain, it also has the highest unemployment rates and the longest hospital waiting times. At present two of Spain's largest fraud & corruption trials, the ERE and Training Fund Cases, are underway in the the region, but the collective amnesia of those now in the dock some 20 to 30 plus - is staggering and is rarely mentioned in the media. The Spanish seem very forgiving!

Around 100 lorries from Murcia are believed to have been **stranded by fuel tax protestors** in France. Perishable goods and late deliveries are expected to lead to heavy losses for Murcia transport companies. As the protest has been going on for five days at least, fresh food is bound to be damaged. In all there are 4,800 HGVs in Murcia which are licensed for use in international transport.

Dog therapy is being used at the Santa Lucia Hospital in Cartagena to aid the recovery of children. The scheme is called 'Doctor Guau' ("guau" being the Spanish equivalent of "woof", the sound of a dog barking). The five dogs are highly trained and are helping to improve the physical, social, emotional and cognitive wellbeing of child patients. I would still keep them way from the Koreans though.



It was on November 1, 1988, that the **first migrant body**, a Moroccan, was washed up on the shores of the province of the province of Cádiz. Since November 1, 1988, 6,714 migrants have died or gone missing in the Strait of Gibraltar, according to a report by the migrant support group Andalucía Acoge. Experts of the International Organization for Migration (IOM) estimate that for each person whose death was recorded, there were another two that went unrecorded.

There have been at least 235,568 **illegal immigrants** into Spain via the Med' between 1999 and 2017, to which must be added the 43,467 people who have arrived in Spain during 2018, in 1,636 boats, according to official data updated on October 15.

Aside from the recent disastrous flood on the island, Menorca has also suffered a lengthy power failure of 55 hours and 53 minutes after two high-tension pylons collapsed in the recent heavy winds. Angry tourists, and locals, were also without water or power for three days!

During a state visit to Morocco by Spanish PM Sanchez during November, he invited the country to make a **joint bid for the 2030 FIFA World Cup**. The Moroccans are reported to be interested.

Residencia and the Five Year Period. In the November newsletter, a lawyer writing in El Pais advised that the actual residencia certificate or card, should indicate if the subject has been permanently resident in Spain for more than five years. I checked this out with the Town Hall in Orihuela Costa. They advise that this is unnecessary as this will be acknowledged and noted in their computer records anyway.

However, if one changes say a name or an address on the residencia certificate or card, I am told that the five-year notation will then be included in the certificate or new card.

The **average salary** of a worker in the province of Alicante p.a. is $\in 15,938$. This is $\in 3,234$ below the national average and $\in 1,719$ less than the regional average. Workers in the capital, Madrid, averaged $\in 25,120$ p.a. although it is believed that workers in the Basque Country earned more on average. During 2017, 271,338 workers in Alicante earned less than the $\in 9,907$ which is less than the minimum wage for that year. This is because of sporadic and part time jobs in the tourist and agricultural sectors.

Some 136 years after construction began, Barcelona's Sagrada Familia basilica is finally to get a building permit. Gaudi's unfinished masterpiece is Barcelona's most famous landmark, but according to city officials, it lacked the proper paperwork. Although the basilica argued that it had been granted a licence in 1885, it has now agreed to pay €36m to settle the dispute – money that will be spent on improving public transport and nearby streets. Work on the cathedral slowed after its architect was killed by a tram in 1926, but is now due for completion in 2026.

The Spanish government has announced that it is going to present a reform to the Criminal Code so that sexual abuse cases involving minors have **no statute of limitations**, thus putting pedophilia offences on the same level as terrorist attacks and genocide, which are the only other crimes with no time limit.

A mother of a young boy in Vigo, Galicia, has been sentenced to a year in jail and a fine of €1,500 (payable to the child) for the crime of **habitual abuse**. The father received a similar jail sentence plus 60 days community service. The boy began to be abused since 2013 when he was eight years old. He received frequently blows, kicks, hair and ear pulling from the parents for bad grades, bad 'behaviour,' or any other inappropriate attitude in the opinion of his parents. Continued absence from school was noticed by his teachers in 2017 and after an investigation the boy was removed from his parents in April 2017 and placed in the provisional custody of his grandmother. The boy remains in the custody of his grandmother and as the jail sentence is less than two years, the parents are unlikely to serve jail time.

