Expat's could vote, if registered, in the municipal and European elections. It's no secret that in Orihuela Costa we have been starved of amenities with most of the investment going to the city and outlying villages. Some villages have sport and leisure facilities - ours is closed! Mini demonstrations outside the Ayuntamiento on the Costa are just a waste of time. Vox, the newly participating far-right party, made it's debut and gained three seats.

It is interesting that neither the PP nor the PSOE had any expat's on their election list. Ciudadanos had some, but all placed in unelectable positions - s sop! This has got to stop!


To rule the municipality again, the PP will have to form another alliance with Ciudadanos. Let's hope that C's can finally extract some decent investment for the coastal residents. If not, well, vote for somebody else!

Torrevieja Municipality: Some real surprises here! 25 council seats were available. After being kicked out by a leftwing alliance in the previous local election, the PP made a massive comeback this time gaining 14 of the 25 seats available (up three seats). The PSOE secured 5 seats (up 1), Compromis, a new entry with 3 seats, SUEÑA one seat (down 1), Ciudadanos 1 seat (down 1), and new entrant Vox with 1 seat. Now the PP have an absolute majority, they will be able to, good or bad, rule unhindered for the next four years.

This was the thirteenth general election since Franco took the fast-train to Hell. 36,893,976 voters -34,799,999 residents in Spain participated and 2,093,977 abroad. 1,257,196 young people also participated for the first time, or at least were entitled to.

Also, for the first time, 100,000 people with intellectual disability, mental illness or cognitive impairment were also able to vote, thanks to a reform, in October 2018, of the Organic Law on the General Electoral System.

There's been a **huge turnout** for the election, 75.8%, with nearly three in four eligible adults voting.

Now on to the results where it had been widely and correctly predicted that no one party would get an overall majority. There were however some significant changes. The **PSOE** (Socialists) were the most voted-for party obtained 7,480,755 votes, 28.68% of total votes, which gives 123 seats. This was a major increase from the 2016 election when they only had 85 deputies.

The **PP** (right of centre) remains the second political force in Congress, but nobody denies that they suffered an electoral debacle. They dropped from 137 deputies in 2016 to just 66 deputies now; 7,941,236 votes to 4,356,023!

Ciudadanos (Citizens - centre/liberal) was another of the big winners on the night, gaining an additional 32 deputies making a total of 57 deputies.

Unidas Podemos (United We Can - so far left they're looney!) were the other big losers dropping from 71 seats to 42.

The far-right **Vox** party achieves its goal of entering Congress for the first time with 24 deputies - 2,677,173 votes, 10% of the total vote. (Vox have a traditionalist, anti-immigrant and anti-regional agenda.)

The Basque, Catalan separatists and a number of other smaller parties took the remainder of the seats. Four of the Catalan separatists, who are currently in preventative custody due to the illegal referendum, won seats.

Around 66 parties stood at the General Election, the greater majority of them not obtaining any seats. The two bottom performers deserve a mention - **Death to the System** getting 46 votes and **Union of Everyone** with 28.

As we have seen, the Spanish Socialists won the most seats in the General Election by a wide margin, but not enough to govern on their own. An overall majority can only be secured with 176 seats or more in Congress (Parliament). To get a working majority they will either have to turn to the hard-left (Podemos) plus Catalan / Basque nationalists, or, to a liberal party more to the right of them. The decision is likely to have an impact on the economy, housing policy, and the prospects of Spanish real estate market in the years to come.

So far the Socialists have been playing it cool, saying they plan to go it alone as a minority Government, whilst Podemos, whose leaders are desperate to get their hands on power, say the only option they will consider is a coalition Government with them in it. Citizens, who want to displace the PP as the main opposition, have unfortunately ruled out any collaboration with the Socialists, despite pressure from the EU, banks, and business leaders who like the idea of a moderate coalition between Citizens and the Socialists.

Rather than providing clarity, the election delivered the same uncertain and insecure outlook that existed before.