Someone with a UK pension and living overseas currently about 220,000 people - will still receive their payments, whatever the outcome of the UK's departure from the EU. What is uncertain is exactly how much that pension will be worth as time goes on. At present the UK has a reciprocal deal with the European Economic Area (EU countries plus Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) as well as various other countries that means residents living in these countries see their state pension rise with the cost of living. So, for a UK resident living in one of these countries, their state pension rises by the triple-lock - the highest of earnings, prices or 2.5% - as it does in the UK. The intent on all sides is for this to continue, alongside inflation up-rating for EU residents in the UK. However, if there is no deal, this will require its own mini-deal, or there could be a possibility of the UK having to make an agreement country-by-country as it did before joining the EU. Otherwise, pensions would be paid but the level would be frozen, as it is for some UK pensioners living in countries such as Australia or Canada.

The National Police have arrested in Madrid eleven people of Spanish nationality involved in 254 scams when renting nonexistent holiday apartments in coastal areas of the Mediterranean Sea with which they obtained around one hundred thousand euros. Ten of those arrested have a history of similar acts, some even more than a score, and four are already in prison, reports the Madrid Police Headquarters. The detainees published advertisements on prestigious websites offering apartment rentals in Benidorm (Alicante), Gandía (Valencia), Salou (Tarragona), Oropesa del Mar (Castellón), Benalmádena (Málaga) and La Manga del Mar Menor (Murcia). After making the payment for a reservation and going to the supposed vacation apartment, the families realized that they had been victims of a scam since the property did not exist.

Those arrested had inserted advertisements on free websites offering rentals in coastal areas at a price much lower than the real market price.

The International Olympic Committee says it will encourage international federations not to host competitions in Spain unless Kosovar athletes are allowed there under their own flag. Spain, together with Greece, is the only large European country that does not recognize Kosovo, which proclaimed its independence from Serbia in 2008.



The Local Police in Torrevieja appear to be in dire need

of uniform renewal.

The uniforms and boots should be replaced annually but a renewal contract has not been renewed

Although we have had plenty of reports of 'unhappiness' in the Policia Local in Torrevieja in recent years, the gripes now seem to have spread to the local police in Orihuela. It seems that the pistols they carry are mostly more than 25 weapons will fire even if years old and that some of the the safety is applied! There also other Although six defects. pistols were **1**0 new purchased several months ago, they have been distributed to officers. Also, the officers have performed their not compulsory shooting practice for more than a year as the shooting gallery has been closed since June 2017. It seems the reason for the closure was that the councillor in charge of the police refused to take out liability insurance in the event of possible accidents and injury to officers in the training range and wanted to get the police to sign waivers exempting the council from any responsibilities. The three police unions, yes three! - the UGT, SPPLB and CSIF, want the removal of the relevant councillor, Mariola Rocamora, for her 'inaction and lies'. Also, the ammunition - 4,000 cartridges, which should be changed every year has not been done for two years. The last time the police practised their shooting skills was during early 2017; they

The Directorate General of Traffic (DGT) plans to **reduce** the speed limit on many secondary roads in the province from 100 to 90 kph. Around 2,090 of roads are likely to be affected. The goal is to reduce the steadily increasing accident rate on these roads which recorded 947 traffic accidents in which there were 27 fatalities, 91 serious injuries and 1,330 minor ones during 2016. The DGT plans to introduce the changes by Royal Decree in January 2019. From then vans, buses and trucks will have a speed limit of 80 kph on these roads.

had to use leftover cartridges from previous years.

An audit commissioned by the Ministry of Health has revealed that the privately managed **Torrevieja University Hospital**, run by Ribera Salud, is 30% more efficient than the remainder of the publicly run hospitals in the province. This represents a savings to the taxpayer of \in 45 million p.a.

The AP-7 is expected to be **toll free** from January 2020, and that is a definite MAYBE! This depends on a number of local and regional bureaucrats getting their act together.

The Flomar cooperative in Pilar de la Horadada has become the national epicenter of the flower trade in Spain. The cooperative, with thirty members, sells approx. **20 million flowers annually**. Although their exports abroad to the UK and Italy are important, fiesta periods such as All Saints and Christmas, particularly in Madrid, Galicia, Catalonia and Andalusia, generates massive demand for the crop. All Saints (Todos Santos) alone accounts for 20% of its annual sales.

The **beach bars** in Punta Prima, Cala Estaca and Cala Capitán will be closed for the winter. However, the beach bars in Cala Cerrada, Cala Bosque, La Caleta and La Glea will remain open.



Spain & Gibraltar.

Spain and the UK have reached a bilateral preliminary agreement on Gibraltar. Both governments have closed the deal that will guide relations between Spain and The Rock once the UK withdraws from the European Union in the process commonly known as "Brexit."