Who knows, maybe there will be yet another General Election in a year's time!

Donkeys Are Dying Because China Wants Their Hides For A Traditional Remedy.

China reportedly needs 4 million donkey hides a year for the traditional medicine "ejiao". Ejiao or donkey hide glue, is a gelatinous substance, made from boiling the hides of donkeys, which is used in traditional Chinese medicines and beauty products. You can purchase it on Amazon. The donkey skins used in the product were previously largely sourced from Chinese farms. But with China's donkey population dropping from 11 million in 1990 to 5.4 million in 2016, manufacturers are now targeting donkeys from Africa to meet demand. They're importing hides from poor countries -- and dealing a blow to people whose livelihood depends on the animals. Donkeys that are sold for their skins are often treated terribly throughout the transport and slaughter process loaded roughly onto cramped, dangerous vehicles, starved, and killed brutally.

The Cold Drop!

Those of us who experienced the Gota Fria (**Cold Drop**) during April and the torrential deluge, would have been impressed (and probably soaked!). Less impressive however, was the fact that little of this rainwater was collected in the province of Alicante. The lack of an efficient infrastructure for regulation and subsequent distribution of rainwater in the province meant that 60 billion litres of rainwater ended up in the sea - 50 billion from the Vega Baja and 10 billion from the Marina Alta. What a waste!

Rising Costs!

Household electricity builds rose by **almost 20%** during the last six months of 2018.

According to official figures the price of petrol has risen by 15% since the beginning of the year. Diesel is up by 11%. This is still 10% lower than the maximums achieved in September 2012. Fuel is still cheaper in Spain than the average for the whole of the EU.

Tourism up in First Quarter.

Between January and April this year, hotels in the Costa Blanca enjoyed 7.7 million overnight stays, the community welcoming more than 2.5 million visitors. The hotel occupancy is growing by around 3% for this period annually. The increase this year was very welcome, making up, in many cases, for a disastrous Easter trading period.

Recent high southerly winds and strong sea currents are blamed for washing carpets of them on shore at beaches along Spain's eastern Mediterranean coast.

Good to hear that Orihuela Costa has secured its **11 Blue Flags** for the beaches for another year. There were some doubts that a couple may have been dropped due to the cock-ups with the *chiringuitos* last year, but it does not seem to have been an issue with the judges.



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Growth in Foreign Buyers Easing?

Foreign buyers acquired 50,249 homes in Spain in the last six months of 2018, up 1.4% compared to the same period a year before, reveals a report just published by Spain's General Council of Notaries, a trade body. Notaries witness the vast majority of property sales that take place in Spain, and according to their figures, foreign buyers made up 18.2% of the market, down from a high of 20.3% in the second half of 2015.

Although the number of sales involving a foreign buyer increased in the period, the notaries point out that, "in comparison to the previous year, the increases registered in the two halves of 2018 were a long way from the results of 2017, when growth was above 10%." Foreign demand looks like it might be running out of momentum.

The British are still by far the biggest group of foreign buyers and their numbers just keep growing having recovered after the initial shock of the Brexit referendum.

Immigrant Labour and Spanish Farming

Many do not, or even want to, remember the misery that was in Spain during the Franco regime. In the 50's and 60's, thousands of Spaniards went to work harvesting in France under very difficult conditions. Labour emigration to France, Switzerland, Germany, Holland and Belgium was the one that, with its cash transfers, maintained for many years the influx of foreign currency into Spain, far in excess of exports and tourism.

Now of course it is a different story. Compared to the Franco regime, Spain is now much more advanced socially and economically - and many more ways as well.

A story way back in April caught my attention. Here a reporter was having a look at immigrant labour in strawberry fields and others in Andalucia. In this case the reporter, Olga, interviewed 45-year-old Cristóbal, owner of 40 hectares of red fruits and avocados in Lucena del Puerto, a municipality of Huelva. Lucena del Puerto has a normal population of just around 3,000, which can treble during peak picking season. Every day, 20 immigrant women from Morocco pick strawberries under his giant plastic domes. When asked why Cristóbal did not employ Spanish pickers he said that the Spanish don't want to work picking and would rather claim benefits. Also, the Spaniards, he said, kept eating the strawberries!

This year the Government authorised the recruitment of 19,179 workers from Morocco. 11,500 of them worked in Spain in previous years while the remainder are selected from different Moroccan cities. They are all women who have children in Morocco, so they won't be tempted to stay in Spain. Even so, around 20% of these immigrant workers are expected to remain in Spain fraudulently.

Zahra, a 35-year-old Moroccan woman, has worked for Cristóbal since 2011. He pays for the trip and accommodation and pays her 42 euros gross per day for 39 hours per week of work. "It's more than what is paid in Morocco for the same task," Zahra says. "With what I earn here in three months, I support my husband and my three children the rest of the year." (The word "gross" here worries me!)

Last year, several seasonal workers in Huelva reported sexual abuse, unpaid salaries and deficiencies in working conditions and accommodation. The complaints were filed but there is a second case opened. The Junta de Andalucía and the strawberry sector have developed an action protocol in response and have also deployed a team of 15 "integration consultants" who visit the farms every week to make sure everything is in order.

Immigration rates only 11th in the Spaniards list of concerns according to a recent poll. 8.9% of respondents listed it as among their main headaches. This is up from 2.6% in the previous year.

"There is an anti-immigration discourse in several countries that is becoming contagious and normalizing. Now it is not politically incorrect to say certain things. There are more people who put immigrants as scapegoats. Something that had not emerged in Spain during the economic crisis has occurred when we started to leave it," responds Markus González Beilfuss, professor of Constitutional Law at the University of Barcelona.

You could get: £57.30 or £85.60 a week if you need help both in the day and at night.

Completing the lengthy form, you need to show that you need help at home or someone to keep an eye on you. This can include help such as getting out of bed, help to wash and dressed.

You don't need to have carers to help you but the money can help pay towards this.

The benefit is not means tested and does not affect your state pension or other income.



After Men in Spain Got Paternity Leave, They Wanted Fewer Kids

In March 2007, Spain introduced a national policy granting most new fathers two weeks of fully paid paternity leave. The policy proved exceptionally popular, with 55% of men eligible in the first year opting to take the paid time. The amount of leave covered by the program was doubled in 2017 and expanded to five weeks in 2018, with additional increases expected between now and 2021.

Economists studying the effects of the original 2007 policy examined what happened to families that had children just before and just after the program began, and found differences in the outcomes. While the early cohort of men who were eligible for paternity leave were just as likely to stay in the workforce as the men who weren't eligible, they remained more engaged with childcare after their return to work, and their partners were more likely to stay in the workforce as well. In that sense, the program seems to have done what policy makers would have hoped.

Unexpectedly, though, the researchers also found that families who were eligible for the paternity leave were less likely to have kids in the future. In a study published in the Journal of Public Economics (paywall), economists Lídia Farré of the University of Barcelona and Libertad González of University of Pompeu Fabra estimate that two years on, parents who had been eligible for the newly introduced program were 7% to 15% less likely to have another kid than parents who just missed the eligibility cutoff. While the difference dissipated further into the future, even after six years, parents who had been eligible for the leave were still less likely to have a child again.

The researchers suggest an intriguing reason why. After paternity leave was instituted, surveys of Spanish men ages 21 to 40 showed they desired fewer children than before. Farré and González think that spending more time with their children—or the prospect of having to do so—may have made men more acutely aware of the effort and costs associated with child rearing, and, as the researchers put it, "shifted their preferences from child

quantity to quality." At the same time, women started showing preferences for slightly larger families—perhaps a sign that having more children seemed more desirable with a slightly more

equitable balance of labour at home. As the authors point out, it's impossible to draw sweeping conclusions from this observation of a single data point in a single country. Correlation isn't causation, and it's possible that other factors weighed more heavily than paternity leave on men's family preferences. (The global financial crisis, for example, hit Spain in full force about a year after the leave policy was introduced.)