The preliminary agreement, which is part of the Gibraltar Protocol in the draft Brexit deal, comprises four memorandums of understanding (MoUs) and one tax treaty, according to Gibraltar Chief Minister Fabian Picardo.

This negotiation has been conducted on the sidelines of the general Brexit agreement, to which Spain is still voicing strong objections. Spanish Prime Minister Pedro Sánchez on Wednesday, November 21st, admitted to this preliminary deal, but said that he would still veto the general Brexit agreement if Spain's conditions regarding future relations with Gibraltar are not met. Sánchez spoke on the telephone with British PM Theresa May to tell her that Spain will vote no to the draft Withdrawal Agreement on Sunday, November 25th, unless the document makes it clear that the way in which the future relationship between the UK and EU applies to Gibraltar must be negotiated solely between Madrid and London, said sources in the Spanish government. "If the problem is not resolved, Spain will have to vote no to the Brexit agreement because if affects the essence of our country, of our nation," said Sánchez. Environmental issues, cross border security, tobacco products and around 10,000 Spanish cross border workers are also key to the final agreement. (Abridged from El Pais)

Spain to top longevity chart

Japan has long enjoyed the longest life expectancy of any country, but it may soon lose its crown to Spain (currently ranked fifth). A new report by the Global Burden of Disease study predicts that by 2040, life expectancy in Spain will have risen from 82.9 to 85.8; during the same period, Japan's is expected to rise only from 83.7 to 85.7. The forecast is partly based on extrapolating from recent trends, but also factors in "drivers" of health, such as smoking, diet, sanitation and income. According to Dr Christopher Murray, the director of the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation in Seattle, Spain does "really well" on most of these – though it "could do better" when it comes to smoking. The UK is predicted to rise from 26th to 23rd place (with life expectancy increasing from 80.8 to 83.3) and the US to fall 20 places, from 43rd to 64th.

You don't need to have carers to help you but the money can help pay towards this.

The benefit is not means tested and does not affect your state pension or other income.

The Controversial Mortgage Tax and an Indecisive Supreme Court.

The Spanish judicial system at its highest level - the Supreme Court - got itself into an unholy mess this autumn. The *Impuesto sobre Actos Jurídicos Documentados* (AJD) is a stamp tax paid in Spain by the homebuyer at the time of purchase, when a notary officially documents both the sale and the bank mortgage.

Around mid-October, the Supreme Court decided on appeal that the said tax should be paid by the banks not the client as was the previous practice. As a result of this decision bank shares on the market tumbled as, if the eight million mortgage holders in Spain were to demand the fee back, the litigation could cost the banks €24 billion on the basis of an average AJD fee of €3,000 per loan.

Less than two days after the Supreme Court's decision, the court agreed to reconsider the decision because of its "enormous economic and social repercussions." Then on November 6, the Supreme Court did another U-turn stating that it is the clients who must pay for a controversial mortgage tax, and not the banks! 15 justices were in favour of making the client pay the levy, while just 13 voted

to confirm a groundbreaking decision reached by this same court in mid-October that it should be the banks who pick up the tab. But three weeks of legal chaos and mind changing did little for the public image of the most senior court in the land. The decision drew widespread criticism from politicians, unions, consumer groups and citizens alike.

There were demonstrations and an understandably angry public as the consumer once again was to be shafted by the banks, who were rescued with public money just a few years ago.

The Spanish PM, Pedro Sánchez, then jumped into the ring saying the 'no Spaniard will have to pay the tax again' and introduced new legislation stipulating that the banks would pay the charge 'from now on.' This meant that no claims for the tax paid previously by the public would be entertained. So no refunds!

As the tax has not actually been cancelled, many believe that the banks will just increase the mortgage interest rates to compensate for the tax which must still be paid to the government. So maybe a Pyrrhic victory.



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
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




At the Pearlies.

Vitamin D Advice May Be Flawed


As vitamin D is generated in the body by exposure to the Sun, people in northern climates are often deficient in the hormone, which promotes calcium absorption and bone growth.

To make up for this, adults are advised to take supplements in the winter to keep their bones dense and strong, and prevent osteoporosis. But according to a new study, the supplements do not, in fact, significantly boost bone health in adults.

The Lancet-published research, which involved analysing data from 81 randomised control trials, found no evidence that the supplements improve bone density, or prevent fractures or falls injuries beyond a clinically meaningful threshold. Its authors suggest that the current guidelines should be changed, so that vitamin D supplements are recommended only to adults at a high risk of rickets and a rare condition called osteomalacia, and to children.