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

To say that prostitution is big business in Spain would be a gross understatement. The country has become known as the brothel of Europe, after a 2011 United Nations report cited Spain as the third biggest capital of prostitution in the world, behind Thailand and Puerto Rico. Prostitution has boomed since it was decriminalised here in 1995. Recent estimates put revenue from Spain's domestic sex trade at \$26.5bn a year, with hundreds of licensed brothels and an estimated workforce of 300,000. However, it is a largely unregulated market which has become infested with criminality, turning Spain into a global hub for human trafficking and sexual slavery.

Prostitution becomes sex trafficking when one person moves, detains or transports someone else for the purpose of profiting from their prostitution using fraud, force or coercion. In the UK, thousands of women are thought to be trapped in sexual servitude, but the scale of the problem in Spain is staggering. Until 2010, the law didn't even recognise human trafficking as a crime. Now the Spanish government estimates that up to 90% of women working in prostitution could be victims of trafficking or under the control of a third party – such as a pimp – who is profiting from them. Between 2012-2016, security forces in Spain rescued 5,695 people from slavery but acknowledge that thousands more remain under the control of criminals.

Since it passed its first anti-trafficking laws in 2010, the government has been scrambling to get on top of this crisis, spending millions of euros on an emergency plan to target the individuals and gangs operating with impunity. In 2015, it went further and created formal alliances between security forces, prosecutors, judges and NGOs, to rescue victims and prosecute the perpetrators.

José Nieto, Spain's leading anti-trafficking law enforcement officer, explained why Spain is such a magnet for sextrafficking networks. "First, we are fighting a crime that is socially acceptable, because prostitution is accepted and embraced by many people here." Second there is geography: "We are at the centre of all major migratory routes. The main victims we are seeing trafficked and forced into prostitution are Romanian, West African and South American. You can cross from Romania to Spain with an ID card. Africa is just 15km from us. We have a historic and a linguistic connection to South America."



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

The Spanish Job!

When I first came across this story, the movie The Italian Job, starring Michael Caine, Bennie Hill, Noel Coward and of course the Mini, came to mind.

On May 9, very early in the morning, a green camper van with three people inside overturned and careered towards a sheer drop in the mountain pass of Puerto de la Mora, 40 kilometres northeast of Granada, photo. The Guardia Civil arrived at the accident scene at around 5am.

None of the three were badly hurt but a Lithuanian man and woman on the road were sent on to hospital to be checked out. But when the police reached the van which was close to the edge of a fatal drop, they found a third Lithuanian man inside, who was under the effects of booze and drugs and was desperately searching the van. (Maybe he was driving?) The man, who was slightly injured, was also sent to the nearest hospital while the van was taken to the police headquarters in Granada.

While searching the van, the police found a suitcase with $\notin 18,000$ in cash inside. They then found a large stash of banknotes hidden under one of the seats which they believe amounted to between $\notin 400,000$ and four million euros.

"We are trying to find a bank that is willing to take it and help us count it, but it is proving impossible because there is so much of it," says a spokesman for the Civil Guard in Granada, explaining that the difficulty stems from security

problems and the standard protocols for checking and depositing

large amounts of money.



The three Lithuanians, none of whom have a criminal record, have denied that the money belongs to them. Unless the investigation turns up further evidence, they will simply be fined for money laundering, and have not been arrested. (My guess is that they will probably scarper now.)

The maximum amount of cash that can be transported legally in Spain is $\notin 100,000$. A higher sum requires a certificate from the tax agency or customs. Carrying cash across the border into another country reduces that figure to $\notin 10,000$. These legal limits were established to avoid money laundering and other serious crimes such as financing terrorism, according to the Civil Guard.