New Rules for Ryanair Hand Baggage

Passengers who buy Priority Boarding with their tickets, at a cost of €6, will be able to take a 55cm x 40cm x 20cm item onto the plane along with a small item of baggage measuring 40cm x 25cm x 20cm. Those who don't will have to pay €8 per larger item, and drop it off at the Ryanair check-in desks before going through security. The item will be stored in the hold and will have to be collected from the baggage carousels on arrival at the destination airport.

Until now, passengers without Priority Boarding had to leave their suitcase at the gate, where it was taken down into the hold for free, and also had to be collected from the baggage belts on arrival. After this change, these passengers will have to pay and check in their cases.

This payment will have to be done during the online booking process. But if a passenger opts to add a case later on – this is permitted up to 40 minutes before the flight time - the cost will go up to €10. If you arrive at the gate with a case and have not checked it previously, and you don't have Priority Boarding, you will have to pay €25 and your case will be taken down to the hold.

There will only be 95 Priority Boarding passengers on each flight. That means that half of the passengers will not be able to buy these tickets and will have to pay a minimum €8 instead of €6. More palaver from Ryanair!

Legalising pot: Canada takes the plunge

Legal pot: "a wrecking ball to a delicate social order" One of the key reasons for making pot smoking illegal, said J.J. McCullough on MSN.com, is that it serves "to reinforce a message every civilisation benefits from hearing: drugs are bad and should not be consumed". Even if, as in Canada, the law was never strongly enforced, the low-level sense of guilt and anxiety around the drug ensures the message gets through. But last month Canada's liberal PM, Justin Trudeau, "took a wrecking ball to this delicate social order" by pushing though a new law that makes use of marijuana legal for over-18s. Canada is only the second nation – Uruguay did it in 2013 - to do this. Nearly five million Canadians currently smoke dope, said The Independent, and they were so excited to mark the end of prohibition, the country's stocks of recreational marijuana were reportedly running dry.

If only British politicians would follow Trudeau's lead, said Simon Jenkins in The Guardian. What he has realised is that drug laws are the most "pointless and socially harmful foible" of modern government. They don't affect the level of consumption: even with the laws in place, anyone who wants to score can do so. What legalisation - and its accompanying regulation - does is alter the dynamics of how they get the drug, and from whom. Canada can now steer users away from high-strength skunk – which police claim accounts for 95% of British consumption - to safer varieties, while freezing out criminals and enjoying additional revenue from sales tax.

Colorado, one of nine US states to allow recreational weed, has collected nearly \$1bn in tax since 2014. The US government collected an estimated \$4.7 billion in taxes from legal cannabis companies last year on nearly \$13 billion in revenue. Unlike most American businesses, which pay tax electronically or by check, most of these marijuana-product firms were forced to pay their federal taxes in cash. This is expensive!

It's also another step towards a hugely profitable industry, said The Economist, and one not confined to smokable pot: one company in LA is already marketing cannabis-infused sauvignon. "Financial markets are giddy at the prospect." Constellation Brands, the maker of Corona beer, has invested \$4bn in one Canadian producer; Coca-Cola and tobacco giant Altria are also looking for openings. Legalisation at the federal level in the US would create a market worth \$55bn and there is no shortage of bills in Congress to hurry that forward.

Let's not get too complacent, said Diane Kelsall in the Canadian Medical Association Journal: this is "a national, uncontrolled experiment in which the profits of cannabis producers and tax revenues are squarely pitched against the health of Canadians". Sales of the drug are likely to cause health problems in one in three adult users, with one in ten becoming addicted. Worse still, said Robert Schwartz in The Washington Post, is the real danger that by making pot legit, the act of smoking will become renormalised, "setting back years of tobacco-related gains".

The Spanish Health Ministry has issued a warning regarding the misuse of metamizole, a painkiller whose most popular brand name in Spain is Nolotil.

Following reports of British citizens who died after being prescribed the medication in Spain, the country's health authorities are reminding users about the risk of a dangerous and unpredictable side effect known as <u>agranulocytosis</u>, which drastically lowers the patient's white cell count and can even lead to death.

On October 30, the Spanish Medication and Health Products Agency (AEMPS) issued a reminder that metamizole can only be purchased with a doctor's prescription, even though many Spanish pharmacies continue to sell it over the counter.

During early November, British news outlets reported that ten UK citizens had died after taking metamizole in Spain. It is one of the most commonly prescribed anti-inflammatory medications in Spain and Latin America, although it is banned in several European countries, including Sweden, the UK and Ireland.