There are boxes for medical conditions, contact information in the event of an accident, allergies, medication and much more – even details of any pets that may be at home alone! President of the charity, Michele Masson, told us "getting this new card off the ground has taken a significant amount of organizing plus of course gaining sponsorship which we were fortunate to receive from Arocasequier, Torrevieja. The card is aimed to provide, for example, emergency services details should the holder be taken to A & E and unable to communicate. We have gained permission to have the cards available at GP surgeries in the area, chemists, town halls and many other outlets have already started to take them in to offer to clients. Certain areas of the police are now aware of the leaflets including the N332 group who have also kindly agreed to circulate them in their talks around the area. We also aim to speak shortly with the ambulance service, again to raise awareness. This way we can ensure that we have the best chance of people knowing about the card should someone be involved in an accident or perhaps simply found wandering the streets".

100,000 of the leaflets have been printed and Michele advised that these are available from the charity's San Miguel Centre if anyone would like to go along to collect one, or if they would like to take a supply to distribute to perhaps a group that they are involved with.

Michele ended by saying "it is one thing to have the leaflets distributed but the most important thing is for people to ensure they fill them in! They will only help you if you fill in the details and carry it with you at all times. We will shortly have a copy of the leaflet on our website that people can print off plus details of some of the outlets that have them in stock. STRIKE A LIGHT!

I have to admit that when I first saw this photo taken from the International Space Station, I was quite impressed. Here we see the Iberian Peninsula, a little bit of the south of France and part of North Africa, all lit up like a Christmas tree. Madrid stands out like a beacon, almost in the centre, and the Portuguese coast appears to be a carpet of light. But that's the problem - light pollution!

Now this photo was taken in 2012, but, as the Visible Infrared Imaging Radiometer Suite (VIIRS) – a detector installed in international satellites which measures light contamination – is unable to detect blue light which means it cannot read contaminating emissions from LED light bulbs, which have become very popular in Spain over the last five years. This means that the current light pollution is far worse than appears in the photo. So, does light pollute? Of course.

The light pollution here has got so bad that it is not only affecting our view of the stars, it is also having a major impact on the environment – excessive light directly affects our health, and the flora and fauna around us, particularly pollinating insects and bird species whose habits have been disturbed by the artificial nighttime light. "We're not the only astronomers in the animal kingdom," says Sánchez, co-author of the study Ranking of the Light Pollution of Spain, which has recently been published by the European Scientific



repository Zenodo. "This is now a major environmental problem."

A study of 2,000 Spanish districts, taking into account different aspects, such as the number of street lamps per square kilometer and output per person. According to the research, Madrid emits the most light into the sky and is the worst culprit due to its sheer size. However, size appears to be irrelevant when it comes to the runners-up: Zaragoza, Seville, Barcelona, Valencia, Murcia, Málaga, Cartagena, Vitoria and Córdoba.

LED lighting has long been believed to be more efficient, but this has been contradicted by the financial and environmental cost as most of the light bulbs have a colour temperature that wavers between white and blue and usually exceed 4,000 Kelvin degrees, meaning the pollution is worse. If LED lighting is used, the bulbs should have a colour temperature less than 3,000 degrees Kelvin, while scientists recommend an even lower figure of 2,200. The shift to LED has cost Spanish towns \in 600 per street lamp. Many believe that it would make far more sense to use sodium bulbs which cost just \in 12 each, are equally efficient and do not contaminate if they are fixed in such a way that the light shines downwards. However, this option is far less profitable for the suppliers! It is estimated that more than \in 1.6 billion of public money is spent every year on street lighting in Spain.


But something else you don't usually find in Doncaster -

Rewarding Failure in Andalucia.

You may recall that the socialist regional government were kicked out in Andalucia after a less than inspiring 40 years at the helm of the region. I have always referred to them as the 'Guicchi' socialists and despite the emergence of two massive frauds in the regional government - the ERE Retirement and Training Fund frauds - the large slab of left-wing politicians there always arranged to reward them selves handsomely.