While there are no conclusive studies to prove it, many health specialists suspect that people from northern Europe may be more sensitive to metamizole than Spaniards.

Dead Pimp Wins Election!


"Thirdly my lord, my client can produce a receipt for the super deluxe inflatable milk maid, whatever that is."

Jail for Fake Claims!

A British family have just been convicted for filing a fake food poisoning claim for their holiday in southern Spain.

Four members of the same family were sentenced to three months in prison by Liverpool High Court.

They were also fined €842 each for 'concocting a fake claim for gastric illness to win compensation' and will have to pay the travel operator's legal costs.

The family had claimed they fell ill from food poisoning while staying at Benidorm's all-inclusive Aqua Magic Rock Gardens in July 2015.

The claim was filed against the travel operator Jet2 Holidays, from whom they demanded around €50,000 in damages.

"For some time we have warned that making false claims could lead to serious consequences, and this ruling shows how serious they can be," said Steve Heapy, CEO of Jet2.com and Jet2holidays in a statement.

Michael Jameson, Claire Weir, Janet Weir and Jane Weir alleged that the hotel food had given them nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea and stomach cramps.

But all four boasted they were having 'the best holiday ever' and 'enjoying every minute' on social media.

Hotel records also showed them enjoying alcoholic beverages, including beer, gin and vodka, even as they were supposed to be suffering from gastric illnesses.

"We always held that it was a false claim because our food meets all safety standards," said Pilar Lafuente, an official with the hotel chain Magic Costa Blanca, which operates the Benidorm hotel.

Lafuente said that the family was only thinking about 'the possibility of getting a free vacation and some extra money, a technique that the British courts are already acting against.'

Although the four defendants blamed the advice of their previous solicitors — an accusation disputed by the firms involved — they pleaded guilty to contempt before High Court judge Justice Choudhury — who branded the evidence against them as "little short of overwhelming".

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
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
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Second Opinion?

Spain Wants to Ban Sale of Petrol and Diesel Cars from 2040

Socialist Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez's government on Tuesday included the proposal in a draft document for an energy transition law which also calls for Spain to completely decarbonise its economy by 2050.

The announcement comes a year after Britain and France both pledged to ban new diesel and petrol cars by 2040, while Norway is aiming to end the use of all cars running on fossil fuels by 2025.

Sanchez's government lacks a majority in parliament and it will need to gain the support of other parties to approve the law.

The plan calls for setting up charging points for electric vehicles while cities with over 50,000 inhabitants will have to set up "low emission zones" before 2021, like those that already exist in the centre of Madrid and Barcelona where traffic is restricted.

"By 2050, the electricity system will have to rely exclusively on renewable energy sources," the document said.

Under the plan new licences for hydrocarbon exploration and fracking will be banned and subsidies that "favour the consumption of fossil fuels" will end.

Sanchez warned Sunday that climate change was "the biggest challenge we face globally", adding it was necessary to "act with urgency and determination" before this "great silence war".

Now I am not sure just how much of this is just wishful thinking. There are eleven car manufacturers in Spain. It would be interesting to hear what their opinions on the matter are and how likely they will all be able to develop practical prototypes of electric cars.

Other Driving News!

Spanish police are hot on the trail of a couple caught on film having sex while driving on a motorway say the Guardia Civil. They tweeted a video that first appeared on social media showing a couple in the driving seat, one driving and the other undressed and squeezed between the driver and the steering wheel. 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
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Brit's Losing Local Voting Rights?

In recent weeks, many British expats have been receiving a postal questionaire from the Oficina del Centro Electoral in Alicante. The various sections are helpfully translated into English.

The information on the form will include some of your personal details such as date of birth, address and nationality.

If you wish to partake in the municipal and European elections on May 26, 2019, you are required to tick the appropriate boxes, sign the bottom part and return it to the institute using the already franked and addressed form. It registered as permanent residents in the Valencian can also be done online.

HOWEVER, you will notice that in the form explanation, it carries the following information -

This communication is sent as a precaution and will cease to have effect if the separation of the United Kingdom from the European Union is completed on March 30, 2019.

Basically this implies that after Brexit, British expats will no longer be able to vote in the Spanish municipal or European elections. Although not many expats exercised their voting rights in the past in Spain, after Brexit they will be unable to vote locally while the comfortable under-performing local politicians will take even less notice of the needs and wishes of the significant British resident population, the single major contributor to the local economies, annually.