But the respected Spanish daily, El Mundo, came up with an interesting titbit due to the Transparency Law. It has only just emerged that after several of the socialists lost their government jobs in the December regional election, most are now going to be handsomely compensated!

71 former senior officials of the socialist Susana Diaz's (photo) administration who lost their job after the election have the right to continue collecting the full salary that they received in previous senior positions for a maximum period of up to two years! The layoff compensation scheme was implemented in Andalusia in 2005, within a legislative package called "democratic impulse." The thinking behind the award is that having held a relevant position in the Administration or having been a deputy may make it difficult for them to reintegrate into the labour market due to incompatibility and problems finding a job.

The poor dears! Since then, all senior officials with the rank of general director or higher, as well as 109 Andalusian parliamentarians, are shielded on their exit from their official office or their seat thanks to these

controversial compensations. Now the least a deputy can earn is \notin 4,400 a month, while the maximum is \notin 5,800. The regional Minister of Education, Adelaida de la



Calle, was only a counsellor for two years - from June 2015 to June 2017 - she has the right to collect severance for another two years. That amounts to $\in 123,424.08!$ If however you do get a government job in say parliament or the senate, which entails a salary, the compensation payments cease.

Some former senior officials have renounced the compensation, two I believe so far.



The Towns in Spain Where Brits Outnumber Locals

In 2018 Spain estimated there were 300,000 Brits officially registered as residents in the country, although the numbers have dropped by almost 50,000 in 2019. According to Spain's national stats agency INE, the two autonomous regions with the most Brits are Andalusia, where they number almost 77,000, and the Valencia region, where there are 78,422. Trailing behind are the Canaries (25,500 British residents), Catalonia (20,350) and the Balearics (14,870).

To narrow it down even further, the three provinces with the most resident Britons are Alicante with 69,289, Málaga with around 47,000 and Almería with roughly 15,000. By contrast, in Spain's capital Madrid there are only 10,000 British residents.

But the real surprise is that there are a couple of dozen towns and villages where Brits, often retirees, outnumber the locals. SOCKS AND SANDALS

Here are the eight most British municipalities in Spain:

Poble Nou de Benitachell (Alicante) - A coastal town with a British international school, the town's population is 60% foreign, half of whom are British.

Benahavís (Málaga) - This inland municipality between Marbella and Estepona is 64 % foreign, 40% of whom hail from the British Isles.

San Fulgencio (Alicante) - British retirees make up roughly a third of this town's 8,000-strong population.

Daya Vieja (Alicante) - Just a kilometre from San Fulgencio lies this quaint village where sixty percent of its 430 foreigners are Brits.

Lliber (Alicante) - 729 of its 1,051 residents, 70% of which are British and 18% German.

Rojales (Alicante) - 68% of it's 16,560 residents are foreign (11,283), half of whom are over the age of 65. The vast majority are British.

Partaloa (Almería) - Eight out of every ten residents of the Andalusian municipality are British, almost half of whom are over the age of 65.

Arboleas (Almería) - An incredible 83% of the 3,054 people registered in this small inland municipality 20km from the Almería coast are British. (Abridged from The Local)

Pensioners can get a 30% discount but only if they are registered as permanent residents in the Valencian Community.

You may need to show proof of age ID plus Residencia, NIE or DNI. A bit of a palaver really.

Prior booking is not required. Sometimes the bus fills up quickly with people and you have to wait more than 2 hours for the next bus.

Applying Online for A Padron Appointment In Orihuela.

Many of us who have been over here for some years will only be too aware of the many, many hours of seemingly endless queues while waiting to register for Padron, Residencia, SUMA - in fact most things. The bureaucracy in Spain teaches us all patience.

Fortunately the local council have come up with a very welcome efficiency, where one can now register online for an appointment.

On this website you can choose day, date and time for your appointment, subject of course to availability.

The web address is located below and is, helpfully, also available in the English language.

When you first try to access the site, you may get a warning saying that this particular website does not have a security certificate. I just ignored it.
